"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend William, Bishop of London (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners. do humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say:—

(a) As from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming this Scheme, the area defined in the subjoined Schedule and delineated on the map hereto annexed shall be a new parish.

(b) The Church of King Charles the Martyr aforesaid shall be the parish church of the parish

) The name of the parish shall be 'The Parish of King Charles the Martyr, South Mymms'.

"2. Archdeaconry and Rural Deanery.

"All those contiguous portions of the parishes of South Mimms and Potters Bar (shown by the pink and blue colours on the map) which are bounded upon the north by the parish of North Mimms, upon the northeast by the centre of the railway line of the British Railways (Eastern Region) and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point in the middle of the bridge which carries the said railway line over Darkes Lane opposite to the middle of Darkes Lane and continuing thence southwestof Darkes Lane and continuing thence southwest-wards along the middle of first Darkes Lane and then of Baker Street to a point opposite to the middle of the southeastern end of Sawyers Lane and continuing thence first north westwards and then northwards along the middle of Sawyers Lane to a point opposite to the middle of the south-eastern end of Bridgefoot Lane and continuing thence north westwards along the middle of thence north westwards along the middle of Bridgefoot Lane to a point opposite to the south eastern end of the wall or fence forming the north eastern boundary of the grounds of Bridgefoot House and continuing thence generally north westwards along the said wall or fence for a distance of 18 chains or thereabouts to the point at which the said wall or fence turns southwards and continuing thence westwards in a straight line for a distance of 10 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of Mymmshall Brook at a distance of 9 chains northwest of the bridge (at the western end of Bridgefoot Lane) over the said brook and continuing thence generally north westwards along the middle of Mymmshall Brook to a point in the middle of Cecil Road and continuing thence north eastwards along the middle tinuing thence north eastwards along the middle of Cecil Road to a point in the middle of Mutton of Cecil Road to a point in the middle of Mutton Lane and continuing thence generally eastwards along the middle of Mutton Lane to a point opposite to the south eastern end of the wall or fence which divides close numbered 238 from close numbered 242 and continuing thence generally northwards along the walls or fences which divide closes numbered 238, 208 and 207 from closes numbered 242 and 206 to a point where the last mentioned wall or fence meets the wall or fence which divides closes numbered 207 and 206

from close numbered 181 and continuing thence westwards along the last mentioned wall or fence for a distance of 15 feet or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the footpath leading from Mymms Hall towards the north western corner of Warren-gate Farm and continuing thence first north eastgate Farm and continuing thence first north east-wards, then north westwards and then north eastwards again along the middle of the last mentioned footpath to its junction with the boundary which divides the parish of South Mimms, from the parish of North Mimms." And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and sub-mission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure.

"And whereas the said Amos Alfred Bradshaw; Coventry Makgill Crichton-Maitland; Leonard Henry Cooley; Maurice, Bishop of Lincoln; and Kenneth Edward Norman Lamplugh desire to transfer the advowson of the said benefice to the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being and are consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof they have executed the same):

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Maurice, Bishop of Lincoln (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Church Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the whole advowson or perpetual right of or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice shall be transferred to the said Maurice, Bishop of Lincoln, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Lincoln for the time being." the time being."
