The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**H**ER Majesty in Council is pleased to Declare, That for the Encouragement of such Regiments, Troops and Companies, as have been, or shall be sent to the West-Indies in Her Majesty's Service during this War, It is Her Royal Intention, That all Officers and private Soldiers, as intimated to be retained, shall now and then be rewarded by order Her Majesty's Forces to be sent thither once in Three Years. And that during their stay in the West-Indies, their Pay shall be paid and fully satisfied every Week, or as often as possible, in Money or Provisions, and that the Officers shall receive at such times of Payment their usual Subsidies, but their full Pay, according to the Establishment, subject only to such Deduction from the said Officers and Soldiers as are usual, for Clothing, the Company, and the One Day's Pay for the Royal Hospital at Chelsea, and such others as they themselves shall desire. And in Her Majesty's further Pleasure, That this Declaration be Published in the Gazette.

**Vienna, Nov. 15. N. S.** On the 13th Instant my Lord Pager, late Ambassador from England at the Ottoman Port, who has been here about 4 Months, to adjust Matters relating to a Dispute between the Emperor and the Port, about the Limits of their respective Territories in the Province of Bosnia, having now fully settled that Affair, his Excellency had Audience of Leave of the Emperor and Empress on the 13th Instant, and intends in few days to proceed on his Journey to England. This day being the Feast of St. Leopold, whose Name the Emperor bears, was observed here as usual, with great Solemnity, and there was an Opera, with other Rejoycings, at Court. The King and Queen of the Romans are at present at Praeg, in Bohemia, from whence they are expected here in a short time.

**Berlin, November 21.** Letters from Warsaw say, Monsieur Du Heron, the French Envoy, had been seized there by a Party of Dragoons as he was abroad in his Coach, and was carry'd out of Town, but it was not known whither; The reason why he has met with this usage, is supposed to be, that he had neglected the repeated Orders both of the King and the Senate, That he should depart from thence, and that he talked with too much freedom of the Proceedings of that Court, particularly upon the occasion of their sending a Body of Troops into the Emperor's Service. They write from Lemberg, That a great number of the Cossacks, who are Subjects to the Crown of Poland, have taken the opportunity of the Troubles that Kingdom is now embroyled in, to take up Arms against it, and surpris'd the Town of Biaheckerkow, but had not yet been able to take the Castle; And that a Body of the Nobility of Poland, and some of the Forces of the Crown, are drawing together in order to suppress this Rebellion. We are without any certain Accounts of the March of the King of Sweden's Army.

**Frankfort, Nov. 23.** Prince Lewis of Baden is now at Erlingen, settling the Repartition of the Winter Quarters for his Forces, which are already separated, and are cantoned in several places within our Lines near the Rhine. The French Army is also gone into Winter Quarters in Alsace. General Thungen being indisposed, went some days ago to Baden, to use the Water there. The French continue to fortifie the small Town of Newbourg, on this side of the Rhine, where they keep a numerous Garrison; We hear that a Party of 800 Hussars making an Excursion lately that way, fell upon 500 of that Garrison, who were foraging with a Guard of 400 Men, and defeated them, killing above 200 of the Enemy, and taking Prisoners above 100, among whom are a Lieutenant Colonel, 4 Captains, and as many Lieutenants. The Landgrave of Hesse Cassell has been to confer with the Elector of Triers at Coblenz, from whence he is now come to Braubach; He has sent 20 Pieces of Cannon to Rhinfeld, and the Landgrave of Hesse Darmstadt, has sent them 4 and 4 Regiments of the Forces of Lunenburg are marching thither to reinforce that Garrison, so that we look upon that place to be secure at present from the Attempts of the French, whose Designs on that side have also been disappointed by the long Defence of the Castle of Traerbach, and the March of the Palatine Forces from the Upper, and the Hessians from the Lower-Rhine, towards the Moselle. It is said that a Negotiation has been carried on for bringing over the Elector of Bavaria from the French Interest, but there is little appearance of Success, his Demands being very unreasonable; as among other things, That the Circles of Suabia and Franconia should reimburse him the Expences he has been at on account of the present War; That the House of Austria should engage to allow him a Pension of 300000 Fiorins during his Life, in lieu of a like Pension which was promised him by Spain; That the Marquitate of Burgau, and the County of Ortenbourg, near Lintz, be given up to him; besides several other places he lays claim to, as having formerly depended on the Dutchy of Bavaria and the Upper Palatinate. But it is believed the good News we have lately received of the happy Success of the English and Dutch Forces and Fleet at Vigo, will rather induce him to think of entering into other Measures; as well as encourage the Circles of Suabia and Franconia, which are now assembled at Heilbronn, to take such vigorous Resolutions, as may tend to the Advancement of the Common Cause.

are laden with Provisions or Ammunition; The Elector of Triers has given Orders for visiting likewise at Coblenz the Boats that pass by that place going down the River; And we hear the French Garrison at Box begins to suffer for want of Provisions, and great numbers of them desert daily, especially of those to whom the Guard of the Fort on the other side of the Rhine is committed, who have the Opportunity of getting to Siegbourg, where they are taken care of by the Elector Palatine's Officers. The Elector of Cologne is still at Luxembourg; and the Count de Tallard with the Forces under his Command continues at Saar Louis. A Line is making round Rimbreg, in order to keep that place closely blockt up during the Winter; and we have Advice, that the Governor of that place having sent from thence some Bagag for Guelders, under a Guard of 400 Men, it fell into the hands of our Troops, who killed some of their Men, and took most of the rest Prisoners.

Paris, Nov. 24. The French King gave Orders, That every Regiment should, on pain of being broke, raise a Troop of Morale, consisting of 150 Livres for every Trooper, which is not half the Sum that must be rais'd; that many will be oblig'd to surrender their Commissions; These new raised Men are to be added to the Regiments now on foot, which consist of 8 Troops, and are to be thus augmented to 12. They write from Italy, that on the 14th Instant a Detachment of 1200 French from Mantua possess'd themselves of the Intrenchments which the Impriants had at Dog bore, whereof the Duke of Vendosme having Advice he sent them a Reinforcement of 600 Spaniards, in order to attack the Castle, which surrendered to them at discretion the next day.

Hague, Nov. 28. N. S. The States General have under Consideration the State of the War for the next Year; and for the better Supporting the Extraordinary Charge it brings upon them, have resolv'd to raise twice in the Year the Two hundredth Penny. It is said their Fleet will be upon the same Foot as it was last Year. Three Regiments of Foot, under the Command of the Baron of Heusen, are marching towards the Texel, in order to go on board several of our Men of War; but it is not known for what Service they are design'd.

Exeter, Nov. 16. This afternoon came in here a Fishing Privateer of 22 Guns, which has not been abroad above 15 days, and in that time has taken 9 Prizes, viz. 2 French West-India Ships, which he has sent home, 4 Bankers, which are redeemed and releas'd, one other Prize he has sent to Lisbon, another he has brought in here, and the 9th being very leaky, he was forced to sink at Sea.

Cowes, Nov. 18. Yesterday was sent in hither by a Fishing Privateer a French Prize of 80 Tuns in Ballast, which was coming from the West-Indies with a Plequer for the French Court, which they threw over board when they found they could not avoid being taken.

Dale, November 20. Just now is come into the Downs from St. Hellens Rear-Admiral Graydon, with 8 of Her Majesty's Ships, 2 of the Spanish Galeons, and several French Men of War taken at Vigo, and divers Coasters and other small Vessels.
