**T**HE Ambassadors of this Republick to the King of Spain returned hither this week, and are to attend the Senate to-morrow, to give an Account of their Embassy. Our Letters from the *Monsieur* say, the Duke de Vendosme is at *Guastalla*, settling the Winter Quarters for his Troops, whereof he has sent some Regiments of Horse to *Cremona*. The Imperialists have sent a Detachment of their Forces to *Governolo*, which Place they intend to make very strong, and are likewise putting their Army into Winter Quarters. The Chevalier de *Feurbin*, who commanded the French Frigats in the *Adriatick* Gulph, is gone for the French Court, in order to lay before that King an Account of his Proceedings, and to desire further Instructions.

*Ratisbonne*, Nov. 27. On the 17th Instant the Imperial Diet unanimously resolved upon the Number of Forces to be kept on foot during the present War by the several Circles of the Empire, to be employed against all the Enemies and Disturbers of the Publick Tranquillity, either within or without the Empire, according to the following Scheme, *viz.*

They further resolved, That these Forces should not be reduced to less than 80000 Men in time of Peace; That these Resolutions should be sent by an Express to the Emperor, and that he should be desired to notify the same to the Directors of the several Circles, to the end they might forthwith call together the States of each Circle, in order to regulate the Quotas to be furnished by the respective Members thereof, that these Troops may, without any loss of time, be brought into a Condition to march wherever the Publick Service shall require: The Conclusion for this purpose being drawn up and signed in the usual manner, was delivered in the Name of the Empire by the Minister of *Mentz*, as Director of the Electoral College, to Cardinal *Lamberg*, the Emperor's Commissary, who immediately dispatch'd it by a Courier to *Vienna*. On the 24th we received here the Confirmation and Particulars of the Glorious Enterprize at *Vigo*, which has given the greatest Satisfaction imaginable, in regard to the Consequences it may have for the good of the Common Cause. The Elector of *Bavaria* has demanded from this Town a positive Assurance, That they will not admit any Imperial Forces to be put in Garrison here; in which case he will promise them not to send any of his Troops hither, but otherwise he shall be obliged to prevent the Imperialists; Our Magistrates are inclined to comply with this Demand, and have sent to desire the Emperor's Leave to do it, which it is believed they will the sooner obtain, because the Diet looks upon it to be against the Privileges of the Empire for any Garrison to be allowed in a Town where they are assembled. That Elector is still at *Eningen*, and has cantoned part of his Army in the Villages thereabouts, without raising notice to

whom they belong: He has sent a Detachment into *Franconia*; with intent, as it is supposed, to gather Contributions, it not being strong enough to make any other Attempt; But it is hoped they will have the same Success with another Detachment of Horse and Dragoons, which he lately sent to *Norlingen* with the same Design, who demanded 700 Loads of Forage of the Magistrates; but General *Puff* being got into the Town with his Regiment of *Mullers*, perfwaded the Inhabitants to give nothing; and tho' the *Bavarians* came down from 700 to 70 Loads, yet even that was refused, they were obliged to retire in Confusion, and the *Hussars* falling upon their Rear, killed many of them: Most of the *Bavarian* Troops are already filed off to Winter Quarters, and we hear the rest will shortly do the like, and that the Elector will return in few days to *Munich*. The Imperial Forces commanded by Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* are also separated, and gone into Winter Quarters; so that the Campaign on this side seems to be at an end for this Season; But a Body of 8000 Men is assembled in Upper *Austria*, which is to be joined by more Troops, particularly the *Saxons* that are lately entered into the Emperor's Service; and we expect in a little time to hear of their having entered into the *Bavarian* Territories. *Bacon Zeyler*, one of the Imperial Commissaries at the Diet being recalled, in order to be admitted into the Emperor's Cabinet Council, is on his departure for *Vienna*.

*Berlin*, Nov. 28. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 19th Instant say, an Express was come thither from the *Swedish* Camp with Letters to the Cardinal Primate, and brought an Account, that the King of *Sweden* was in very good Health, and was settling the Repartition of the Winter Quarters for his Troops, which are to be in the Palatinates of *Sandomir*, *Lublin*, *Brescia*, and *Ruffind*, and that the King intends to take his head Quarters at *Lublin*.

*Frankfort*, Nov. 30. The Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* having Advice, that a Body of French Forces was in motion, with intent to attack *Rhinfield*, he halted thither with some Troops to prevent the Enemy, and posted his Men in the Outworks of that Town, the Propriety whereof being in Dispute between him and another of the same Family, and the Place by common Consent left in the Hands of the Emperor till that Affair can be adjusted, it occasioned a Report, that the Landgrave had possessed himself of it contrary to this Agreement; But we have since understood, that the Landgrave has given all the Assurances that could be desired, that he had no such Design, and accordingly the Imperial Garrison there continues in Possession of the Castle, and the *Hessians* remain in the Outworks.

*Cologne*, Dec. 1. The Chapter of *Cologne* has published a Manifesto, declaring, That they had taken upon them the Administration of this Archbishoprick, by reason of the Elector's having absented himself: They have summoned a Diet of the States of this Country to meet here on the 4th of the next Month; and they have taken into their Pay two Companies of Foot which had quitted the Elector's Service, in pursuance of the Imperial Avocatoria. We hear he is gone from *Luxembourg* to *Namur*, very much discontented with the Treatment he receives from the French Court, which has refused him the Liberty of going to *Paris*: He has also expressed his Dissatisfaction with the Proceeding of *Monieur de Grammont*, Governor of *Rhinberg*, who, by the Hostilities he has committed in the Country of *Meurs*, contrary to the Neutrality agreed upon for that Country and the Duchy of *Saurland*, has given Occasion to the King of *Prussia* to quarter two Regiments of Horse and some other Forces in the said Country. The Allies proceed in making a Line about *Rhinberg*, in order to keep that Place closely blockt this Winter, and between 2 and 3000 Men are continually employed in that Work. The Forces of the Allies quartered about *Bon* take such care to prevent the sending of any Provisions and other Necessaries into that Place, that we hear the Garrison there begins to suffer for want of Salt, and Wood for Firing; and it is so much lessened by Sickness and Desertion, that they have been forced to

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withdraw the Battalions which lay in the Fort on the other side of the *Rhine*, in order to reinforce those in the Town, and at present keep only a small Guard in the said Fort. The Bishop of *Raab* went from hence yesterday to *Dusseldorp*.

*Liege, Dec. 1.* - The States of the Principality of *Liege* being summoned to meet here by Vertue of an Order from the Emperor, their Assembly was accordingly opened this day, and Count *Zinzendorf*, the Emperor's Envoy, is to make some Propositions to them, and particularly to demand a Subsidy towards carrying on the War. We hear the Elector of *Cologne* has protested against these Proceedings, declaring, he would treat those as Rebels that should comply with the Emperor's Demands; And that he has also summoned the States to meet at *Dinant*, and those of his Council to attend him there, under the like Penalty: Four Regiments of Horse and Dragoon in that Elector's Service are quartered at *Dinant*, and in the neighbouring Towns.

*Paris, Dec. 1.* The French King went the 28th past to *Marli*, with intent to remain there the rest of this week. The Marquis de *Bouillers* is come to Court to justify his Conduct; (the ill Success of our Arms on that side during this Campaign having given occasion to very severe Reflections upon him) as likewise to give the King an Account of the Posture of Affairs there, and desire new Instructions, and will return to *Brussels* as soon as he has received them. We have Advice, that the King of Spain parted from *Genoua* the 16th of the last Month on board the Squadron of French Gallies commanded by the Marquis de *Forville*, and anchored that night at *Vado*, the 17th he came to *Monaco*, and the 18th to *Antibes*, where he was received by the Count de *Grignan*, the King's Lieut. Gen. in *Provence*, and Saluted with a treble Discharge of the Artillery; the 21st he continued his Journey, and the 25th he arrived at *Aubagne*, in his way to *Spain*. It is believed he will proceed no farther than *Barcelona*, where the Queen will meet him, that he may with the less loss of time give his Directions in the Affairs of *Milan*, and be the better able to prevent any Disorders in *Catalonia*, where there is reason to expect some way a life. The Cardinal d'Estrees came in a Litter by Land to *Provence*, excusing himself from waiting on the King by Sea, in regard he was very much troubled with the Stone; But there are many who believe it is not so much his Indisposition which hinder'd his going to Sea, as his Aversion to a Journey into *Spain*, where he cannot promise himself much Satisfaction in the present Circumstances of Affairs there, and he has already desir'd the King's Leave, under pretence of his Infirmities, to resign his Employments, but could not obtain it. We understand that the Swiss Cantons are raising more Forces, but that they are designed for the Defence of their own Frontiers, and not for the French Service. Our last Letters from the French Army in *Italy* are of the 18th past: Nothing considerable has happened there since the taking of *Borghetto*; Our Court is much pleased with that success; and we are assured Prince *Eugene* had a Design to abandon that Place, and was therefore withdrawing the few Troops he had left there. When these Letters came away, the Duke of *Vendome* was at *Novi*; he intended to take his general Quarters at *Guastalla*, but had since altered his Resolution, and appointed the same to be at *Mantua*. There is a Discourse, that the Marquis de *Villars* has a Design to seize upon *Croon-Weilsembourg* and *Lauterbourg* before he puts his Forces into Winter Quarters, in order to strengthen *Landau*; and that the Count de *Tallard*, who arrived the 22d past at *Metz* with the Forces under his Command, has Orders to join him; but we look upon this only as common Report. Monsieur de la *Harteloire* came away from *Lisbon* the 23d of the last Month with the Squadron under his Command, consisting of 8 French Men of War, whereof 4 are sent into *Rochfort*, and the other 4 are come to *Brest*: The 4 French Gallies that were at *Lisbon* are gone to *Cadiz*. We talk of building 22 new Ships to be launched before next Summer; but upon an exact Account which the Intendants of the Marine have taken by Order of the Court, it does appear that there is not in our Magazines sufficient quantity of Stores for half that number. Letters from *Brest* say, they are not yet recovered from their Consternation at the Affair of *Vigo*; They work there on some new Ships, but there is very little Timber in the Magazines, and the Merchants who have any in store are not willing to part with it, unless it be at very great Rates, being uncertain when they shall be paid. Two or three hundred Seamen that belong'd to Count *Chateaufort's* Squadron, which was destroyed at *Vigo*, are come from thence to *Brest*, and others to other Ports of France, but in a miserable Condition; and we hear, that a Frigate coming from *Corunna* is cast away near *Bayone*, which had on board 220 Seamen, and about 30 Officers that came also from *Vigo*. The Mistresses of this Campaign, and the Taxes which have been paid, and will be further necessary for raising 50 Millions of *Livres* Extraordinary, which the King has demanded for the Service of the next year, give so great Discontent to

all sorts of People, even at Court, that the King has absolutely forbidden, on severe Penalties, all Persons from speaking of News and Matters of State in their Conversation.

*Hague, Dec. 5. N. S.* His Excellency the Earl of *Marborough* is gone from hence for *England*, leaving the Command of the English Forces in his Absence to the Lord *Cutts*. Monsieur *Kosencrans*, Envoy from the King of *Denmark* to Her Majesty of *Great Britain*, is likewise gone for *England*. Admiral *Alleinende*, who commanded the Dutch Men of War in the late Expedition at *Cadiz* and *Vigo*, and Baron *Spar*, who had the Charge of the Land Forces on board them, have waited upon the States, to give them an Account of their Proceedings. A General Thanksgiving is ordered to be observed on the 13th Instant, for the good Successes of the Arms of the States and their Allies. The Count de *Chamilly's* Secretary, who was lately seized for coming into these Countries without a Pass, is now set at liberty; and is gone forward upon his Journey to *France*.

*St. James's, Nov. 28.* His Excellency the Earl of *Marborough* landed yesterday near *Margate*, being come from *Holland* on board the *Peregrine* Galley, and arrived here this evening in good Health.

Monsieur *Rosencrans*, Envoy of *Denmark*, is also arrived.

*St. James's, Nov. 29.* *Thomas Hopson* Esq; Vice-Admiral of the *Red*, having brought the great Ships in Safety to *Black-Steer*, came to Town last night, and attended his Royal Highness this morning, who received him very kindly, and carried him to wait upon the Queen, who was pleas'd to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon him, as a Mark of Her Royal Favour, and part of the Recognition which Her Majesty graciously intends him, for his Signal Service at *Vigo*, where he broke through the Boom that was laid cross that Harbour, for the Security of the French Fleet and Spanish Gallies, whereby he has so greatly contributed to the success of that Glorious Enterprize.
