**T**HE Duke of Mantua came the 9th Instant from Casal to the Palace of the Prince of Centurione, in this City, attended by a Guard of sixty Horse, who, as soon as he was entred into the Town, drew their Swords, and marched before him, with the same State as if he was Sovereign Lord of this Country, which undecent Behaviour, in a Republick that is so jealous of her Liberty as this is, occasioned a great deal of Murmuring. On the 11th the King of Spain, having left Milan 5 days before, came to the Palace of the Duke of Spinola, in the Suburb of San Pietro d'Arena, about half a mile from hence; he was saluted with a treble Discharge of the Cannon of this City, and had other Honours paid him that are usual on the like extraordinary Occasions. The Doge and Senate went the same day to compliment him on his safe Arrival, and were very well received by him, the King giving to the Doge the Title of Highness, and to the Republick that of Most Serene, and allowing the Doge and the Senators to be covered in his Presence. That night a Fire happened in the Marquis of Doria's Palace at San Pietro d'Arena, where some French Officers lodged, by the Negligence of their Servants, and the Damage it did is computed at 40000 Dollars. The 12th the Doge and Senate made the King a second Visit in great State; the Doge was carried in a very rich Sedan, and the Senators in Litters, followed by the Nobility in their Coaches, and before the Doge marched 24 young Noblemen on Horseback, all very richly clothed, their Horses finely accoutred, and attended with many Servants in rich Liveries, which made a very glorious Show. An Opera was acted here, which was intended for his Diversion, but he did not come to it. The 13th he dined publickly, and afterwards came into this City, accompanied by the Duke of Mantua, the Prince of Vaudemont Governor of Milan, and the Cardinal d'Estrees; and attended by the Doge's Guards, and 200 Dragoons, he went directly to St. Lawrence's Church, where he staid about an hour, and then returned to his Palace: There was an Opera and a Ball here for his Entertainment, but he appeared at neither, having that day received a Courier from Spain, with the News that the English Fleet had taken and destroyed the French Ships and Spanish Galeons at Vigo, which made him very melancholly. The 15th the Gallies were ordered to be in a readines for his embarking, and the Doge and Senate were on their way to take their Leave of him, when a Messenger met them, who was sent by the King to acquaint them, that he had put off his Departure till the next day. It was observed, that he had altered his Resolution upon the Receipt of an Express from Milan, which had visibly increased the Concern he had upon him for the mortifying News which he had received from Spain. The 16th, the Weather being extremely fair, the Gallies were ordered out of the Mole; the Doge, Senate, and others of the Nobility, went

to wish him a good Voyage, and conduct him to his Gally. Accordingly they accompanied him to the Sea-side, where a Bridge of Boats had been laid from the Shore to his Gally, for his greater Conveniency of embarking; but as they were about half way over this Bridge, that part of it which was nearest the Gally gave way, and was carried off by the Stream, so they were forced to come back, and make use of Boats. When the Gallies were under Sail, the Patrone or Admiral gave 3 Guns, and all the Cannon round the Town was four times discharged; And in less than two hours the Gallies were out of sight, to the great Satisfaction of the People here, to whom it gave no small Apprehensions, to see so strong a Squadron of Gallies in their Port, and the King of Spain, with a strong Guard of French Soldiers, and many other Foreigners, so near them, insomuch that they had increased the Guards of the City to thrice the number they were before, had mounted more Cannon on their Walls, shut up several of their Gates, and taken all the necessary Precautions to prevent a Surprise.

*Plymouth, November 29.* The St. *Quintin* of London, *Thomas Moor* Master, bound home from *Guinea*, came in here the 27th Instant; and yesterday was brought in a French Prize called the *St. John Baptist* of *Bourdeaux*, laden with Fish from *Newfoundland*, taken by Her Majesty's Ship the *Medway*.

*Bristol, November 30.* Yesterday arrived here the *George and Grace* of this Port from *Antegoa*.  
*Yarmouth, November 30.* The *Robert and Elizabeth* of this Port, *Robert Jolly* Master, came into our Road two days ago from *Russia*, being bound to London.

*Deale, December 1.* Her Majesty's Ship the *Shrewsbury*, with a French Prize called *le Prompt*, of 70 Guns, being one of the Men of War that were taken at *Vigo*, and divers small Vessels, are come into the *Dowries* from *Spithead*.

*Whitehall, November 30.* This day his Excellency Signior *Aluisio Mocenigo*, Ambassador in Ordinary from the Republick of *Venice* to Her Majesty, made his Publick Entry. He was received at *Greenwich* by the Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Plymouth*, and Sir *Charles Cottrell* Master of the Ceremonies, accompanied by six Gentlemen of Her Majesty's Privy Chamber, and brought by Water in Her Majesty's Barge, attended by several other Barges, to the Tower. The Rt. Hon. the Earl of *Abingdon*, Constable of the Tower, complimented his Excellency at his Landing; and he was saluted with a Discharge of the Cannon, the Standard being displayed. From thence he was conducted in Her Majesty's Coach, followed by a Coach of his Royal Highness Prince *George* of *Denmark*, three of his own Coaches, one with eight, and the other two with six Horses apiece, and many Coaches of the Nobility, with six Horses each, to his own House, where his Excellency was complimented in Her Majesty's Name by the Rt. Lord Delawar, Groom of the Stole to his Royal Highness. His Excellency's Train consisted of several Gentlemen; with 6 Pages and 18 Footmen, and other Servants in rich Liveries.

St. James's, December 2. This day being appointed for the Publick Audience of his Excellency Signior *Aluisto Mecenigo*, Ambassador in Ordinary from the Republick of *Venice*, the Right Honourable the *Earl of Derby*, and *Sir Charles Cottrell* Master of the Ceremonies, with six Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, conducted him from his own House hither in Her Majesty's Coach, followed by a Coach of his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark*, the Ambassador's own Coaches, and many Coaches of the Nobility, with six Horses each. His Excellency was received at the Gate of the Palace by the Knight Marshal. Her Majesty's Foot Guards then upon Duty were drawn up in the Court; and their Officers saluted his Excellency with their Hats as he passed by. His Excellency was conducted to the Council Chamber, and when Her Majesty was ready, proceeded to his Audience: He was received at the Guard-Chamber Door by the Rt. Hon. the Marquis of *Hartington*, Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard, and afterwards by his Grace the Duke of *St. Albans*, at the head of the Band of Gentlemen Pensioners, and at the Door of the Room of Audience by the Rt. Hon. the *Earl of Jersey*, Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household.

After which his Excellency had Audience of his Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark*, and was received at his Royal Highness's Bed-Chamber Door by the Rt. Hon. the Lord *Delawar*.

These Audiences being over, the Ambassador was reconducted by the *Earl of Derby*, the Master of the Ceremonies, and the Gentlemen of the Privy Chamber, in the same manner, to his own House.

St. James's, December 2. Yesterday Her Majesty was graciously pleased to express Her Self in a Committee of Council to this effect:

*I Am so Satisfied of the Eminent Services of my Lord Marlborough to the Publick, and to My Self, both in his Command of the Army, and the Entire Confidence he has Settled between Me and the States General, that I intend to make him a Duke.*
