**T**HE Government here is at present Levying the Tax upon Windows, which has been laid on this City and the Territory belonging to it, to make up the Sum which they have promised to give the King of Spain by way of a Free Gift; but Cardinal Camerlino, Archbishop of this City, pretends that the Clergy ought to be exempted, because they gave the King a Free Gift at his first coming hither. Several Companies of Soldiers were Shipped off here this Week for the Spanish Seaport Towns on the Coast of Tuscany, to relieve the Forces in Garison there. A Squadron of Horse was sent some days ago into the Abruzzo, and more Forces will shortly be ordered thither, to suppress those who are in Arms in that Province in favour of the House of Austria. Divers Persons, who were imprisoned upon Suspicion of being in the same Interest, are set at Liberty, there appearing nothing against them. Don Dominico de Luna, who was seized here some Months ago, upon the Information of a Shop-keeper, That he had endeavoured to entice him to raise a Tumult in favour of the Emperor, is removed from the Prison of this City to the Castle of Gsta. Don Malicia Caraffa, and another Gentleman, that were taken up and confined on an Accusation of the like Nature, have made their Escapes.

**Florence, November 18.** Letters from Leghorn of yesterday, give an Account of the Arrival in that Port of a Dutch Ship called the Pearl, with a Prize which she had taken, called the St. Joseph, being a French Merchant Ship of a great Burthen, which sailed from Leghorn about a Fortnight before, bound for Smyrna, and had on board 30000 Dollars in Money, and Goods to the Value of above 40000 Dollars more.

**Rome, November 18.** The Pope has been indisposed for several days, but is now perfectly recovered; he went lately to view a small Palace near the Vatican, built by Pope Pius the 4th, and has ordered it to be repaired, intending to make it a Retiring-place at such times as he shall desire to be in private. He has lately been applied to with great Earnestness, both by the Imperialists and the French, for the liberty of taking Winter Quarters in his Territories, but has refused them both; Yet it is said, he has engaged for the Security of the Convoys of Provisions which come up the Po from Mezola through the Ferrarese, for the Service of the Imperial Army. Cardinal Rodolowich died here some days ago of an Apoplexy in the 78th Year of his Age; He was commended for his Skill in the Management of State Affairs, and had gone through several of the Chief Employments at this Court: By his Death the Archbishoprick of Chiati; and several other rich Benefices, are become vacant. The last week three Turkish Vessels were by Strefs of Weather Stranded on our Coasts, one near the Lake Fogliano, in the Territory of la Cisterna, on board which 26 of

their Men were taken by the Country People and Militia; another near the Port of Santa Felicità, which had on board 36 Turks who were taken Prisoners, and several Christian Slaves; and the third a Turkish Brigantine, driven ashore near Crovita-Veccia, which some Fishing Vessels there having perceived, they took her, and having got her off, carry'd her into that Port; there were on board her 60 Turks and 10 Christian Slaves. Orders are sent for these Prisoners to make their Quarantine at Scarmonea; after which the Christians will be set at liberty and the Turks will be put on board the Pope's Gallies. Several Shocks of Earthquake have lately been felt in this County, and we hear that it threw down several Houses and Churches at Norcia and killed divers of the Inhabitants, and did some Damage at Spolero and Terni. The Pope has made Don Carlo Albani, his Nephew, one of the Gentlemen of his Bed-Chamber, and it is said he will shortly bestow some Preferment upon Don Horatio Albani, his Brother. Last week arrived here 4 covered Wagons, having the Emperor's Arms on them, which were drawn by 8 Horses each, and well guarded, and are said to be loaden with Money for the use of the Imperial Army in the Modense. An Accident happened here last week, which is like to prove of a very ill Consequence; Cardinal Grimani, the Chief of the Emperor's Party at this Court, and Protector of the Affairs of the House of Austria, being abroad in his Coach to take the Air, was overtaken in a narrow Lane by the Dutchess of Uceda, the Spanish Ambassador's Lady, who being uneasy at the Cardinal's going very slowly, ordered her Coachman to drive on before, which the Cardinal permitted, and saluted her as she passed by; but her second Coach attempting to do the like, it was not allowed of; whereupon the Gentlemen that were in the Coach leaped out with their Swords drawn, and the Cardinal's Gentlemen perceiving it, did the like, and after some Dispute, in which one of the Spanish Lady's Pages was wounded, the Spaniards were forced to go back. The Cardinal, as soon as he came home, gave notice to the Pope of what had passed, who immediately sent Cardinal Paolucci, his Secretary of State, to the Venetian Ambassador, to desire he would endeavour to reconcile this Matter, and divers Expedients have been proposed for this purpose, but none of them have yet succeeded, and it is not a little part of the Difficulty, that the Cardinal refuses to sign any Writing wherein the Title of Ambassador from the King of Spain is given to the Duke of Uceda: In the mean time both Parties have got together in their Palaces a great number of Men in Arms to maintain their Quarrel, and the Pope has found it necessary to place Guards in several parts of the City to prevent further Disorders. *Warsaw, November 15.* We are here in great Expectation of the Return of the Express lately sent to the King of Sweden, to desire his positive Answer to the Offer made by the Republick, of their Mediation for adjusting Matters between him and their King; And the Emperor and other Princes having lately renewed their Offers of Mediation, we have the greater hopes of bringing this Negotiation to bear, especially since the Removal of Monsieur Du Heron, the French Envoy, from hence, who left no Means unattempted to obstruct it.

*Thorn, November 21.* The King of Poland went from hence some days ago with a small Attendance, but whether is not yet known. Monsieur du Heron, the French Envoy, having been lately seized at Warsaw for his indecent Behaviour, was since brought hither with a Guard of 30 Dragoons, and continues under Confinement. Many of the Deputies who are to assist at the great Council to be held here the 27th Instant, are already arrived, and the rest are daily expected.

*Tilsit in Prussia, November 23.* Monsieur Bonac, the French Ambassador to the Court of Sweden, who was taken Prisoner some time ago by Ogmisky's Forces, is since set at Liberty, and is at present at a Place called Carver, from whence he intends to set out speedily for Warsaw, by the way of Groino. The taking of Nottenburg is confirmed by our Letters from Livonia, which assure us, That the Swedish Governor of that Place, with a Garrison only of 600 Men, sustained a Siege of a whole Month, against a very numerous Army of Muscovites.

*Lancaster, Dec. 4.* Yesterday being appointed by Her Majesty's Proclamation to be kept as a Day of Publick Thanksgiving for the Great and Glorious Successes of the Arms of Her Majesty and Her Allies by Sea and Land, it was observed by this Corporation with the greatest Solemnity: In the morning the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council, with many Gentlemen of our Neighbourhood, went to Church, where a very good Sermon was Preached by the Rev. Dr. Fenton, suitable to the Occasion. The Mayor and all the Company went in the evening, with Flambeaux and Musick playing before them, to the two Crosses, where Bonfires were prepared, (all the Houses in the Town being illuminated) and there drank Her Majesty's and his Royal Highness's Healths, and Prosperity to all Her Majesty's Allies, wishing constant Success to Her Majesty's Arms, and a long Continuance of Her Majesty's Prosperous Reign over us; and at night there was a Ball. The Commemorialty was also generously treated, and there never was seen so unanimous a Rejoycing, nor such hearty Demonstrations of Duty and Affection for Her Majesty's Person and Government.

The most Solemn Demonstrations of Loyalty, and of the Universal Joy, for the great Successes wherewith it has pleased God to bless the Arms of Her Majesty and Her Allies, both by Sea and Land, have likewise been given in all the principal Cities and Towns of the Kingdom.

*St. James's, Dec. 7.* A very Dutiful and Loyal Address from the General Council and Representatives of Her Majesty's Province of the Massachusetts-Bay in New-England, in General Court assembled, has been presented to Her Majesty; which Her Majesty received very Graciously.
