Genoua, Dec. 17. The Durch Privateers continue to cruize in these Seas with very good Success: The 8th Instant they sent into this Port a French Merchant Ship, newly built, of 16 Guns. According to our last Advices from Leghorne, they had lately brought in there three French Prizes, whereof one had 180 Men on board, which Ship one of these Privateers rock of the Privateers took after an obstinate Fight, wherein several of the Duch, but more of the French, were killed; and we daily hear of fome new Prizes they take. This has obliged the French Conful at Leghorne to forbid all the French Ships in that Port to put to Sea, till some Men of War come thither to convoy them; and he has also dispatched an Express to Turkey, to give Notice to the French Merchants in that Country, that it is not fafe for them to fend home their Ships without Convoys. Some days ago a Bark, which came from Naples with about 40 Soldiers on board, was driven on a Rock and bulged, and 5 Men only were faved. The Duke of Mantua left this Place some days ago, and is returned to Cazal.

Madrid, Dec. 14. An Express arrived here this day from Figueras with an Account, That the King of Spain was come thither, and would continue his Journey to this Place with all possible diligence. The Estates of the Almirante of Cassile, and of several Persons of Quality who retired with him into Portugal, are confiscated. An Edict was lately published, to prohibit all English and Dutch Manufactures that might be brought into this Kingdom by the way of Portugal: That Crown continues to make War-

like Preparations on our Frontiers, which encreases the Jealousies of this Court.

Warfam, Dec. 23. The Count de Zinzendorf, the Emperor's Envoy. has dispatched an Express to the Count de Piper, Secretary of State to the King of Sweden, who by this time is got to Ca. zimir, to know when he may wait upon his Majesty; and in the mean time is preparing for his departure from hence. That King has sent a Detachment of his Army towards Lemberg, under the Command of General Steinisch, who has Orders to endeavour to bring over the Army of the Crown to the Swedish Interest, and some Proposals have already been made to the Crown General for that purpose. made to the Crown General for that purpose; but we do not hear that he is enclined to comply therewith. The King of Poland has fent two Regiments of Horse and two of Foot into Lithuania, under the Command of General Wemaire, and it is faid they are to join with the

Muscovires, who, according to the Accounts we received this day by an Express from Revel, have got together an Army of 150000 Men near Pleskow, which they intend to divide into three Bodies, of 50000 Men each, whereof one is to march towards the Frontiers of Courland and Lichuania, another towards Narva, and 2 third towards Revel. These Letters from Revel add, that the Czar is gone from his Army to Moscow; That he has given to Prince Alexander Alexamira, his Cousin, the Fortress of Nottebeurg in Ingris, which his Forces have lately taken; and has caused above 500 of his Officers and Soldiers to be put to Death, for not having done their Duty in the Siege of that Place.

Monsieur d'Auverkirke, General Testau, and several other General Officers, which lately came hither from Duffeldorp, and other Places on the Lower Rhine, meet frequently, and the Hereditary Prince of Hesse-Cassel is shortly expected here from Rhinfelds to assist at their Conferences, which, according to the general Difcourse, will end in the Siege of Traerbach. Major-General Goor went two days ago with a Party of 100 Horse to view that Place, and is since returned hither. The Imperial and Palatine Forces, under the Command of Count Nassau Weilbourg, have taken Post at St. Wendel, Hymbourg, and Bitsch, and are fortifying those Places. The French Garison of Fort St. Marzin near Triers was lately relieved, and augmented with 600 Horfe, who in their march thicker fell upon a small Party of Hussars, which was forced to retire, with the Loss of 6 Men killed and a but soon afterwards had its few wounded, Revenge, for marching towards Saarbruck, they met with a Party of 100 French Dragoons, which they cut in Pieces. About 4 days ago a whole Guard of 25 French Soldiers, that was posted near Traerbach, deserted and came over to the Allies. It has been taken notice of, that several French Officers and Soldiers, under pretence of Deferting, have found means to get into the Elector of Bavaria's Army; but this Practice having been rimely discovered, effectual Care will be taken to prevent it for the future.

Cologne, Jan 5. The States of this Arbishop-rick have granted to our Chapter a Subsidy of 30000 Crowns; to be applied to the Service of the Publick, and will separate in two or three days. The States of the Circle of Westphalia are shortly to meet, and our Chapter intends to fend two Deputies to that Assembly. The Bithop of Ranh is perfectly recovered of his late liness. The French work very hard at Bon to augment the Fortifications of that Place; but we hear that the Rhine having overflowed, by reason of the late Rains, it has done great Damage to their Fort over-against it. They give out, that their Garison at Bon will shortly be

confiderably reinforced.

Our Forces being advanced near to Governolo, found about 300 of the Enemy polted in a House which was moted round, and senced with Palisadoes; the Cherolier de Manleyrier was ordered to attack that which was moted round, and fenced with Palifadoes; the Chevalier de Maulevrier was ordered to attack that Poff with 4 Companies of Granadiers, supported by several Bartalions, and they took it by storm, though with confiderable Loss, the Marquis of Luzzara Brigadier-General of Fort and Colonel of the Duke of Manquis Regiment of Guards, and several other Officers, being reckened among the Siam, and the Marquis of Mirabeau and many more being wounded; Part of the Germans were killed or taken, and the 1eft retired to Governolo.
