"THE SCHEDULE.

"The territory, shown by the pink colour on the map, to be annexed to the parish of Rowner:—
"All that portion of the parish of Saint Thomas, Elson, which is known as Bridgemary and which lies to the north of an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Rowner from the Parish of Saint Thomas, Elson, in the middle of Fareham Road opposite to the middle of the eastern end of Brewers Lane and continuing thence south eastwards along the middle of Fareham Road for a distance of 5½. chains and continuing thence north eastwards in a straight line to the northernmost point of the ramparts of Fort Elson and continuing thence in the same straight line to a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Thomas, Elson, from the parish of Porchester."
