Leading Electrician's Mate Carl Christian Anderson, C/MX 745943.

On 8th August, 1949, during trials carried out on "S" Class submarines, H.M. Submarine Sceptre was damaged by an underwater explosion and became partially flooded and filled with chlorine gas. The submarine was hung from salvage wires with a depth of over 500 feet of water beneath her and was in danger of sinking if a sudden "flooding-up" and consequent parting of the lifting wires occurred. Fully aware of the danger and knowing that if this happened he would undoubtedly lose his life, Leading Electrician's Mate Anderson volunteered to enter the submarine. Wearing a gas mask he entered the confined space and floundered through four feet of water, oil and wreckage in darkness which his torch did not penetrate. He reached the pump room and received repeated severe shocks, but persevering, he connected up the main ballast pump, opened all necessary valves and ran the pump, so giving the submarine the necessary buoyancy to float her and enable her to be taken away for examination.

It was undoubtedly due to Anderson's courage examination.

TENDERS FOR TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England, on Thursday, the 6th April, 1950, at 1 p.m., for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £240,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000 or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the tenderer on any business day from Tuesday, the 11th April, 1950, to Saturday, the 15th April, 1950, inclusive, and will be payable at three months after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank
