Warfaw, Febr. 3. N. S.

HE Cardinal Primate and the Princes of the House of Sapicha continue here, but the Diversions or the Carnaval have put a flop to all Negoriations, and in the present Circumstances there is less hopes of a Peace than ever. We hear the King of Poland is gone from Thoorn to Mariembourg, and that it is uncertain whether he will proceed from thence to Elbing or to Lizhuania, whither most of his Saxon Forces have Orders to march without loss of time. The Lithuanians are drawing together a considerable Body, with intent to join the King's Forces and the Musicovites, and to attack the Swedish Forces in that Country, which is so much exhausted already by the Marches of the Thoops of both Parties, that all these Forces will hardly be able to find Sucisifence there. Count Zinzendori, the Emperor's Musiter, is gone from hence to Dantzick.

Vienna, Febr. 7. General Schlick went from hence this week to the Upper Austria, to take upon him the Command of the Imperial Forces which are affembled on that fide, in order to attack the Elector of Bavaria's Country, and carried with him a confiderable Sum of Money. towards defraying the Charges of that Expedition. The Circle of Smalia has lately fent a Deputy hither, and he has had several Conferences, with the Emperor's Ministers, who have affured him of his Imperial Majesty's Satisfaction with the Proceedings of the Circle with the Proceedings of that Circle, and their readiness to concur with him in those Measures that tend to the Safery and Welfare of the Empire and the Proceedings of the pire, and that nothing shall be wanting in him that may be necessary for securing them effechually from the Attempts of the Elector of Bavaria, or any other Enemy. It is faid that Prince Ragozzi, who was convicted some time fince of a Conspiracy against the Emperor's Person, but made his Escape into Poland, is at present in the Budziack, and endeavours to perswade the Tartars of that Country to make an Inroad into Transilvanis, but that the Ottoman Porte will by no means permit it, being resolved strictly to oble we the Treaty of Carlowitz, and to maintain a good Friendship and Correspondence with the Emperor.

Ratisbome, Febr. 12. The Bavarian Minister

at the Imperial Diet endeavours to palliate the Elector his Mafter's possessing himself of Newbourg, alledging, That he has done it with no other Intention than to secure that Pass, till the Safety of his Country on that fide is otherwise provided for; and that, as a further Proof of his peaceable Disposition, he intends to leave all Things in that Placinin the present Condition, and neither to more the Elector Palatine in his Revenues and Jurisdiction, nor the Electoress Dowager (who has lived there for some time) in her Residence. The Forces of the Allies which have been employed in the Attack of the Castle of Traerbach have turned that Siege into Blockade; A great part of that Castle is ruined by their Bombs, and it is not doubted but the Garison will soon be obliged to surrender, fince the Forces which the French had got together near Saargemunde, instead of attempting to relieve it, which was supposed to be their Defign, have joined their other Troops near Strasbargh; after which they marched together up the Rhine, taking with them a Train of Artil-lery, which had been got ready in that City; Upon Notice whereof, the Confederate Forces in those Parts are drawing together in a Body, in order to observe the Enemy's Motions.

Cologne, Febr. 20. The Pruffian Forces which lay about Rhinberg are marched towards Guender, in order to post themselves about that Place, and to friengthen the Garifon. Several Regi-ments of the Forces of the Allies, which were quartered in this Archbishoprick and in the Country of Juliers, and the Naighbourhood of Air Li Chapelle, are advanced near to Bon, and it is faid they are to be joined by more Troops, to the number of 10 or 12000 Men, and are to march towards the Upper Rhine. Hunburgh, Febr 20. Our last Accounts from. Warfaw fay, the King of Sweden has taken his Quarters within two Leagues of that Place, and has fent thither a Detachment of 1500 Men, for the Security of the Cardinal Primate and the other Senators that are come to confult with him, whose number is but finall, and is not I kely to increase. The Letters from Lishuania confirm the News we had received, That a confiderable number of Muscovite Troops were entred into that great Dutchy, and add, that they were marching directly into Poland, and were to be joined by some Saxon Troops. Some Advices from Danizick fay, the Cardinal Primate of Poland is dead, which, if it should prove true, would occasion a very great Change in the Affairs of that Kingdom, much to the King of Poland's Advantage. They write from Hanover, that the Dutchel's Dowager of Courland would go from thence the 20th Instant, in order to return to Berlin, and that the Queen of Pruffia in-tended to continue at the Court of Hanover about a week longer.
