Francfort, Feb. 21. The Imperial Forces are every where in motion, in order to prevent the French from putting in execution any Designs they may have had in view when they passed the Rhine: Six Imperial Regiments which were quartered near Raftad, are marched towards Nordlingen, for the Security of that Place, which it was thought the Elector of Bavaria might attack: Six Regiments of the Elector Palatine's Forces are marched towards Haguenau, to give the French a Diversion; and it is said part of the Forces that lay before the Castle of Traerbach are to march into Lorrain, in order to make another Diversion on that side. This day we received Advice, That the French Forces commanded by the Marshal de Villars are set down before the Fort of Kehl.

Paris, Feb. 23. The French King is at present at Marli, but returns to morrow to Verfailles: He has appointed a Review of his French and Smifs Guards to be made at Marli the 5th of the next Month; and the Draughts which are to be made out of them, in order to be sent to Flanders, will begin their March the 7th. All the Military Officers who had Leave to come home, are ordered to repair to their respective Commands by the 15th. It is said, that the Sieur Julien, who commands a Body of French Troops in Languedoc, had lately an Engagement with a Detachment of the Malecontents of the Severmes, and that he obliged them to quit the Field, having killed 100, wounded about the same number, and taken 60 Prisoners. We have received Advice of the Marshal de Montrevel's Arrival at Nismes, who is to have the chief Command of the Forces that are to be employed in Suppresting those People; and it is faid that he has also been engaged with them, but the Particulars of this second Action are not yet made publick. A Courier came this week from the French Army in Italy, but brings no News, the Season being so bad, that it prevents all manner of Action between the Forces on both fides. By another Courier we have Advice of the Marshal de Villars's having passed the Rhine, with an Army of 20000 Men; and that he had invested the Fort of Kehl over-against Strasbourg. They write from Madrid, That they are making new Levies in that Kingdom, for the better Defence of their Coasts; bus that these Forces are such, that lit-tle Dependance can be had on them. There are tle Dependance can be had on them. great Disputes at the Court of Spain between the Cardinal d'Estrees and the Spanish Grandees, who have underhand follicited this Court to recall him; but there is little likelihood that their De-

him; but there is little likelihood that their Defire will be complied with.

Hague, Feb. 27. N. S. Most of the General Officers, who are sent for to assist at a Council of War, are arrived, and the rest are daily expected, except Monsieur d'Auverquerque, who, upon Advice that the Marshal de Tallard has got together 10000 Men near Triers, and seems to have a Design of relieving the Cassie of Traerbach, is marched that way with 6000 Horse, in order to observe him, and will speedily be joined by our linantly, which was quartered in the Countries of Juliers and Cologue. The 15 Battaliens which are ordered to the Upper Rhine are marching thicher with all possible Diligence, and Directions are given for 5 more to follow them. These Troops are to guard the Lines near Weissemburg, most of the Forces having been drawn out of them by Prince Lewis of Baden, in order to form an Army to make head against the French Forces commanded by the Marshal de Villars.
