The Commissioners will not make this concession in favour of any candidate who has missed any of his chances of competing through his own action. Nor will the concession be used to replace any chance which a candidate has missed through any cause (other than service overseas) outside his own

2. Sex.—Both men and women are eligible, but women will not ordinarily be appointed to posts in the Admiralty or to the Immigration Service of the Home Office.

3. Service.—Candidates must either
(a) be serving on the 1st August, 1950, in an established situation in the General Clerical Class or in the Departmental Clerical Class of the Valuation Office of the Board of Inland Revenue with a certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners;

(c) if they were rejected on medical grounds for established appointment, must be serving on the 1st August, 1950, on the established conditions of the General Clerical Class or of the Departmental Clerical Class of the Valuation Office of the Board of Inland Revenue except for sick leave and

(d) be serving on the 1st August, 1950, in the India Audit Office, the Office of the Receiver for the Metropolitan Police District, the Office of the Crown Agents for the Colonies, or Trinity House in clerical posts to which they were admitted as a result of a competition held by the Civil Service Commissioners for the Clerical Classes of the Civil Service

Members of the General Clerical Class who have been accepted for transfer to Branch B of the Foreign Service are not eligible.

- 4. Number of Attempts.—No candidate may compete in more than three Limited Competitions under Normal Regulations.
- 5. Health and Character.—Successful candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners as to their health and character.
- 6. Examination.—The candidate will undergo written examination consisting of papers in English and Arithmetic, a General Paper, and a test of General Intelligence.

Of the candidates who obtain the highest marks Of the candidates who obtain the highest marks in the written examination a certain number, to be fixed by the Commissioners, will be summoned to an interview at which the Interviewing Board will award each candidate a mark for his or her record and personal qualities. The Department of each candidate summoned to interview will be asked to supply a confidential report and this will be taken into account by the Interviewing Board.

The final order of merit will be determined by combining the marks for written examination and interview.

7. Assignment.—The Commissioners will decide to which Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service, but regard will be paid, so far as vacancies permit, to the previous Departmental experience of the candidates and to the wishes of Departments for the assignment of to the wishes of Departments for the assignment of particular candidates who have served under them, and the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account.

8. Fee.—A fee of 7s. 6d, is payable by all candidates. This must be sent with the application form, and is not returnable in any circumstances.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that a competition will be held under the above Regulations; the written examination will commence on the 15th August, 1950.
