

upon the farther Measures which the Republick is to enter into in this Conjunction. These Letters add, That Orders were given for augmenting the Crown Army, and for its joining with the Lithuanian and Saxon Forces; That the Great had promised to supply the Republick with considerable Sums of Money for carrying on the War, and to make a great Diversion in Livonia; That great Stores of Provisions; and a good Train of Artillery, were preparing at Oudowa for the Muscovite Army, which is to have its Rendezvous there this Spring, in order, as is said, to besiege Narva; That they expected shortly to hear of some Action between the Swedes and the King of Poland's Forces in Lithuania; And that the News we have lately had, of the Town of Zamosky's being taken by the Swedes, proves a groundless Report. They write from Warsaw of the 23d Instant, That Mr. Robinson, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Minister, was returned thither, having had Audience of the King of Sweden between Jacobowitz and Lewarowa, and that the King was expected at Warsaw in few days; That the Saxon Troops were increased to a number near equal to the Swedes, upon whom they often make Excursions, as far as Praeg and Warsaw; That the Swedes were going to make a Bridge over the Weysell at this last Place, in order to pass over that River with a good Body of Forces; And that in all appearance we shall hear of a Battel on that side in a short time, if both Parties do not speedily resolve to enter into Negotiation. Some Advices from Danzick say, That the Cardinal Primate had been seized with a fit of Apoplexy, and was dangerously ill; and that the Saxons, at the taking of the Castle of Lycozin from the Swedes, had found there a good quantity of Ammunition, and divers Pieces of Canon, some of which they had lost in the Battel which they fought with the Swedes the last Summer. Letters from Riga say, That a Body of Muscovites had defeated a considerable Party of Swedes between Narva and Dorpt, and was marching towards this last Place.

Hague, April 6. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough returned hither the 2d Instant from visiting the several Garisons, and intends in 3 or 4 days to go to Maftricht, and from thence to proceed towards Bonn, in order to besiege that Place, for which all the necessary Preparations are made, and the Forces, whereof the Army to be employed in this Enterprize, and that which is to cover the Siege, are to be composed, are marching on all sides to their respective Rendezvous. Several Treaties are finished for taking more Foreign Troops into the Service of the Emperor and the States, and 3 new Regiments are raising at Liege, which, with those that are expected from England, will increase the number of the English and Dutch Forces by 20000 Men. Letters from Nuremberg and Ratisbonne of the 29th past, say, the Imperial Army commanded by the Count de Saurau, and that of the Elector of Bavaria, had been two days in light, and cannonading each other.

Deale, March 31. Rear-Admiral Beaumont has hoisted his Blue Flag on the Mizzen-top of Her Majesty's Ship the Mary in the Downes. This day Her Majesty's Ship the Expedition arrived here from Barbadoes, and under her Convoy the Rook Gally, the Ring-Sun, the China Merchant, the Martha, the Scipio and the Harve, from the East-Indies, but last from Barbadoes.

St. James's, April 2. Her Majesty has been pleased to create Arthur St. Leger Esq; a Baron and Viscount of the Kingdom of Ireland, by the Name and Title of Baron of Killmayden, in the County of Waterford, and Viscount of Downrayl, in the County of Cork, in the said Kingdom.
