

Received Letter to the Estates General, dated in the
Camp the 25th of April, at 9 in the morning.

To High and Mighty Lords,

The 1st Letter of the 2nd Instant gave your High and
Mighty Provinces an account of what passed some time
ago, when the 15 Battalions of your Troops under my
Command arrived in the Lines between Strasbourg and
Bâle. The 2d, the enemy advanced to Constance or
Cologne, and in the evening made a very furious attack on
the side of the Village of Rieden, whereon the Battalion
of Alsace was posted, with five Palatine Troops, and
some Imperial Horse and Dragoons; but that Post was so
well maintained, that the Enemy could not possess them-
selves of it. On 24th, by break of day, the Enemy's
whole Army advanced in order of Battle before our Lines,
and renewed their attack upon the Post of Rieden 5 sever-
al times, but were repulsed, but Highness the Prince of Bâle,
who was present in the middle
of the battle, caused the Troops in those Posts to be ex-
tremely sharp and ready for Service. The remainder of that
day was spent in skirmishing, and the Enemy durst not
make any other considerable Attack. And thus amongst
the English, but a day after Constance, the very end of their
marching was reached from the said Islands.

Our Lord, either by the help of the Enemy's Cannon, or
of their own Arms, is very incomparably superior to
Colonel Tuck, of the Regiment of Wiltshire, who, being
a Cannon-fitter, and Major Dick, of the same Regiment,
was very much wounded. Lieutenant-Colonel Gots and
Arms; and as for the German soldiers, I am confident
that one of the sides is better than the other, up to 100
Men; The garrison has been sent to it as a reinforcement, because
the 15 Battalions take up a large extent of ground,
and that body of Veterans, Bessars and Rütingens, are per-
fected for offensive War.

These Troops have been 8 days and as many nights al-
most continually under their Arms, and working with little
intermission to improve themselves; So that I expect
not but his Highness the Prince of Bâle will be entirely
satisfied with their Behavior.

The Count de Gots, Envoy from the Emperor to
the States, has also received an Express from Prince
Lewis, with this welcome News. We hear further,
That the Marshal de Tellier had joined the Marshal
de Villiers before the Action began, and thereby increas-
ed his Army to 20000 men, whereas Prince
Lewis had not 18000, and was in great want of Artillery.
The French carried off their dead, so that
the number of them cannot be, certainly known; Their
Loss without doubt is very considerable.
Great numbers of the Enemy have since deserted,
not being able to endure any longer the Hardships
they are constrained to, as well by their continual
Marches, as by the want of Provisions and other
Necessaries. Our Troops begin to draw together near
Maastricht, but are hitherto only cantoned in the
Villages near that Place, the French Forces in the Nether-
lands continuing to gage, that there is yet no occasion
for their encamping. The English forces will begin to
move from their several Garrisons in a day or two.
Letters from France own the Marshal de Villiers having
been repelled in his Attacks on the German Lines,
and obliged to give over his Design of forcing them.
They confirm the Accusations we have lately received
of the Successes of the Canadians against the French
King's Forces; and that their numbers increase daily;
And add, That the Marshal de Mentrevel had not only
dismayed the Burglers of Kinsay, but had caused the
Hauties of all the new Converts there to be distinguished
by a piece of Tin hinged upon their Doors, with an
Inscription, which looking as though there was some
very dangerous Design against them, many were fled to
the Savoyards, and had joined the Comtaus. Some Letters
say the City of Bordeaux, and the whole Province
of Guienne, intend to pay the Capitation Tax, and
are disposed to a general Insurrection.

Worthington, April 22. The Parliament met
this day, in pursuance to their last Prorogation:
His Grace the Duke of Buckingham and Normanby
was introduced into the House of Peers by
their Graces the Dukes of Richmond and Ormond;
and the Rt. Hon. the Lord Granville, the Lord
Gates, and the Lord Conway, were likewise in-
troduced by the Rt. Hon. the Lord La Warr
and the Lord Dartmouth, and were seated in
their respective Places, Sir Henry St. George Kt.
Clarendon, officiating in this Ceremony as Gar-
rister King of Arms. After which the Commons
being sent for up by the Gentleman Usher of
the Black Rod, Her Majesty's Commission to sev-
eral Lords of Her Most Honourable Privy
Council was read; and in pursuance thereof
the Lord Keeper further Prorogued the Parlia-
ment to Tuesday the 2d of June next.
