Falmouth, May 20. Yesterday about 9 in the
morning, Sir George Rose, with His Majesty's
Fleet under his Command, appeared off our
Harbour, standing to the Westward, and sent in
the Signal Flag for Pilots, by which we have
an Account, That he is very much recovered of
his Indisposition, and was proceeding on his in-
tended Voyage.

Weymouth May 16. Admiral Cawdill, on board
Her Majesty's Ship the Bedford, with Vice Ad-
miral Fairburn, on board Her Majesty's Ship the
St. George, sailed from Portsmouth the 9th instant,
and arrived at Plymouth the 11th, in order to have
taken upon him the Command of Her Majesty's Fleet,
in the room of Sir George Rose, who had
been so much indisposed with the Gout and Fever,
that he doubted whether he should be in a
Condition to proceed on the Service, and therefore
had obtained Her Majesty's Leave to come
on Shore: But Admiral Cawdill, upon his Ar-
rival at Plymouth, hearing that Sir George with
the Fleet was pasted by that Place to the West-
ward, he did not proceed any farther, and is
returning.
