He Enemy has been of late more then formerly bulie about thele parts, appearing often and in great numbers both of Horle and Foot, particularly upon Sunday the 27th paft in the forenoon, they laid a confiderable Ambush under Cambridge-Fort, which was prefently discovered by our Sentinels, and the Enemy beaten off by our Great Guns with fome visible loss ; the wednesday following they appeared neet St. Annes Lane, but with no better fuccels then before. On Friday the 2d inftant about 7 in the morning they laid a great Ambufh within the Palifados of the weltern Cave, with intention as we supposed to have intercepted our Guards upon the Relieving, which being done by the Governours Order but once in a fortnight, defested them of their defign, but the Enemy be-ing difcovered by the Barking of Dogs which are pur-polely kept there by our people and foldiers, with much teadines appear'd with their Arms and Granados to oppole them ; which they taking notice of immediately withdrew, but not withour many fhot and some men killed, whom they were seen to drag away between the Palifados and the lea; the fame morning between 9 and 10, they appeared on the other fide of the Town between Fames and Monmouth Forts, feeming to have fome intention to affault Fames Fort, whereupon the Lieurenant Governour ordered about 150 Foot under the Command of

Fairborze to march to the Line between the two Fort, where they entertain'd the Enemy with their fron for the space of an hour, and forced them to retire, as is believed with confiderable loss of men, and some persons of quality, as is guessied by the Peals of shot which were heard from them that Evening, supposedly at their Funeral.

After this we heard no farther from the Enemy till the 28th instant, when a confiderable party were feen to rife from behind Moxfex-hill neer Fames Fort; who drew to the Sandhility-nd todged themfelves between Fames and Monmonth Fort; whereupon the Lieutenant Governour again, commanded . Fairbornewith a good party of Melqueteers to the Line, where began a warm difpure for above an hout after, whereupon the Enemy with weathidrable lofs retired, the Gartifon receiving nor hart, but ohely by the death of one Corporal.

. A French Saylia from Angilla tells us, that the Enemy is making great preparations of Ladders and other infirmments of war, but gives out they intend for Mamora, but if converted lither, they will find the Garrison in a very good pofture to entertain them.

, The people of Sally-lays 5 or 6 men of war abroad at leas who have lately formewhat diffurbed the Trade, and taken forme confiderable prizes, but 'tisbelieved may be in little time reduced, and the feas cleared from their infolencies.

Faintowith, August 11. On Munday last passed before this Harbor 4 or 5 great ships to the Eastwards, supposed from the Streights, the 10th came in the Robert of Plymouth, with leveral persons, passengers from Kinfale in Breland.

A vessel of Apson which went out from this Hisrbour on Munday last, bound for France, was yesterday put in again by contrary winds, informing that about 10 or 12 Leagues off the Lizard, she-was chased for two.hours by a

Lisbonne, July 22. This Court is much fatisfy'd with the fafe return of the Fleet which was employed under the Command of the Count de Prado to the Caftle of Angra in the Zerceras their paffage thither was long and tedious, being kept at fea above 27 days, coming to Anchor in the Bay of Angra, the Conde fent to the Governour of the Caftle and the Magisfrates to come on board him, which they complying with, the Conde declared to them the occafion of his Voyage, and the fubltance of h's inftructions the next day they came again on board with the Council of 24, and obliged themfelves to fubmit to fuch Orders as they fhould receive from him.
