intent to cut off our Communication with the Country of *Tiro.* The 24th at night he advanced towards *Pontenolino*, and sent a Detachment to attack that Post; but our Forces there kept continually firing upon the Enemy with great and small Arms in such a manner, that they were obliged to retire before break of day; and they have since begun to intrench themselves at some distance from thence: What they intend to do further is not yet known, but all possible Precautions are taken on our side to disappoint their Designs. The Prince of *Vaudemont* came lately to the Body of the Enemy which lies near the *Secchia*, and caused their Camp to be removed nearer to the River; whereupon a Battery of several Pieces of Cannon was with great diligence raised on our side of the River, which began the 25th, betimes in the morning, to play upon the Enemy with so much fury, that they were forced to leave their Camp with such Precipitation, that many were seen to run away with only their Shirts on. General *Vaubonne* marched yesterday with a Detachment, consisting of 300 Horse, 700 Foot, and *Poul Diack's* Regiment of *Hussars*, and passed the *Po* at *Sernido*, being ordered to advance beyond the *Adige*; upon what Design is not yet known.

Venice, June 1. N. S. Since the *French* Forces being entered into the Territories of this Republick, Expresses have arrived daily from *Verona* with Accounts of the Disorders they commit, cutting down and destroying the Corn and Hay, and exacting Wine and other Provisions from the Inhabitants; whereupon the Senate has been extraordinarily assembled, and they sent an Express two days ago to the *French* Court to complain of these Proceedings. The *French* Ambassador was also sent for yesterday to the Colledge, and acquainted therewith, and desired to represent it to his Master. A Regiment of Foot which was ordered to the *Levant* is countermanded, and sent to *Verona* to reinforce that Garrison, and more Forces will shortly be sent that way. The Count *de Trautsmadord* is gone from hence to his Command in the Imperial Army under the Count *de Staremberg*, where we hear Prince *Eugene* and several other Officers of Note are speedily expected from *Germany*, with a good number of Recruits, whereof 2000 are already arrived at *Trent*, and 4000 more are said to be on their March. General *Vaubonne*, with a Detachment of 1000 Horse and Foot, and a Regiment of *Hussars*, is advanced to *St. Michael* in the *Veronese*; and we hear the Imperialists have sent another Body towards *Cologna*, and a third to *Casselbaldo*, to keep open their Communication with the Country of *Tiro*, and facilitate the coming up of these Succours. The *French* have made several Attempts on *Pontenolino*, and other of the *German* Posts, in all which they have been baffled, notwithstanding they are much superior in number; and we are told that in one of them the Grand Prior, Brother to the Duke of *Vendosme*, was killed, and that they have lost besides 5 or 600 Men.

Ratisbonne, June 11. On the first Instant the Marshal *de Villars*, with the whole Army under his Command, came within a Mile of *Ulm*, and pitched his Camp between *Gokingen* and *Starren*. The 2d the Marshal came to *Ulm*, where he was received without the Gates by Colonel *Pettendorf*, the Governor, at the head of the *Bavarian* Horse, and was saluted with a triple Discharge of the Cannon round the Town, and after having viewed the Fortifications of that Place, returned the same evening to his Quarters. The 4th a Body of 9000 *Bavarians*, commanded by General *Weichel* and the Count *de Namastrole*, which were drawn together near *Auberg*, marched towards *Rathenberg*, upon whose Approach the *Franconian* Troops thought fit to abandon that Blockade, and retired to join the Detachment under General *Aufsas*, and they are now encamped together before *Nuremberg*, to the Number of 15000 Men, regular Troops and Militia. The Margrave of *Bareith* and his Lady are also come to *Nuremberg*, where they design to continue, to encourage the Inhabitants, who are making Preparations for a vigorous Defence; for it was given out that the Elector of *Bavaria* would very soon put himself at the head of his Troops, in order to attack *Nuremberg*, while the Marshal *de Villars* should besiege *Nordlingen*, whose Army was for that purpose to march the 4th from his Camp near *Ulm*: But in all probability these Resolutions are altered; for by our Advices from *Ulm* of the 7th the *French* were not yet marched, nor did they even talk of marching.

Frankfort, June 13. The Duke of Burgundy Arrived the 8th Instant in the French Army commanded by the Marshal de Tallard, and is marching towards Landau; tho' some Advices say that Army is not near so strong as is given out, and that they are not in a Condition to undertake the Siege of that Place, which is provided with a good Garrison, and with all Necessaries for its Defence. Prince Lewis of Baden is marched with the best part of his Troops to join the Count de Strum, leaving only the Dutch and some Palatine Forces in the Lines at Stolhoffen, under the Command of General Thungen, who we hear is advanced with a Detachment towards Fort Louis.

Cologne, June 15. The Forces of the Circle of Westphalia are drawing together near Bonn, in order to march towards the Upper Rhine; and a considerable Reinforcement of the Forces of the Allies is also moving that way.

Hamburg, June 15. Letters from Riga of the 31st past confirm the taking of the Nyen-Schanz the 14th of that Month by the Muscovites, and add, that the Garrison marched out with all the Marks of Honour, and was conducted to Wyborg. The Muscovites afterwards marched towards Narva, and were advanced within three Leagues of that Place. Letters from Warsaw of the 29th give an Account, That the Forces of the Crown were encamped at Koko, and now and then sent out Parties to observe the Motions of the Swedes; and the Lithuanian Army lay at Wiszkow. Some Advices from Graudentz of the 4th Instant say, the King or Sweden had altered his Resolution of carrying on the Siege of Thorn, and intended to march back again with his Army towards the Greater Poland.

From the Camp at Hannoh, June 18. The 12th Instant our Right Wing made a great Forage near Warne, with a Guard of 1000 Horse, under the Command of the Count de Noyelles Major-General, and Brigadier-General Wood, and 1500 Foot, commanded by Brigadier-General Witzler; and though our Men foraged within sight of the Enemy's Camp, yet they did not think fit to give them the least Disturbance. A small Party of Horse and Dragoons being sent the 13th at night to Patrolle between the two Armies, met the next morning early with one of the Enemy's Parties of about 50 Horse, commanded by a Captain, a Lieutenant, two Cornets, and a Quarter-Master, of whom they killed two, and took 9, with their Horses, and one of the Cornets. The 14th, about 3 in the morning, a Party of 140 Horse and Dragoons, commanded by a Danish Lieutenant-Colonel, being upon the Patrolle between the two Armies, fell in with one of the Enemy's Parties of 400 Horse and Dragoons; the latter being dismounted, and in Ambush in the Corn, in the very same Place where we beat them the morning before; and only a small Party of them appearing, 2 Cornet and 20 of our Men attacked them, being seconded by the Lieutenant-Colonel with the rest of our Party, but falling into the Ambush, our Men were at first disordered, and in the Continuation the Lieutenant-Colonel, with a Captain, Cornet, and 12 Men, were taken, and 8 killed; However our People immediately rallied, and notwithstanding their inequality in number, obliged the Enemy to retire: The Prisoners they took are sent to Brussels, as we have sent ours to Maltricht, there being no Cartel for the Exchange of them. That day his Grace the Duke of Marlborough and Monsieur d'Adversquerque reviewed part of the Horse of the Left Wing, as they did the rest the next day, and found them all in a very good Condition. The Count de Wratislaw, who is returning home from the Court of England, where he has resided with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, being come from Dusseldorp as far as Liege to wait upon the Duke of Marlborough, his Grace went thither the 15th, and having dined with him and the Count de Zinzendorf, returned to the Camp, and this day they both came hither to return his Grace's Visit, and after Dinner went back to Liege, from whence the Count de Wratislaw intends to proceed forthwith to Vienna. Yesterday our Right Wing made a great Forage along the Maas near Huy. Both our Army and the French continue in the same Camps, the latter being posted in the opening between the Rivers Meuse and Jaar, where they are very strongly entrenched, and have made several Batteries in the Village of Thourime in their Front.

Hague, June 19. N. S. Monsieur d'Opdam went from hence yesterday morning to take upon him the Command of the Confederate Forces which are encamped near Bergenopzoon, so that we may shortly expect to hear upon what Service they are to be employed. The last Post from Germany brought Letters from Landau, giving an Account, That the Duke of Burgundy's Army was advanced within a League of that Place with 70 Pieces of Cannon, and they hourly expected to be invested; And that the Elector of Bavaria finding the Allies had taken such Precautions for the Security of Nuremberg, that it would be impossible for him to accomplish his Design upon that Town, he had countermanded the Preparations which were making for that Enterprise, and it was not yet known what he would attempt further. We have an Account by the way of Switzerland, That the Number of the Malecontents in the Seventies increases daily, and that they have lately defeated some Troops which were in Garrison at Alets and Andule, and have obtained several other Advantages over the French King's Forces.

Bristol, June 9. The Princess Pink of this Place arrived here this day in 6 weeks from Carolina, having left that Plantation very Healthy, and in great Plenty of all Things. The News Merchants of this Place, Charles Rynton Master, is just now arrived from Nova, having been about 11 weeks in his Passage, without meeting any Ship at Sea.
