The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the approval of the Lords Commissioners of H.M. Treasury, viz.:—

RECRUITMENT UNDER NORMAL REGULATIONS OF RESEARCH ASSISTANT GRADE II, OR RESEARCH ASSISTANT GRADE I IN THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF ANTIQUITIES OF SCOTLAND, EDINBURGH.

1. (i) Both men and women may compete under these Regulations.

(ii) Married women who have formerly been established civil servants and have drawn marriage gratuity (other than those who resigned compulsorily on marriage and whose resignation took

effect before 15th October, 1946, or who are widows or divorced, or who are separated from their husbands, or whose husbands suffer without hope of recovery from total physical or mental incapacity) will not be eligible for appointment under these regulations unless they undertake to refund on appointment the marriage gratuity paid.

2. (i) Candidates for appointment to Grade II must be at least 22 and under 26 years of age on 1st January, 1951. But

(a) candidates who have served or are serving on a regular (including a regular short-service) engagement in H.M. Forces may, for this purpose, deduct the period of such service from their actual age;

(b) candidates who have served in any established post to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, or who have served on established conditions except for sick leave and pension in a post to which such a Certificate would normally apply, may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service.

(ii) Candidates for appointment to Grade I must be at least 26 years of age on 1st January, 1951. The Commissioners have not specified an upper age limit for appointment to this grade. In general, however, Government Departments require a reasonable period of service from persons newly appointed to the Civil Service; and accordingly the Commissioners reserve the right to give weight to this factor in considering any candidates for this post who are over 50 years of age.

3. Candidates must be British subjects. They must also satisfy one of the following conditions:—

(a) If natural-born British subjects, they must either

(i) have at least one parent who is or was at death a British subject; or

(ii) have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(b) If naturalised British subjects they must have resided in His Majesty's dominions and/or been employed elsewhere in the service of the Crown for at least five years out of the last eight years preceding the date of their appointment.

(c) If not qualified under (a) or (b) of this paragraph they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with His Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.

4. A person upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

5. Candidates must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they have received such systematic education, general or technical, or general and technical together as in the Commissioners' opinion fits them for the post.

A University degree (preferably in an Arts subject), the Museum Association's Diploma and a knowledge of several modern languages are desirable additional qualifications.

6. Those candidates who appear from their application forms to have the best qualifications will be summoned to appear before a Selection Board in Edinburgh which will recommend to the Commissioners for appointment the candidate who appears to be most suitable. The Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of education and experience, any recommendation that they may receive from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work in the past, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview, and on their estimation of the above evidence they will frame their recommendations. The decision of the Commissioners will be final.

7. Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons (except as referees to be named by them in their application form) will disqualify them for appointment. The
