(d) Documentary Films.

Organising ability combined with knowledge of, and interest in, the use of documentary films as a medium of publicity and of their production.

(e) Social Research.

The Senior Information Officer post requires first hand experience in the organisation of, and reporting on, social research with ability to handle statistical material and to devise research projects in new fields: some knowledge of the research requirements of Government Departments would be an advantage.

The Assistant Information Officer posts re-quire experience of social research combined with special knowledge of one of the social sciences or of any of the processes employed in preparing social surveys or in handling and analysing the results of survey enquiries (i.e. coding, computing and tabulating).

 (f) Preparation of Reference Material. Education of University standard and experience in research; preparation of reference papers and/or basic information for lectures, broadcasts, and reports, dealing with political, economic, and allied subjects; knowledge of source material and ability to write factually and concisely. and concisely.

(g) Illustration Research. Experience in subject and picture research for illustration and of the selection and use of photographs for information purposes.

(h) Advertising. Experience of poster or direct mail adver-tising or of general advertising agency work. (i) Printing Processes.

Knowledge of printing processes, paper, and estimating costs for high quality printing or experience as a reader in the printing trade.

Special knowledge or experience is desirable in certain Departments as follows:-

Admiralty-background of experience in the Navy. Colonial Office—knowledge and preferably first-hand experience of the Colonies or of the Colonial Press.

Ministry of Food—(Information Officer post) knowledge of dietetics and nutritional matters. Ministry of Health—knowledge of legislation and policy in regard to health. National Savings Committee—Experience in budgeting

budgeting.

Scottish Home Department-knowledge of Scottish social and industrial affairs.

of Ministry Supply-knowledge of industrial journalism.

Treasury—thorough understanding of economic affairs and (for the Senior Information Officer post) preferably an academic qualification in economics.

5. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Commis-sioners as to their health and character.

6. Competition. The Commissioners may summon to appear before a Selection Board all who are found to be prima facie eligible, or may, if they see fit, summon only those whose qualifications and experience are considered to be most suitable. The Selection Board will take into consideration the candidates' record of experience and education, any recommendation from persons named by the candidates as having direct knowledge of their work, and the personal qualities of the candidates as shown at the interview; and on their estimation of all the above facts they will frame their recommendations. The Board may recommend a candidate for a grade or type of post other than that for which he has applied. 'The decision of the Commissioners will be final.'
7. Candidates trained as Teachers.

7. Candidates trained as Teachers.

Persons upon whose training for the occupation of teacher public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g. the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Assignment. The Commissioners will decide to which Govern-ment Department each successful candidate is to be

assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in accord-ance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account into account.

9. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

10. Fee. A successful candidate will be required to pay a fee of £1 10s. 0d. before the issue of a certificate of qualification for appointment.
