*Clefsee in the Hand of Fubmen, July 7. N. S.*

**T**HE King of Denmark having spent some time at *Ringsied*, to review the regular Forces and Militia encamped there, (which thereupon were sent back to their Quarters on the 3d Instant) his Majesty proceeded to the Island of *Laland*, where he reviewed in the Plain of *Murboe* the Battalions of *Falkter* and *Laland*, and came thither yesterday about noon. After Dinner his Majesty went out to the little Camp formed near this Place, consisting of the two *Fubmen* Regiments of Horse, which amount to 814 Men, and of 2626 Militia, whereof 442 are Dragoons, and the rest Foot, and took a Review of them, and this day they were mustered by the Commissary at War: In a day or two the King will continue his Progress towards *Holstein*.

*Frankfort, July 8.* The Duke of Burgundy having made an end of demolishing our Lines between *Croonweiffembourg* and *Lustembourg*, the Army under his Command is marched to *Hatten*, in their way to *Fort Louis*. It is said that the best part of the Horse is to be sent to the *Low Countries*, and that the Marshal *de Tallard* with the rest of that Army will continue near the *Rhine*, to observe the Confederate Forces under the Command of General *Thungen*, which are posted along that River, between *Philipsbourg* and *Sto'boffen*. Some Advices add, That the Duke of Burgundy himself was gone from the French Army to *Strasbourg*, and would speedily return to *France*. Our Letters from *Swabia* say, That on the 3d Instant Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* came with the Imperial Army under his Command in sight of the French Army under the Marshal *de Villars*, whereupon they immediately fired 3 Cannon-shot, as a Signal for all their Parties which were abroad to retire to their Camp; however one of them of 100 Horse fell in with our Troops, and were all killed or taken Prisoners; and the Marshal *de Villars* coming out soon after with a strong Party of Horse to view our Army, one of our advanced Guards fired upon them, and 6 Persons that were with him were killed, among whom is said to be an Officer of Note, and the Marshal himself narrowly escaped being taken Prisoner. Prince *Lewis* pitched his Camp within half a League of the Enemy, and expects the coming up of 6000 Foot, who are marching to join him from the Margrave of *Bareith's* Army, which lay near *Donawert*; after which he will endeavour to force the Enemy's Camp. The French appear very apprehensive of it, and the Marshal *de Villars* has sent 3 Expresses successively to the Elector of *Bavaria* for succours, who thereupon has ordered part of his Forces to march back from the Country of *Tyrol* with all possible diligence to reinforce him; but it is to be hoped they will arrive too late. Some Letters say, the Elector himself is come to *Donawert*.

*Cologne, July 10.* The 3 Regiments of Horse, and 6 Battalions of Foot, of the King of *Prussia's* Forces, which were lately drawn from the Blockade of *Gelder*, in order to reinforce the Imperial Army on the *Upper Rhine*, are all passed by this Place, in order to march thither; the Blockade being however still continued by 3 Regiments of Foot. The Forces of the Circle of *Westphalia*, which are also ordered to the *Upper Rhine*, consisting of 4 Battalions, 1 Regiment of Horse, and another of Dragoons, passed over the *Rhine* at *Coblentz* the 7th Instant, and continued their March the next day.

*Hamburg, July 10.* Letters from *Lublin* of the 30th past give an Account, That the Cardinal Primate took his Place the 27th in the General Diet assembled there, and then assured the King of *Poland* of his Fidelity, and endeavoured to clear himself of the Aspersions which he hath lain under, of being in the *Swedish* Interest; whereupon he was admitted to kiss his Majesty's Hand, and afterwards took a new Oath of Fidelity to him and to the Republick: A great many Members of the Diet seemed in their Speeches inclined to declare War

in the Name of the Republick against the King of *Sweden*, which made it believed that Assembly would be adjourned for a fortnight, and in the mean time a Deputation would be sent that King, to have his final Answer, in relation to the Advances made for setting on foot a Negotiation of Peace between the two Crowns. The *Swedish* Army continued near *Thorn*, and a Body of about 18000 Men of the Forces of the Crown and of *Lithuania*, and some *Saxon* Troops, were marching that way in order to observe them.

*From the Camp at Vorfelaer, July 12.* The Duke of *Northborough* returned thither the 10th Instant from the great Council of War which was lately held at *Bergenopzoom*: His Grace was entertained there by the Deputies of the States General, as he had been at *Breda* by the Governor of that Place. The Hereditary Prince of *Hesse*, Monsieur *Doff*, the Count *de Nojelles* General of the Foot, Monsieur *schalten*, and Monsieur *Buleau*, Lieutenants-General, who accompanied his Grace, and were also present in the Council of War abovementioned, are likewise returned thither. A strong Party of Horse being sent out the 10th, under the Command of Major-General *Ranzau*, to observe the Enemy, who were foraging, met with part of their Forage-Guard, whereof our Men took two Captains and 18 Troopers, with their Horses; and the Prisoners were sent this morning to *Breda*. The Enemy marched out of their Lines the 7th to *Samthoven*, being the same day that we came to this Ground; They have since made a small Motion to *St. Jop*, where they are now encamped.

*Amsterdam, July 13.* Letters from *Paris* of the first Instant, which came by the way of *Lorraine*, bring an Account, That the French Court had received with great Mortification the News of the Duke of *Vendosme's* Misfortune before *Offiglia*, and Monsieur *Abergotti's* Defeat near *Mirandola*; And that according to the Advices from their Army in *Italy* of the 22d past, nothing considerable had since happened, except an Action between the Body of Imperialists commanded by General *Vaubonne*, and another of the French Forces, wherein the latter were worsted. The French King has given the Regiment commanded by Monsieur *d'Espinal*, who was killed in the Action near *Mirandola*, to the Son of the Duke *a'Elbeuf*, who serves in that Army as Aid de Camp to the Duke of *Vendosme*. The French Court was then at *Milly*, and would continue there till the 14th Instant.

*Hague, July 13. N. S.* The 4 Deputies of the States General, who were present in the Council of War lately held at *Bergenopzoom*, came thither yesterday in the evening, to make their Report of what had been there resolved to the States General, who thereupon immediately met, and continued in Consultation until midnight: After their rising an Express was dispatched to the Army, and the same Deputies are to follow thither this day or to morrow. The Enemy seem to apprehend that our Troops will attempt to force their Lines, and are accordingly providing against it, having summoned the Country People within the Marquitate of *Antwerp* to repair to their Army, designing to employ them in making several new Works, for their better Defence. Monsieur *d'Opdam* arrived here yesterday from *Bergenopzoom*. The States General have sent a Deputation to Lieut. Gen. *Fagel*, who is at present here, with a Compliment, expressing their Satisfaction in his Conduct in the late Action at *Eckeren*. The Standards, Colours and Kettle-Drums, taken from the French in this Occasion were carried two days ago in Triumph to the Court, to be set up in the great Hall, as Monuments of the signal Victory which our Forces gained in so unequal a Battle. The Letters which we received this day from *Flanders* say, That Baron *Spaar* has taken the Fort of *Kilarscht*, between *Hullst* and the *Lieskenshoek*, wherein was a Garrison of 160 Men. Our Advices from *Germany* say, That the Duke of *Burgundy* was upon his return, to the French Court, and had made a Detachment of 6000 Horse from his Army to reinforce the

French Army near Amoy. Three Ships of the French Navy being advanced with the Army under the Command of the Marquis de Belleisle, the latter immediately ordered several Prizes which covered his Camp, and were sent into the Port of Amoy, which would have attacked them in their Intrenchments if a great Rain had not intervened, which obliged him to give over that thought for the present.

**Falmouth, July 3.** Her Majesty's Ships the *Orford* and the *Montague*, which were ordered to have French Privateers were cruising off the Coast, had been sent out to give them chase, came into this Port the next Instant with two Prizes, one of 14 Guns and 200 Men, and the other of 10 Guns and 100 Men, being both Privateers belonging to Dr. Adams, which they had taken near the Lizard. The Dr. is a Gentleman, Mr. Earl's Master, bound from Amoy to Linnon, per Amoy, and the other part; as did likewise the next day the *Margaret of Brains*, bound to Bristol.

**Portsmouth, July 5.** Her Majesty's Ships the *Centurion* and *Androp* came to Spithead the first Instant from the Downs, with several Coasters and Cutters under their Convoy.
