

# The London Gazette.

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Vienna, July 7. N. S.

**A** Courier arrived here yesterday from the Count de *Königl*, Lieutenant of that part of the Country of *Tirol* which lies on the River *Adige*, with Letters of the 2d Instant, giving an Account, That he and his Brother the Bishop of *Brinzen* had got together 3000 of the Inhabitants in Arms near *Clanfen*, a double Pass behind the Mount *Bremer*, which leads on one side to *Bolzano*, and so along the *Adige* to *Italy*, and on the other by the way of *Braneck* into *Carinthia*, and desiring a Reinforcement of 2000 regular Troops for the Security of that Part, in case the Elector of *Bavaria* should attempt to make himself Master of it. The Count de *Heiffer* is appointed to go that way, and to take upon him the Command of such Troops as lie dispersed in their several Quarters in those Parts. On the 2d Instant the Body of Imperial Forces commanded by the Count de *Schlick* forced the *Bavarians* from their Lines before *Friburgh*, on the Borders of the Bishoprick of *Salzburg*, and he has raised large Contributions in the Elector's Country. Letters from *Tockay* in *Hungary* say, the Count de *Caroli* being informed that the Sicur *Ragowski* had got together a Body of *Poles*, *Cossacks*, and *Tartars*, and was come with them to *Mongatz*, he thereupon marched thither with a Regiment of Horse, and some Foot, and totally routed them, having killed a great number of them, and *Ragowski* himself narrowly escaped, with the Loss of all his Baggage.

*Ratisbonne*, July 12. The Armies commanded by Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* and the Marshal de *Villars* continue in the same Camps they have done for some time, and the Imperialists have begun to intrench themselves, as the *French* have already done on their side. On the 7th Instant the strong Post and Castle of *Ehrenberg*, in the Country of *Tirol*, was surrendered to the *Bavarians*; and it is generally believed the Elector will now march to reinforce the Marshal de *Villars*. The Town of *Augsburg* has sent two of their Deputies to *Munich*, to negotiate with the Regency there about the Proposals made them by the Elector of *Bavaria*, in relation to their observing either an exact Neutrality, or admitting a *Bavarian* Garrison.

*Berlin*, July 14. On the 10th Instant the Rt. Hon. the Lord *Raby*, Envoy Extraordinary from Her Majesty of Great Britain, had publick Audience of the King or *Prussia*, being conducted in the King's Coach by Major-General *Ritton*, and the Master of the Ceremonies; after which he had Audience of the Queen and of the Prince Royal. The 12th, being his Majesty's Birth-day, he received the usual Compliments on that Occasion of the Foreign Ministers and other Persons of Quality. This day was chosen for exposing to publick View the Statue on Horseback of *Frederick William*, late Elector of *Brandenburg*, the King's Father, that is set up on our Bridge over the River *Sprey*, but had till then remained covered, which was done with great Solemnity, the Grand Marshal of the Court attending, with the 4 Heralds, the Great Officers of State, and several Knights of the Order lately instituted by his Majesty. The King's Guards, both of Horse and Foot, were drawn up on the Bridge, and in the Streets adjoining, particularly from the Castle to the Statue, and when it was uncovered, gave 3 Volleys, a triple Discharge being made at the same time of the Cannon round the Town. In the evening the Queen entertained his Majesty and the whole Court at Supper at *Luzembourg*, where they were also diverted with an Opera, a Comedy, and a Ball. The King went that night to *Schonhausen*, and intends to go shortly to *Oranienburg*.

*Frankfurt*, July 15. Our Advices from the *Upper Rhine* contain the *French* Army's being marched back towards *Fort Louis*. The Body of the forces of the Af-

lies under Major-General *Trungen* continues in the same Post on the other side of the *Rhine*. Our Advices from *Swabia* say, That Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* finding the Marshal de *Villars* too strongly intrenched to be attacked without running too great a hazard, his Highness had begun to fortify his Camp, and had raised some Batteries, in order to Cannonade the Enemy, the Camps being so near, that Skirmishes happened daily between the Out-guards of both Armies. The *French* being thus streightened on that side the *Danube*, had laid a Bridge of Boats over that River, and were supplied with Forage and Provisions from the other side; to prevent which Prince *Lewis* intended, as soon as he should be joined by the Margrave of *Bareith*, (who was come within 3 Leagues of his Camp) to send over a Detachment of 20000 Men.

*Cologne*, July 13. Four Deputies of the Chapter of this City are to go from hence to morrow to *Arensberg*, to hold a Diet of the States of *Saurlandt*. Letters from the *Upper Rhine* of the 9th Instant say, the Duke of *Burgundy* was marching towards *Strasbourg* with the *French* Army, which he would shortly leave, and return to *France*; and that the Detachment of Horse for the *Low Countries*, which has been talked of, was not yet made.

*Hamburg*, July 17. Letters from *Warsaw* of the 3d Instant give an Account, That the King of *Poland* and all the Senators had taken an Oath to promote the Interest and Advantage of the Republick to the utmost of their Abilities; That Things go well in the Diet for the King: The Cardinal Primate has been used very roughly there, and been obliged to take an Oath that he did not call in the *Swedes*, and neither had nor would give them any Assistance. They write from *Graudenz* of the 9th Instant, That the King of *Sweden* continued at *Althausen*, and his Army was still posted about *Thorn*, and seemed resolved to take that Town by Force. A Body of about 1500 of the *Polish* Troops had formed a Design to surprize 500 *Swedes*, who were in Garrison at *Strasbourg* in *Prussia*; but the latter having timely Notice of it, laid an Ambush for them, and by that means had defeated them. The King of *Denmark* came the 10th Instant from the Island of *Fynen* to *Wille* in *Jutland*, and the next day took a Review near *Jelling* of Colonel *Jegenhovens* Regiment of Militia, consisting of 2100 Men, whereof 300 are designed for Dragoons. On the 14th the King was to set out for *Wyburgh*, in order to review a Battalion there, and intended to be at *Rensbourg* by the 27th.

From the Camp at *Vortelacr*, July 19. We have an Account from *Lillo*, that Monsieur *Cueboorn* had not found a fit opportunity to attack the Fort *Bedmar*, as was expected, and that the firing mentioned in our last was at *Liere*, *Antwerp*, and the adjacent Garrisons, for the Success of the Elector of *Bavaria* in *Tirol*. Yesterday a great Convoy, consisting of about 500 Wagons, laden with Bread and other Provisions, arrived in our Camp from *Breda*. The *French* continue in their former Camp near *St. Joz*, having made several great Roads behind them, in order to a Retreat, as there may be occasion: They have likewise raised several Batteries for the Security of their Camp.

*Hague*, July 20. N. S. We are yet without any Letters directly from *Italy*, the Post in all likelihood being stoppt by the *Bavarian* Forces in *Tirol*; However there are Advices that say, That the *French* have desired the *Venetians* to deliver the City of *Vercina* into their hands, as a sure way to oblige the Imperial Forces to retire out of *Italy*, and to put an end to the War in that Country; which Demand that Republick had for some time refused, that they had given Orders for the firing out of 15 Men of War and 25 Gallies, and were making other Warlike Preparations; and it was hoped they would enter into the Interest of the Allies; whereof we expect a more certain Account.

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
