Courier arrived here yesterday from the Count de Kanigl, Lieutenant of that part of the Country of Tiral which lies on the River aid ge, with Letters of the 2d Instant, giving an Account, That he and his Brother the Bishop of Brixen had got together 3000 of the Inhabitants in Arms near Claussen, a double Pass behind the Mount Bremer, which leads on one tide to Bolzano, and so along the Adige to Indy, and on the other by the way of Braneck into Carinchia, and defiring a Reinforcement of 2000 regular Troops for the Security of that Pass, in case the Elector of Brownia should arrempt to make himself Master of it. The Count ae Heiser is appointed to go that way, and to take upon him the Command of such Troops as lie dispersed in their several Quarters in those Parts. Letters from Tecksy in Hungary say, the Count de Caroli, being informed that the Stein Ragarki had got together a Body of Palanders, Cossacks, and Tartars, and was come with them to Mongasz, he thereupon marched thither with a Regiment of Horse, and some Foot, and totally routed them, having killed a great number of them, and Ragorsky himself narrowly escaped, with the Lois of all his largage.

Ratisbume, July 12. The Armies commanded by Prince Lewis of Baden and the Marshal de Villars continue in the same Camps they have done for some time, and the Imperialists have begun to intrench themselves, as the French have already done on their side. On the 7th Instant the strong Post and Casses of the Elector will now march to reinforce the Marshal de Villars. The Town of Angibourg has sent two of their Deputies to Manich, to negociate with the Regency there about the Proposals made them by the Elector of Bavaria, in relation to their observing citier an exact Neutrality, or admitting a Bavarian Garison.

Berlin, July 14. On the 10th Instant the Rt. Hon, the Lord Raby, Envoye Extraordinary from Her Majetty of Greta Britain, had publick Audience of the King or Pruffus, being conducted in the King's Coaca by Major-General Testus, and the Masser General Majetty's Burth-day, he received the fullial Compliments on that Oceasian of the Forciga Ministers and other Persons of Quality. This day was chosen for exposing to publick View the Statue on Horseback of Frederick William, late Elector of Brandriburgh, the King's Father, that is set up on our Bridge over the River Sprey, but had till then remained covere

Franchier, July 15. Our Advices from the Upper Raine co.M. in the French Army's being marched back towards Fort Louis. The Body of the Forces of the Af-

lies under Major-General Thungen continues in the fame Post on the other side of the Rivine. Our Advices from Swabia say, That Prince Lewis of Baden studing the Marshal de Villars too strongly intrenched to be attached without running too great a hazard, his Highness had begun to fortify his Camp, and had raised some Batteries, in order to Cannonade the Enemy, the Camps being so near, that Skirshilms happened daily between the Our-guards of both Armies. In a French being thus streightened on that side the Dannbe, had laid a Bridge of Boats over that River, and were supplied with Foftreightened on that inde the Danube, had fain a bridge of Boats over that River, and were supplied with Forage and Provisions from the other side; to prevent which Prince Lewis intended; as soon as he should be joined by the Margrave of Bareirh, (who was come within 3 Leagues of his Camp) to tend over a Detachment of 20000 Men.

Hamburgh, July 17. Letters from Wurfaw of the 3d Initant give an Account, That the King Poland and all the Senators thad taken an Oath to promore the Interest and Advantage of the Republick to the utmost of their Abilities; That Things go well in the Diet for the King: The Cardinal Primate has been used very roughly there, and been obliged to take an Oath that he did not call in the Swedes, and neither flad hor would give them any Adilitance. They write from Graudeux of the 9th Instant, That the King of Sweden continued at Albaulen, and his Army was till posted about Thoorn, and seemed resolved to take that Town by Famme. A Body of about 1500 of the Polish Theops had formed a Deliga to surprise 500 Swedes, who were in Garlion at Strasbeurg in Prussa; but the latter having timely Notice of it, laid an Ambush for them, and by that means had defeated them. The King of Demark came the 10th Instant from the silland of Fubmen to Wisle in Justinal, and the next day took a Review near Jellingen of Colonel Jegenkoven's Regiment of Militia, constituing of 2100 Men, whereof 300 are deligned for Dragoons. On the 14th the King was to set our for Wiburgh, in order to review a Battalion there, and intended to be at Rembourg by the 27th.

From the Camp at Vorielaer, July 10. We have an Account from Lilla, that Monieur Coeboom h.d not found a fit opportunity to attack the Fort Bednur, as was expected, and that the firing mentioned in our last was at Liere, Interest of the Ecctor of Brunaria in Timel. Yesterday a great Convoy, constiting of about 300 Wagons, laden with Bread and other Provisions, arrived in our Camp from Breads. The French continue in their former Camp near Sr. Jop, having made several great Rouds behind there, in order to a Retreat, as there may be occanion: They have likewise raised several Batteries for the Security of their Camp.
