N Express is arrived here with Letters from the Count de Gutt nsteyn, giving an Account, That the Elector of Banaria has left the Country of Tird, naving been as sudden in his Retreat as he had been in his Invasion. The Advantage gained at been in his invation. The Advantage gained at Landeg by the Penfants, over a Detachment of his Forces, having encouraged the reft of the Inhabitants of those Parts; several Hundreds of them got together by the 16th of the last Month, under the Command of the Baron of Heindel, under the General Geschwind's Regiment, who had with him a few Huntimen, and about 3 or too Regular Troops: With this mixt Body he marched along the Ion, and on the 10th arrived at Pranstrin and St. Martin's, not above two Leagues from Insprack, and immediately sent to view the Posts of Lectrasish and Scharnicz; The same evening the Peasants surprised the former of those Places, and took the Gariton Prisoners of War. The 21st 2 Party of 140 Bavarian Foot and Dragoons, who were posted at Czierl, a little above Informat, to cover the Bridge near that Place over the River Ibn, were introunded by the Peafants, and all cut off except the Officers and 74 private and all cut off except the Oriects and 74 private Men, who had Quarter given them. After this Success the Major advanced towards Schamitz, the most important Pais between Tirol and Bavaria, whereof he made himself Master the same day, without any great Loss, and seand there 22 Pieces of Cannon, whereof 4 have the Buston's Arms on them. On the 23d his Electoral Highness began to intrench himself near the top of that Mount in, upon notice that the two Imperial M. jois General, the Counts of Guttenfteyn and Solari, wer in motion towards Stertzing with 5 or 6000 Regular Froops, who being advanced near to his Camp on the 24th, examined the Situation of it, and were diffoling all things for an Artack the day following; but the Elector did not think fit to run the hazard of a Battel, and to avoid it retired early the next morning with givet Diforder and Precipitation, having left behind nim most of his Tents as they stood, with his Plate, and several Wigon Loads of very good Booty, which fell to the share of the Imperial Troops, and the Peafints who accompanied them. On the 26th the Count of Gutenfleyn marched on to Matray, and the Elector fell back to Informath; but not thinking himself fase there, he decamped the 27th, by 10 in the morning; and the fame evening the Count of Guernfleyn possessed himself. che Danabe.

His Letters are dated from theree Battallions.
