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Naples, July 10. N. S.

THE Inhabitants of the *Abruzzo* have complained to this Government of the great number of Troops quartered upon them, most of the Quarters of this Kingdom being sent into that Province; whereupon Orders are given for two Troops of Horse to return from thence to their Quarters near this Place, and it is said more are to follow. Several Towns in those Parts have suffered very much by the Earthquakes which happened in the beginning of this Month. The Conde de Lemos, Viceroy of *Sardinia*, has sent an Officer hither to buy Arms and Ammunition for the Defence of that Island. He was also ordered to desire of our Viceroy a Supply of Men, to reinforce the Garisons there; but he was answered, that there are no Troops to be spared from hence. The Duke of *Mataloni*, of the Family of *Caraffa*, and the Duke *della Regina*, died here a few days ago.

Genova, July 10. Some days ago the Doors and Walls of divers Houses in this City were marked in the night time with a yellow Paint, and the like was done in the same night in several Towns of *Savoy* and *Piedmont*. Our Magistrates, being surprised at this odd Accident, have made very diligent Enquiry after the Persons that were concerned in it, and their Design; but have not been able to make any Discovery of either, though they have not been wanting to encourage it, by the Promise of a considerable Reward to any Person that would give an Account of the Matter. The Tide of Ebb was so low yesterday morning, that it left our Mole dry for several hours, which had not been known in the Memory of Man. There are Letters from *Spain* which say, the Viceroy of *Catalonia* had writ to the Court at *Madrid*, that the Deputies of that Province had demanded in a threatening manner, that their Privileges might be confirmed within a certain time; whereupon the Council had met, and a Courier was immediately dispatched with an Answer, the Contents whereof were not known, only it was said, that the Marshal de *Montrevel* was to march thither from the *Sevennes* with a Detachment of 6000 Men, to keep the People in awe, and prevent an Insurrection: Of all which we expect a more certain Account.

Rome, July 14. This Court is greatly distressed with the Disorders committed by the French Forces in the Territories of the Ecclesiastical State, and with the Interruption which

is given to the Trade in these Parts by the French Frigats cruizing in the *Adriatick* Sea; The Pope and his Ministers have several times represented the same to the Cardinal *Fourbin*, who has always assured them, That those Matters should be forthwith redressed, and the like Occasion should not be given for the future, by the Officers of the King his Master, for any Complaints of this nature; But we have not yet received any Ease, notwithstanding these Promises. Signior *San Vitale*, who was Vice-Legate of *Avignon*, is appointed to go with the Character of the Pope's Nuncio to the Great Duke of *Tuscany*.

Warsaw, July 24. The King of Poland parted from *Lublin* the 18th Instant, and arrived the 20th at *Oesoc*, a Country House belonging to the Sieur *Bielinky*, the Great Marshal of the Crown, about 5 Leagurs from this Place, and his Servants and Equipage came thither the 22d. The Pope's Nuncio, and the Weywode of *Podlachia*, with several other Persons of Quality, are gone from hence to wait upon his Majesty. The Forces of the Crown, and those of *Lithuania*, are encamped in the Neighbourhood of a Town called *Opina-Gura*, and frequently send out Parties against the Swedes, whose main Army continues in the same Camp before *Theorn*.

Edinburgh, August 5. By some Dutch Herring Busses, which came into the *Fryth* the 31st past at night, and the next morning, we have an Account That their Convoy, which consisted of 5 Men of War, had been attacked off of *Aberdeen* by 7 French Men of War, and a Tender of 8 or 10 Guns, who took 4 of them, and 4 or 5 of the Busses; But these Prizes having received so much Damage in the Engagement, that they could not keep up with the Enemy's Ships, they put all the Men they had taken Prisoners on board two of the Busses, which are since come in here, and burnt the rest of their Prizes. The other Dutch Man of War, with the remainder of their Fleet, are all come safe into our *Fryth*.

Falmouth, August 7. On the 3d Instant the *Zelandia*, a *Flushing* Privateer, sent in here a Flyboat of *Hamburg*, *Henry Clou* Master, bound home with Wine, Iron and Wooll, from *Bilboa*: The same day the *Two Brothers*, another Dutch Privateer, sent in a French Prize, belonging to *Rechel*, laden with Wine and Salt. The 4th came in here Her Majesty's Ships the *Dolphin* and the *Hastings* from *Milford*, with part of the Fleet of Colliers from *Wales*, being about 30 Sail; the rest are sailed to the Eastward, under Convoy

Convoy of Her Majesty's Ships the Lime, Dragon, and Medway. Yesterday sailed Her Majesty's Ships the *Dolphin* and *Hastings*; as did likewise two Dutch Privateers, bound to *Flushing*, with 5 Prizes, which they had lately taken. The same day the *Prince Eugene* and the *Golden Lion*, two other Dutch Privateers, came in here, and brought with them a French Prize of above 100 Tuns Burthen, laden with Sugar and Coco Nuts from the *West-Indies*, which came from thence in company of a Fleet of 20 Sail of their Merchant Ships, homeward bound, but had been separated from them by the Weather.

Plymouth, August 8. Yesterday came in here the *Happy Entrance* of *London*, *George Taylor* Master, from *Bristol*. This day came in the *St. John*, *Thomas Hellison* Master, from *St. Ubes*, and the *St. Andrew*, of and from *Dram*, both bound to this Place.

Cowes, August 9. Yesterday was brought into *Stoke's Bay* the *Crowned Wine-Eat* of *Copenhagen*, *John Peterson* Master, a Dogger Pink of about 150 Tuns, from *Bayonne*; She was taken the 25th of the last Month in the Chops of the Channel, by Captain *Ralph Corbett*, Commander of the *Bridgman* Packquet-Boat, bound home from the *West-Indies*: But on the 28th a French Privateer of *St. Malo*, of 26 Guns, took the said Packquet-Boat, the Captain having first sunk the Mail, and also retook the Danish Ship, which they plundered, put the Packquet-Boat's Men (except the Captain, his second Mate, and two of his Men) on board her, and let her go. After this a Dutch Ship from *Smirna* retook the *Bridgman*; but being pursued by several French Ships, she could not bring her off, and so sunk her, by firing two Shots into her Hold, and afterwards made her own Escape. The Men belonging to the Packquet-Boat, who came hither in the Danish Ship, as abovementioned, report, that they left *Jamaica* on the first of *June*, at which time 7 of Her Majesty's Ships were there in Port, one whereof, viz. the *Canterbury*, had lately brought in a French Prize, being a Man of War of 36 Guns and 180 Men: And that the day after their departure they saw about 40 or 50 Sail of English Men of War and Merchant Ships, standing in for *Jamaica*, whereof one was a Flag, whom they suppose to be Vice Admiral *Graydon*. Yesterday about 100 Sail of Coasters passed through this Road towards *Spithead*, being part of a Fleet of about 200 Sail from the West Country, which sailed on the back of this Island.

The Dutch Mail of Friday last is not yet come in.
