BUT (vii) Candidates who are not in possession of such certificate or equivalent qualification may be admitted exceptionally by the Commissioners, at their discretion, if evidence of suitable experience on scientific research and development work can be produced; and if the candidates are certified by their Department as being worthy of consideration their Departments as being worthy of consideration.

### 6. Application.

candidate sitting for an examination during 1952 with a view to obtaining any of the qualifications set out above may be admitted to the Competition before the result of the examination is known. He will not, however, be declared successful unless on the result of the examination he satisfies Regulation 5.

A candidate admitted under the concession will be expected to furnish documentary evidence of the result of the examination to the Commissioners as soon as possible.

A candidate may make one and only one appli-cation under these Regulations.

7. Health and Character.

Successful candidates must satisfy the Com-missioners as to their health and character.

8. Competition. (i) The Commissioners may at their discretion summon candidates to a preliminary informal interview.

the highway authority for the two link roads on the date on which notice is given by the Minister to the Council that the roads are opened for through traffic.
