Naples, July 18. N. S.
Ome Barks have lately been fitted out of the Seaport Towns belonging to the Emperor in the Adrianick Gulph, who have taken teveral of our Tarrans laden with Corn, and retook the last week one of theirs out of the Port of Manfredonia, which had been formerly taken by one of the Ships of the French Squadron commanded by the Chevalier de Fourbin. An Accident has larely happened, which has contributed to encreate the Discontents of the Inhabitants of this Place against the French; Don Fabrizio Minutolo, going abroad in his Caleth, happened to run against a French Soldier, who, instead or going out of the way, presented his Musket at him, but by good Fortune it did not take are, and so he got away without any hure. The Son of the Dake of Moles, who was come hither to fue for his Father's Effate, which is fequestred, for his having embraced the Emperor's Interest, is banished out of this Kingdom. The Fortifications of Baya are now almost finished, and leveral Pieces of Cannon have been tent from our Arlenal, to be placed apon the Works there.

Rime, July 28. The Pope entred the 22d hilling med the 55th Year of his Age, upon which occasion he received the Compliments of all the Foreign Ministers and Persons of Quality here: He has lately held several Congregations, to confult of the means of reforming the Manners of the Monks of all the feveral Orders, whole scandalous Lives are a great Reproach to their Profession. The Vice-Legate of Avignon has writ to the Pope, to acquaint him with the Death of the Cardinal de Bingi, a Forentine, who was promoted to that Dignity by Pope Clement X, and had enjoyed it above 31 Years; he died at Narbonne, in the 73d year of his Age, leaving vacant that Archbishoprick, and a 12th Place in the College of Cardinals. Cardinal Janson had Audience lately of the Pope, to acquaint him, that the King his Mafter bad ordered a Sum of 50000 Crowns to be paid into the Pope's Treatury, to make good the Losses which his Subjects have sustained, by the marching of the French Forces into his Territories. The Person who sometime ago mudered Signior Zeccadoro, one of the Pope's ocretaries, as he was passing from the Pope's Apartment to his own, has at length been dilcovered: It was one Mathias Trojans, who having confest the Fact, though not the occasion of it, has accordingly suffered Death, and his Head is put on the Gate of St. Angelo, with an Inscription noting his Crime. The Count an Inscription noting his Crime. The Count de Fonti, Nephew and Heir to Signior Zeccadoro, was stabbed last week by one of his late Uncle's Servants, exasperated at his delaying to pay him a Legacy left him by his deceased Mafter; The Count is fince dead of his Wounds,

and fearch is made after the Murderer, in order to bring him to the Punishment he deferves. The Works which had been begun long fince for draining the Morass called Paludi Pentine, but were discontinued by reason that the present Pope is unwilling to be at the Charge in this time of War, are renewed at the Expence of Don Livis Odefealchi, by the Heer Meyer, a Dutch Engineer, who has now 300 Men at Work, and designs to employ 500 Men more after Harvest. Cardinal Narris, so well known for his great Learning, and particularly for his Skill in Chronology, is dangerously ill.

Warfaw, August 11. The Swedish Army continues encamped before Thoorn, and it is faid they intend formally to beliege that Place, as foon as they have received their Supplies of Men, Artillery and Ammunition, which were lately set on Shore near Dantzick. The King of Sweden has writ two Letters, one to the Cardinal Primate, and the other to the Commillioners appointed by the Republick, upon the occasion of some Proposals that have been lately made to him for establishing a Peace between him and the King of Poland. Our King being still at Offock, the Cardinal is gone thither to confer with him upon the Subject of these Letters. We have received an Account, That the Polish Lieutenant General Brands being informed that 400 Swedes were quarrered in a Village of Pruffia, called Law erbourg, he marched with a Body of Saxon and Polife Troops, and coming thither the 8th Instant by break of day, fell upon the Swedes before they could be in a readiness to defend themfelves, killed about 120 of them, and put the rest to flight: General Nieross, who lay at Nieumark, not far from thence, with a Body of 3000 Swedes, having notice of what had passed, marched immediately to attack General Brandt, but he was already advanced so far in his way home, that he could not come up with him. Divers Gentlemen of the Greater Poland, not being satisfied with the Resolutions taken at the Diet at Lublin, have begun to enter into a Confederacy to hinder their being put in execution; whereupon some Troops are ordered to march that way, to prevent the ill Consequences which may attend this Proceeding.

Philipsbourg, August 21. A great number of Wagons laden with Ammunition, and other Necessaries for a Siege, are sent from Strasbourg to the French Army commanded by the Duke of Burgundy, which is marching towards Brisac, in order, as they give out, to set down before that Place: Monsieur Vauban, the French King's chief Enginier, is said to be come purposely from France to their Army upon this Design. They have been joyned by Derachments out of all their Towns in Alsace, which are lest almost bare of Troops, and by a good number of the Militia,
