At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 30th day of *January*, 1952.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 24th day of *January*, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners Acts, 1836 to 1840, and of the Archdeaonries and Rural Deaneries Act, 1874, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme with respect to four of the rural deaneries within the archdeaonries of Oxford and Berkshire in the diocese of Oxford.

“Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Oxford, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to four of the rural deaneries within the said archdeaonries are desirable and we are of opinion that the same may be properly carried into effect:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Bishop (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme shall be published in the *London Gazette* and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, first the parish of Stanton Harcourt in the rural deanery of Woodstock, in the said Archdeaconry of Oxford, shall be transferred to the rural deanery of Witney in the same Archdeaconry; and secondly, the parishes of Stratfield Mortimer and Mortimer West End in the rural deanery of Reading in the said Archdeaconry of Berkshire shall be transferred to the rural deanery of Bradfield, in the same Archdeaconry; and each of the said parishes shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the rural dean of the rural deanery to which it is hereby transferred and shall not belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery nor be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of any other rural dean.”

And whereas the provisions of the said Acts relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Oxford.

“We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of Amersham, Chalfont Saint Giles, and Chenies, all in the diocese of Oxford.

“Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

“And whereas the Right Reverend Kenneth, Bishop of Oxford, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme):

“Now, therefore we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Amersham, Chalfont Saint Giles and Chenies shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

“THE SCHEDULE

“The territory to be annexed to the parish of Amersham:—

“All those contiguous parts of the parishes of Chalfont Saint Giles and Chenies (together coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) which, taken together, are bounded upon the north by the parish of Chenies, upon the west by the parish of Amersham and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Amersham from the parish of Chalfont Saint Giles in the middle of Burton's Lane, and continuing thence southeastwards along the middle of Burton's Lane to a point opposite the middle of the north-eastern end of Burton's Way, and continuing thence southwestwards along the middle of Burton's Way to a point opposite the northwestern end of the wall or fence at the rear of the house and premises known as ‘Bidston’, Burton's Lane, and continuing thence generally southeastwards to and along the last mentioned wall or fence and along the walls or fences at the rear of the houses and premises known as ‘Beardown to Raglan’, Burton's Lane and continuing thence northeastwards along the wall or fence which divides the last mentioned house and premises from the house and premises known as ‘Argosy’, Burton's Lane
