From on Board Her Majesty's Ship the Triumph, off of Cape Spartell, Angust 5. O. S.

N the 3 ist of the last Month the Fleet, under the Command of Sir Cloudesly Showell, weighed out of Caseais, and came hither the 4th Instant, where we met with a Levant; which blows fresh and detains us. The Admiral had sent Captain Norvis for Intelligence towards Cadix, who returned yesterday, and brought 5 or 6 Bargues-Lengues, which he took in the Bay of Buils; The Prisoners all agree, that there are no French Men of War on their Coast.

Lubon, Angust 29. N. S. On the 19th Instant an Express came hither from the English Consul at Fars, with Advice, That some part of our Fleer was seen passing by that Place on the 13th, and that the same day, in the evening, Her Majesty's Ship the Lizard came to an Anchor about two Leagues from thence, being fent in thither to the Consul for Intelligence, who sent the Admiral the freshest he had from Spain, by which it appeared that there was then no French Men of War on that Coast. On the 23d we had an Account, by a Genon se Ship, that the Admiral on the 16th was off-of Cape Spartel. We have since News, that the Fleet was seen in the Medizerranean on the 20th. We have Advice from Markeld, that the Marquis de Chaste ancent, whom the French King is sending hither in Quality of his Ambassador Extraordinary, arrived some days since at Madrid, and that on the 17th Instant he began his Journey thence for this Place; where he is soon expected; but this does not hinder us from proceeding with all Diligence in our Preparations for supporting our late Alliance with the Consederates.

Vienna, August 29. A Courier arrived here yesterday from General Histor, with Advice, That he having murched with 800 Deagoons of the Regiment of Bareith, 300 Granadiers, and a Battalion of Foot, with intent to attack the Elector of Bavaria, either at Seefeldt or Mitterwaldt, found, upon his Arrival there on the 24th Instant, that the Elector had withdrawn his Troops from both shote Places two days before. He is said to have retired to Manich, and to have e sent his Troops down the Fer on Barges and Floats, in order (as is supposed), to their seining with such others as is supposed) to their joining with such others as can be drawn out of the Garifons of Bramau and Scharling, and then to fail upon the Count de Ra-ventlau, who (as we are told) has recovered the Castle of Manhargh, on the Ihn, out of the Hands of the Bavarians, and has bombarded Scharling in house or delicent the Large Score of Schanling, in hopes to destroy the large Stores of Provinous which they had laid up there. General History had given notice of the Elector's Motions to the Count de Reverties, that he might not be simply that the state of the Count de Reverties, that he might not be surprifed by the Elector's sudden return from Tirol, who has quitted all the Hold he had there, except Kuefilajn, the Siege of which Place is continued with great Application by the Pealants, whom General Hilfer is now in a Condition to reinforce with some regular Troops.
