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From on Board Her Majesty's Ship the Triumph, off of Cape Spartell, August 5. O. S.

ON the 31st of the last Month the Fleet, under the Command of Sir *Cloudfly Showell*, weighed out of *Casais*, and came hither the 4th Instant, where we met with a Levant; which blows fresh and detains us. The Admiral had sent Captain *Norris* for Intelligence towards *Cadix*, who returned yesterday, and brought 5 or 6 *Bargues-Lougues*, which he took in the Bay of *Bulls*; The Prisoners all agree, that there are no *French Men of War* on their Coast.

Lubon, August 29. N. S. On the 19th Instant an Express came hither from the *English Consul at Faro*, with Advice, That some part of our Fleet was seen passing by that Place on the 13th, and that the same day, in the evening, Her Majesty's Ship the *Lizard* came to an Anchor about two Leagues from thence, being sent in thither to the Consul for Intelligence, who sent the Admiral the freshest he had from *Spain*, by which it appeared that there was then no *French Men of War* on that Coast. On the 23d we had an Account, by a *Genouff* Ship, that the Admiral on the 16th was off of *Cape Spartell*. We have since News, that the Fleet was seen in the *Mediterranean* on the 20th. We have Advice from *Marseilles*, that the *Marguis de Chastillon*, whom the *French King* is sending hither in Quality of his Ambassador Extraordinary, arrived some days since at *Madrid*, and that on the 17th Instant he began his Journey thence for this Place; where he is soon expected; but this does not hinder us from proceeding with all Diligence in our Preparations for supporting our late Alliance with the Confederates.

Vienna, August 29. A Courier arrived here yesterday from General *Heister*, with Advice, That he having marched with 800 Dragoons of the Regiment of *Bavaria*, 300 Granadiers, and a Battalion of Foot, with intent to attack the Elector of *Bavaria*, either at *Seefeld* or *Mitterwald*, found, upon his Arrival there on the 24th Instant, that the Elector had withdrawn his Troops from both those Places two days before. He is said to have retired to *Munich*, and to have sent his Troops down the *Isar* on Barges and Floats, in order (as is supposed) to their joining with such others as can be drawn out of the Garrisons of *Braunau* and *Scharning*, and then to fall upon the Count de *Rosenstein*, who (as we are told) has recovered the Castle of *Nuburg*, on the *Isar*, out of the Hands of the *Bavarians*, and has bombarded *Scharning*, in hopes to destroy the large Stores of Provisions which they had laid up there. General *Heister* had given notice of the Elector's Motions to the Count de *Rosenstein*, that he might not be surpris'd by the Elector's sudden return from *Tirol*, who has quitted all the Hold he had there, except *Kuffstain*, the Siege of which Place is continued with great Application by the Peasants, whom General *Heister* is now in a Condition to reinforce with some regular Troops. These Peasants, who in *Tirol* make one of the States in that Country, and have their Representatives in all Assemblies, as well as the Nobility and Clergy, have lately

sent hither a Deputy, as the other States had done the Counts of *Koufht* and *Trap*: He was chosen from among those who are before *Kuffstain*; He had Audience yesterday of the Emperor, being introduced by the Count de *Mausfeldt*, Great Chamberlain, which is all the Distinction that can be shewn to Ambassadors, and met with that favourable Reception, which is due to the great Services that have been performed by those who sent him. Our Advices from the other part of *Tirol*, which lies nearest to *Italy*, say, the *French* took the Castle of *Arco* on the 17th Instant, the Garrison not being able to hold out any longer for want of Water, which being known to the *Belliegers*, they would grant them no other Condition than being Prisoners of War. The Duke of *Vendosme* has been very spiteful against the Count de *Castelbarco*, because of his zealous Adherence to the Emperor's Interest, by giving Orders to undermine and blow up several stately Houses he had thereabouts, and to lay waft every part of his Estate. They write from *Hungary*, that the number of the Rebels being considerably encreas'd, *Berzeni*, one of their Chiefs, was marching towards *Buda* with a Body of them, and *Ragotzi* with another towards *Great Waradin*, in order to hinder the Troops under General *Gleichenberg* from joining with those which are commanded by the Count de *Montecuculi*. One *Ibrahim*, who was formerly a Colonel under the Count de *Teckely*, is said to be at the head of a 3d Detachment of the Rebels, which had pass'd the *Tibiscus*, and was moving towards *Pest*. The Count de *Fels*, Governor of *Great Waradin*, is supposed to have got into that Place with some Succours. Count *Budiani* died herethe 26th; He was Ban of *Croatia*, and had signalized himself by many important Services, from the time that *Vienna* was besieged by the *Turks*, throughout the whole Course of the late War in *Hungary*.

Ratisbonne, September 3. The Magistrates of this Place have been obliged by the *Bavarians* to disband the bulk part of the Soldiers they had in their Pay, and have kept only 60. The Elector of *Bavaria* has once more demanded of the Town of *Augsburg* to give up two of their Gates into his Possession; but the Magistrates of that City, taught by our Example, have excus'd themselves up on the Neutrality he had allow'd them, and are making Preparations for their Defence, in case he should attempt to force them to a Compliance. Prince *Louis of Baden* pass'd the *Danube* at *Ebingen* on the 29th of the last Month, and is since advanced to *Bell*, which has caus'd a great Alarm in *Ulm*, and the neighbouring Frontiers of *Bavaria*. The Elector detach'd on the 27th 2 Battalions from his little Army near *Munich*; the *Cavaliers* and *Hof-Granadiers*, and his Court, followed the 28th, and he intend'd to march in the path, and according to some Advices is already arriv'd at *Worms*. In order to command the Army that is to march towards *Ulm* when it is so call'd of these Troops, and the bulk part of the *French* forces, whereof a small Body only is to be left at *Leiningen* to observe the Impenetrable at *Hanau*, and in order therefore the *French* have drawn their Camp into a narrower Camp, made a new Intrenchment, and broke down the Bridge of *Bans* they had made over the *Danube* at *Dillingen*, that Place being now left out of their Lines. The Count de *Burghart*, during his stay before *Scharning*, threw in several 200 Fire-balls into that Place; A Party of *Bavarians* follow'd him in his March to *Puffen*, and sent a *Wagon* or two laden with Bagage, which had pass'd before. General *de Bro* is now arriv'd at *Braunau* with the remainder of the Elector's Army from *Tirol*, having
