Reparations are making at Pleskow for the Reception of Ambailadors who are thortly expected from Poland, to renew the Alliances between that Crown and this State. The Czar has ordered the Fortifications of the Nien-Schans, which was taken by his Forces in the beginning of this Campaign, to be repaired and augmented, and a new Fort to be built in an Island within half a League of that Place, which is supposed to be very near finished, a confiderable number of Pioneers having been for fome time employed in that Work without intermission. They write from thence, that General Szeremer, who commands the Czur's Forces in those Parts, having Notice that General Hearn was come out of Nerva with a strong Detachment of Swedish Troops, he marched out against him, and the Forces on both fides met near the River Laga, where there happened a sharp Engagement between them, in which we are told the Swedes were worsted, and retired to Nerva.

Warfaw, Sept. 1. The Term of Six weeks, which, purfuant to the Refolutions of the late Diet at Lablin, was allowed to the Family of Sapieha for making their Submission to the King, is very near expiring; and altho' none of that Family has hitherto performed any Act of that kind, yet his Majesty has forborn to dispose of the Offices enjoyed by them, upon the Intercession of their Friends, in hopes they will make use of this Indusence to regain his Favour. The Negotiation for setting on foot a Treaty of Peace between the King of Sweden and this Crown is still continued, and the Cardinal Primate, and other Commissioners appointed to transact this Affair on the part of the Republick, have, in order to it, drawn up some Proposals in writing, which (it is said) were transmitted this day to that King's Ministers. The Saxon Forces, and those of Lithania, are marching towards the Greater Peland, as well to oppose the Excursions of the Swedish Forces under General Reinschild, as to keep in awe such of the Nobility of that Province who have lately entred into a Consederacy among themselves, whereof we do not know the Conditions. They have sent some Deputies hither, who give all possible Assurances to the Cardinal

Primate, and the other Senators in Town, of their Loyalty to the King, and their Zeal for the Interest of the Republick; and this they desire them to represent to his Majorly

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Dantzick, Sept. 9. The Deputies which our Magistrates had sent to the King of Sweden, to desire some Abatement of the 100000 Crowns demanded of this City by way of Contribution by General Steinbock, are returned without any Succeis, and the General has summoned the City a second time to pay this Sum, without any further delay. Part of the Snedish Forces, and most of the Artillery, which were lately set on shore near Oliva, are marched to their Camp before Thoorn, and it is faid they will shortly lay Siege to that Place in form.

From the Imperial Camp near Augsbourg, September 10. Prince Lewis having referved to pass the Denule with the best part of the Army under his Command, which lay encamped near Hausheim, and to advance towards Bavaria, in order to draw the Marsnal de Villars out of his Intrenchments at Lawingen, his Highness accordingly, leaving the Count de Srirum in that Camp with the rest of his Forces, to observe the French Army, broke up the 23d past, and marched that night to Hirbs. The next day be came to Wistersted, where having rested two days, he continued his March the 27th to Seifhern, near Blaubtyern, and arrived the 28th at Ehingen, where the Count de la Tour joined him with the Body of Forces under his Com-The 30th he decamped from thence. passed the Danube at Tettingen, and marched to Bibrach, and the next day to Mettenberg. Orders were given that we should continue our March the 2d Instant, in order to pass over the River Iller, wherein we expected to meet with some Difficulty, the Enemy having near that River a leady of 6000 Men, who had been lately joined by 5 Battalions out of Olm, and, as we had Notice that day, would be reinforced by a Detachment of 5000 more from the French Camp at Lawingen. However we patled the River at Tirthofen without any Opposition, or so much as seeing an Enemy, and lay that night at Volckarishofen, within a League of Memmingen. The Garison of this Piece had larely been confiderably reinforced, and his Highness refolved not to lose time in attacking it, but to continue his March directly to Augslourg, which proved a very great Service
