"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Langrish and the benefice of Privett shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Langrish with Privett', but the parishes of the said benefice shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Edmund Mackay Ellis, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Langrish, shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Langrish shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. *Diversion of endowments.* (a) Upon the union taking effect a capital sum of £2,543 18s. 1d. being part of a larger sum at present held by us the Church Commissioners on behalf of the benefice of Privett shall be severed or diverted from the said benefice of Privett and from the united benefice and shall be annexed to and held by us on behalf of the benefice of Rowner in the said diocese of Portsmouth, and (b) upon the union taking effect, or upon the cessation of an annual charge of £20 in favour of the Church of England Pensions Board in trust for the Reverend Francis Peter Syonge to which the revenues of the said benefice of Privett are at present subject, whichever of the said events shall last occur, a part of the endowments of the united benefice, namely a capital sum sufficient to produce £24 per annum, being part of a larger capital sum at present held by us, the said Church Commissioners, on behalf of the said benefice of Privett shall be severed or diverted from the said benefice of Privett and from the united benefice and shall be transferred to and become vested in us to be held as part of and for the benefit of our General Fund and in consideration of the said transfer we shall make out of the said General Fund such periodical payments to the diocesan stipends fund of the diocese of Portsmouth as we from time to time determine to be equitable having regard to the value of the said endowments.

"5. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Langrish having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 28th day of February, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and with the consent of the Right Reverend Tom, Bishop of Hereford (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for effecting the union of the benefice of Acton Beauchamp with Evesbatch and the benefice of Stanford Bishop both situate in the Diocese of Hereford.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Acton Beauchamp with Evesbatch and the benefice of Stanford Bishop shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Acton Beauchamp and Evesbatch with Stanford Bishop', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend James Clifford Wills, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Acton Beauchamp with Evesbatch, shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Stanford Bishop shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice and the parsonage house belonging to the benefice of Acton Beauchamp with Evesbatch, and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall, as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by us, the said Church Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and the net proceeds of such sale shall be applied in the following manner:—

"(a) A capital sum not exceeding £500 shall be appropriated towards the cost of the improvement of the parsonage house of the united benefice in accordance with plans to be approved by us;

"(b) A further capital sum not exceeding £1,500 shall be appropriated for the provision of a new parsonage house for the benefice of Stoke Lacy in the said diocese of Hereford;

"(c) The remainder of the net proceeds of such sale shall constitute and form part of the Expenses Fund of the diocese of Hereford established pursuant to the said Measures.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately, the patron of the benefice of Acton Beauchamp with Evesbatch having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union."

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Salisbury (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the disunion of the united benefice of Durweston with Bryanston in the diocese of Salisbury.

"SCHEME

"Whereas the Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury has forwarded to us, the said Church Commissioners, provisional proposals pursuant to the said Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, recommending that the union of the benefices of Durweston and Bryanston should be dissolved, that the said benefice
