THE Parliament of this Kingdom met the 21ft Instant, and his Grace my Lord Lieurenant being come to the House of Peers, arrended in a Solemn Manner by the Great Officers of State, the Peers, Officers of Arms, Oc. made the following Speech so both Houses. to both Houses.

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My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Queen could not more effectually manifest Her Tender Concern for you than by Calling you at this time to meet in Parliament, whereby you have an Opportunity of Passing these Gracious Bills already sent over, and of making such other Laws as may yet be wanting for the Establishment of the Protesiant Religion, and the Westare at he Wingdom of the Kingdom.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

It were to be wished that you were in a Condition to provide for such Fortifications as would much conduce to the Safety of the Kingdom, and particularly at Limerick; and if Building Barracks in this City, and where else they are waiting. But that which Her Majesty expects at this time, is only that the Publick Debts be distarged, and the Revenue made equal to the Expence of the Government, which is much encreased by the Charge of the Barracks; that they are found so isself and so great an ease to the Country, that they ought not so be inglected.

Naples, August 28. N. S. The Banks lately fitted out in the Ports belonging to the Emperor in the Gulph of Venice continue to infest the Coasts of this Kingdom and the Men on board them do frequently make Descents, and plunder the Villages which lie next the Sea, fo that the Government here has thought it necessary to fend two Galleys and a Brigantine up the Gulph to give them Chase, and to guard those Coasts; Two other Galleys are fitting out in this Pert, and two more in Sicily, to convoy home several Ships la-den with Corn, that are shortly expected here from the Province of Galabria. The Animolicies from the Province of Galabria. of the French and the Spanish Soldiers in Garison in this City against each other encrease daily, and they frequently fall into open Quarrels, which feldom end without Blood. The Inhabitants of this Place do often take part in these Broils; whereupon it has been resolved to make an Order to forbid all Tradesmen and Servants in Liveries to wear Swords; but this Privilege is so dear to them, that the Government has not yet thought it convenient to publish any such Order, fearing the Consequences that may attend it, at this time that there is generally a Disposition in the People to an Insurrection, which is kept up by the News of an English and Durch Fleet's being on their Voy-

of an English and Durch Fleet's being on their Voyage up the Streights.

Venice, Sept. 15. The Senate has chosen Signior Loredano into the number of the Procurators of St. Mark, in Consideration of his Services to the Republick, and he has accordingly taken possession of that Dignity, with the usual Ceremonies. They have also elected Signior Francisco Cornaro, Nephew to the Cardinal of that Name, and of a Family which holds the first Rank among the Nobility of this State, to relieve Signior Meenigo, their Ambassador to Her Majesty of Great Britain. The Imperial and the French Armies in Lombardy continue in the same Camps, being separated by the River Secchia. The French Army in the Trentine is, according to all our Advices, preparing to return to Lombardy; after which it is said their Forces will go into Winter Quarters, and that 3000 of their Horse and 12000 of their Foot will remain in the Dutchy of Moderns. The Forces of the Duke of Savey which are in the French and Spanish Service, having sinished the time for which they were hired, talk of returning home. We hear the Duke of Vendosme intends to leave a Garifica of Arce Name and spanish corner other Places near the We hear the Duke of Vendofme intends to leave a Gari-fon at Arco, Nago, and tome other Places near the Lake di Garda.

Phinouth, Sept. 28. Her Majesty's Ship the Eagle Advice-Boat arrived here yesterday from Virginia: She fet fail from thence the 5th of the last Month, in Company of Her Majesty's Ships the Falmonth and the York, Convoys to a Fleet of 70 Sail of Merchant Ships homeward bound. On the 9th they were surprised by a violent Storm, which separated the Fleet; but two days after the Eagle fell in with about 50 Sail of them, which had got rogether again. Since their parting a French Privateer had fallen in with some of the Fleet, and taken two of the Merchant Ships ; others had been cast away, but all the Men faved; the Falmouth in rowling had broke her Top-mast, and sprung her Fore-mast, but having Jury-mass fet up, kept Company with the Fleet, The 17th, being about 300 Leagues from the

Capes of Virginia, they met with another Storm. whereby the Fleet was again separated, and the Eagle has not met with any of them since. The arit Instant she was chased off the Lizard by a French Privateer of 30 Guns, but avoided him, by putting into Falmouth.

London, Sept. 30.
