Yesterday in the evening happened a sudden lire at a Soap-boilers houle upon the Rivers fide, which in less then an hours time burnt down and confirmed fix houles, and might have endangered that quarter of the Town had not the people with much diligence timely extinguishe it

The Constable finding himself much indisposed after his journey, and subject to the Megrim, is perswaded to go to the Kings Houle at Termour and to drink the Span waters.

Paris, Sept. 7. On Wedneldsy last the Dauphin was so extremely ill of his Feavour; that it was much feared he could not continue living till the next day; his distemper is still violent and dangerous, and publick prayers have been made for him in feveral Churches.

Here is lately arrived the Marquis Caretto, who forenally disavows the sale of his Marquisare in Italy to His most Christian Majesty, as having been done contrary to his Order by the Abbor Germelli, whom he employed onely to offer himself and his faid Marquisare to His Maje Aies Protection: the laid Germelli fearing lest he might receive s reward proportionable to this his proceeding, has privatety retired himself, but the Marquis du Chaftelot Bretagne who was formerly employed by His Majerty into Milan, where he was supposed nor to have acquired himself according to the confidence repoled in him, being found to be an accomplice with the Abbot Germelli in this Sale, is committed to the Eaflille.

The laid Marquis Curetto has lately by his Letters endeavoured to affure His Imperial Majesty, that he had no antentions to alienate his Bitate, or to quit his dependency on the Empire, but enely by putting himfelf under the French protection to secure himself against any defignes

which his neighbours might have upon him.

Letters from Candia bearing date the 2d. of Aug. tell us,
That the French Fleet lying near the Town, the Therefo, which was the Ship on which the Duke de Navailles Embank'd hidself for that Kingdom, by some unhappy Accident, or a Shot from the Town, took fire in the Powder-Room, with himmediately blew up, with about 300 Men, and amongst them 37 Officers, and a great quantity of the

From Gerous we are informed a That the Corfairs of Tunis have lately taken a French Merchant Ship; Laden to the value of 80 Thouland Crowns, with another small Barke; and that those of Tunk, Algiers, and Tripoli, had all of them received Orders from the Grand Seignior to let out their , Slips to See, and to seize upon what French Ships they could meet with notwithstanding all sormer Treaties to the contrary.
