Corke, November 13.

THE *Concord* Galley, of 14 Guns, Captain *John Quick* Commander, sailed from hence the 15th of the last Month, being laden with Corn, and bound for *Lisbon*; but was put back the next day into *Kinsale*, and detained there by bad Weather till the first Instant, when she put to Sea again, in Company of the *Prince George* Galley of *London*, Captain *Elliot* Commander, a Ship of 18 Guns, 6 Patereroes and 40 Men. The 5th, about 6 in the morning, in the Latitude of 48 Degrees and 30 Minutes, about 75 Leagues South-West and by South of the Cape, they had sight of a *French* Privateer of 26 or 28 Guns, and about 180 Men, which came up with them about 10 of the Clock, and coming under Captain *Elliot's* Stern, fired his Broad-side and Volley of small Shot; whereupon Captain *Quick* bore upon the Privateer, and gave him a Broadside, and a Volley of small Shot, and so kept plying him as fast as he could; but Captain *Elliot* having struck, after a very fair Resistance, the *Concord* made what Sail she could to get away; but the Privateer, being light and clean, came up with her about 4 in the afternoon; being within Pistol-shot, they desperately engaged each other; the *Concord* was boarded thrice, and the Privateer at the last Boarding carried away her Head and Bolt-sprit, and as far as they can judge foundered himself. The *Concord*, being so disabled, and having received so many Shot in her Hull, that they expected to have foundered, and were forced to throw part of their Lading over-board, bore away for *Ireland*, and on the 9th was forced into *Castlemaven*, from whence she came in here this morning, intending to go to *Plymouth* to refit. Captain *Quick* in this Engagement lost his Carpenter, who was killed with a Cannon-shot, and had his Lieutenant, his Boatswain, and two more of his Men, wounded,

Falmouth, November 15. The *Betty* Galley of *London*, of 130 Tuns and 8 Guns, *John Sampson* Commander, laden with Sugars, &c. from *Jamaica*, was chased ashore the 10th Instant to the Eastward of *St. Ives* by a *French* Privateer of 30 Guns; but the Wind having forced her off to Sea again, she fell into the hands of the Enemy. The *Prince* Paquet-Boat, Captain *Buck* Commander, arrived here yesterday from *Jamaica*. This day a Vessel of 60 Tuns of *London*, bound home from *Guinea* and the *West-Indies*, was sent in here by a *Dutch* Privateer, who had retaken her from the *French*. Here are just now come into Port Her Majesty's Ships the *Orford*, *Warspite* and *Lichfield*, which parted from *Sir Cloudesly Shovell* the 11th Instant, and soon after met with a *French* Man of War of 52 Guns and 400 Men, coming from *Newfoundland*, whom they engaged, and took her after a Fight of 9 hours, and have brought in with them: She is very much shattered, and many of her Men are killed. There was found on board her a good quantity of Sugar, &c.

being the Cargo of an *English* Ship, which she had taken in the *West-Indies*.

Bidford, Nov. 16. Yesterday arrived here, Her Majesty's Ship the *Shoreham*, with about 16 Sail of Vessels, laden with Wooll, from *Waterford*, and 3 homeward-bound *Virginia* Ships, which had put in there: At the same time came in here two Vessels laden with Wooll from *Corke*, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship the *Arundel*, by which we have an Account, That Rear-Admiral *Dilkes*, with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, and divers *East-India* Ships, Transports and other Vessels, under his Convoy, came away from thence the 13th Instant in the morning. Yesterday sailed from hence the *Carolina* Merchant for *London*, being a retaken *West-India* Ship.

Plymouth, November 16. The Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under the Command of *Sir Cloudesly Shovell* passed by this Harbour yesterday to the Eastward, and was joined from hence by Her Majesty's Ship the *Medway*, and the *Samuel* and *Mary* of *Boston*, *Zachariah* *Simms* Master, from *Barbadoes*, bound to *London*. This day came in the Squadron of Men of War and Transport Ships from *Ireland*, commanded by Rear-Admiral *Dilkes*; as did also the *James* of this Place, *Thomas Biske* Master, from *Virginia*, and the *Concord*, Captain *John Quick* Commander, from *Corke*, which came from thence under Convoy of the said Squadron. There are also come in the *Harper* Transport with Timber for the Dock; and Her Majesty's Yacht the *Glocester*, with the *William* Transport of *Rocheester*, both from the *Streights*, which parted from *Sir Cloudesly Shovell* off of this Harbour.

Bristol, November 17. Her Majesty's Ships the *Arundell* and *Shoreham* came in here yesterday, together with the *Discovery* Brigantine, and under their Convoy the *Europe* from *Virginia*, the *George* and *Grace*, *Thomas Michell* Master, from *Jamaica*, and several Vessels from *Ireland*: They all came from *Cork* the 13th, and bring Advice, that several Ships from *Jamaica* were put into *Cork* Haven, under Convoy of one Man of War.

Coves, November 17. The *Chichester* of *Belfast*, *John Caswell* Master, is just come in here from *Maryland*, but last from *Cork*; as is also the *Mary Ann* of *Dublin*, *Patrick McDon* Master, with Soldiers on board.

Portsmouth, November 18. The *Medway*, and 4 other of Her Majesty's Ships, came to Spit-head yesterday; as did likewise 8 or 10 Sail of Transport Ships, with Soldiers on board, from *Ireland*, which sailed from thence with Rear-Admiral *Dilkes*, and are since come into this Harbour.

Tarmouth, November 19. Her Majesty's Ship the *Rocheester's* Prize came into our Road the 16th Instant, with the rest of the *Hull* Fleet bound for *London* under her Convoy. The same day came in 200 Sail of laden Colliers from *Newcastle*, convoyed by Her Majesty's Ships the *Margate* and *Nightingale*, and 16 Sail of homeward bound Merchant Ships, under

Convoy of the *Trism* and *Lynn*, from the East Country, but left from *Leith Road* in *Scotland*, (where the whole Fleet arrived last week, consisting of a very considerable number of Ships laden mostly with Naval Stores, being put in here by contrary Winds, so that we have now in our Road about 450 Sail of Ships bound for *London*, which wait for a fair Wind. Her Majesty's Ships the *Portland* and *Admiral* came into our Roads from the Southward the 16th, to Convoy about 50 Corn Ships bound from hence to *Rusticum*.

Dede, Nov. 17. Sir *Claude* *Servell*, Admiral of the Red, came into the *Dover* the 17th Instant from the *Sveigter*, with the Squadron of Her Majesty's Ships under his Command, except such as had been detached on particular Services; and yesterday in the afternoon came in Her Majesty's Ships the *Kings-Fisher* and *Turk*, belonging to the Squadron, which lately came from *Ireland*, under the Command of Rear-Admiral *Dukes*, and under their Convoy the *Wentworth*, Captain *Wells*, the *Phoenix*, Captain *Coswell*, the *Fleet Frigate*, Captain *Burgess*, the *Macclesfield Galley*, Captain *Harle*, the *Cypri* Galley, Captain *Campbell*, the *Arabia Factor*, Captain *Falcon*, the *Hampshire*, Captain *Tracy*, the *Bengall*, Captain *Cockburne*, and the *Jain* and *Mary*, Captain *Ross*, Commanders, all nine from the *East-Indies*; with them came also divers homeward bound Merchant Ships from *Virginia* and other Parts, being in all about 20 Sail, which sailed directly through for the *River*.

There are Four Mails due from Holland, including that of Friday last.
