HE Nobility of the Palatinates of Calm, Marienbourg, and Pomerellen, met at Stutgart the 23d Instant, to consult what Measures to take for the Preservation of their Country, which lies wholly expofed to the Swedish Forces; and after some Debate they resolved to enter into the Confederacy or Asfociation lately made by those of the Greater Poland, which they accordingly figned, and fwore not to depart from it. Then they chose 4 Deputies, wiz. the Sieur Krapski, Castellan of Elbing, the Sieur Kinsiszeki, Sword-hearer of Prussia, the Sieur Karewski, chief Ensign of Marienbourg, and the Sieur Povoluki, chief Enfign of Pomerellen, to attend the King of Smeden, with Assurances of their Devotion to his Service, with Directions to intercede in behalf of their own Country, and the Town of Thinn; after which they are to go to the Confederated Nobility of the Greater Poland, for the maintaining a good Correspondence be-tween them and these of Prussia; and these Deputies are preparing for their Journey to the Swedish Camp

Warfaw, November 3. The King of Foland has altered his Resolution of holding an Affembly of the Senate the 16th Instant as Zamosk. but has formmoned risem to meet the same day at Javerow, and is already on his Journey this ther; and accordingly the Senators, and several other Persons of Quality that are in Town, as also those who are at Ocfolk, where his Majesty has lately kept his Residence, are prepating to follow him. It is faid his Majesty intends, after this Ailembly is ended, to lend Ambassadors to the King of Denmark and the Czar of Muscowy, to desire their Assistance against the Swedse, and to remove with his Court to Cracew. The Forces of the Crown are going into Winter Quarters; those of Lithuania continue in that Dutchy. The King of Sweden is still at Thoorn and, we hear, has obliged the Inhabitants to swear Allegiance to him: His Forces are as yet encamped near that Place; but upon a Report that a strong Detachment of them is to return this way. Orders have been given to break down the Bridge near this City over the River Weissell, and to make all the necessary Preparations for our Defence, in case their Design should be to attack us. The Palatine of Posen, and the Marshal cholen by the Confederated Nobility of the Greater Poland, to preside in their Assemblies, have lately dispatched an Express to the Cardinal Primate at Lowitz, whereby they acquaint him. That they had fent Deputies to the King of Sweden, in order to some Accommodation, and for preventing any surther Hostilities; that these Deputies had obtained an Audience of his Majesty on the 16th of the last Month,

who received their Proposals so well, that he desired them to depute some of the chief among them for this Negociation, and he would appoint Commissioners to treat with them. The Cardinal Primare, upon Receipt of this Advice, immediately sent away a Courier to the King of Poland, to acquaint him therewith; but it is said his Majesty has desired the Cardinal to use his Interest to break off any such Treaty.

Copenhagen, Nov. 10. The King of Denmark has lately iffued a Commission to several Sea-Officers, whereof Admiral Gedde is the chief, to go into Norway, in order to list 8000 Seamen, who are to be always in a readiness whenever the publick Occasions shall require their Service; which number, according to Computation, will be able at any time to mann two Thirds of his Fleer. The Queen Mother returned hither the 7th Instant from Nyaping. The Baron of Lillientoot, who has lain ill for some time at Landskroon, is pretty well recovered, and has less that Place, in order to continue his Journey to Stackholm, where it is said he is to have a great share in the Management of publick Affairs.

Francfort, Nov. 11. The Count de Nassay Weilbourg is encomped with a Body of Forces at Mublberg, and the Count de Vehlen is with more Troops at Frankendal, from whence he has sent several Parties of Hussars, to make Excursions against the French, who have brought nome several Prisoners, and many Horses. These two Bodies are to join with the Forces commanded by the Prince of Hisse, which are expected in a day or two at Spine, in order to attempt the Relief of Landau: This City has surnished 3 Pieces of Cannon, and a considerable quantity of Ammunition, towards that Service; and 200 Men marched out of our Garisson yesterday, with Orders to join the Prince of Hesse's Troops: The Count de Merci is come hither from Prince Lewis Army, intending to serve as a Volunteer in that Expedition,

Whitchaven, November 12. The Love, belonging to this Place, which came from Virginia with the late Fleet, and was given over for lost, arrived here yesterday from Lamb-Lash in Scotland, having put in there after she had been separated from the said Fleet.

Falmouth, November 13. The Mansbridge Pacquet-Boat arrived here the 9th Instant from Lisbon. The next day four Dutch Privateers, with as many Prizes, which they have lately raken and brought into this Port, and about 20 Sail of Coasters under their Convoy, sailed from hence to the Eastward. Yesterday 3 Ships, belonging to Amsterdam, and bound home from the Coast of Barbary, put into this Port.
