

Cricklade, which is bounded upon the west by the parish of Minety, upon the southwest by the parish of Charlton with Brokenborough, upon the south, east and the north in part by the parish of Purton, and upon the remaining side by an imaginary line commencing on the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Sampson, Cricklade, from the parish of Purton, in the middle of the main line of the British Railways (Western Region) at a distance of approximately 28 chains west of Black Dog Bridge, and continuing thence westwards along the middle of the said railway line to the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Sampson, Cricklade, from the parish of Minety.

"PART THREE

"The territory to be annexed to the united parish of Cricklade:—

"All those contiguous parts (together coloured brown on the map annexed hereto) of the parishes of Latton and Eisey which lie to the east of the middle of the road leading from Cricklade to Marston Meysey, but not including the area annexed to the parish of Castle Eaton under Part One of this Schedule."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 18th day of September, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Carlisle (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Brough under Stainmore and the benefice of Stainmore, both situate in the diocese of Carlisle.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The Benefice of Brough under Stainmore and the benefice of Stainmore shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Brough with Stainmore' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.*

"(a) If upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the benefice of Stainmore shall be vacant the union shall forthwith take effect.

"(b) If upon that day the said benefice of Stainmore shall be full the union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacation thereof and the incumbent (if any) at the relevant date of the benefice of Brough under Stainmore shall be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Brough under Stainmore shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice, and the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Stainmore and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith if it shall not have been sold or disposed of under the Parsonages Measure, 1938, before the taking effect of this union

or shall not at that time be in process of being disposed of under that Measure shall, as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by us, the said Church Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and the net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be appropriated and held by us for the augmentation of the endowment of the united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect in every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice the patron of the benefice of Brough under Stainmore shall have the first and second turns and the patron of the benefice of Stainmore shall have the third turn."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, the Union of Benefices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Spencer, Bishop of Peterborough (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Grendon and the benefice of Castle Ashby both situate in the diocese of Peterborough.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Grendon and the benefice of Castle Ashby shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Grendon with Castle Ashby' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Wallace Harrison Cauldwell if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Grendon shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto) be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage house.* (a) Upon the union taking effect and pending the provision at Grendon of a house approved by us as suitable to be the house of residence for the incumbent of the united benefice, the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Grendon shall be the house of residence for the incumbent of the united benefice.

"(b) Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Castle Ashby, and, upon the provision at Grendon of a house as aforesaid, the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Grendon, and the sites and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Church Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient.

"(c) So much of the net proceeds of such sales as we after consulting with the Bishop for the time being of the diocese shall deem necessary shall be applied by us towards the cost of providing or acquiring at Grendon a house as aforesaid and any balance of the said net proceeds shall constitute and
