WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 9th day of October, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pur-suance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Saint Rumbold, Shaftesbury, and Melbury Abbas, both in the Shaftesbury, and M diocese of Salisbury.

"Whereas we are satisfied that it is desirable that the boundaries of the said parishes should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"And whereas the Right Reverend William, Bishop of Salisbury, consents to the proposed arrangements (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme):

"Now therefore we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme the boundaries of the said parishes of Saint Rumbold, Shaftesbury, and Melbury Abbas shall be altered in the manner described in the Schedule and delineated on the map annexed to this Scheme.

"THE SCHEDULE.

"The territory (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) to be annexed to the parish of Melbury Abbas :-

"All that part of the parish of Saint Rumbold, Shaftesbury (otherwise known as Cann), which is bounded upon the south by the parish of Melbury Abbas, upon the south by the parish of Melbury Abbas, upon the east by the parish of Donhead Saint Mary, and upon the remaining sides by an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary which divides the parish of Donhead Saint Mary, from the parish of Saint Rumbold, Shaftesbury, (or Cann) on the wall or fence which divides close numbered 549 on the map annexed bergto from close numbered 51 and continuing hereto from close numbered 81 and continuing thence generally westwards along the last mentioned wall or fence and along the walls or fences which divide close numbered 548 from closes numbered 81 and 547 and continuing thence southwards to and westwards along the middle of the track or footpath leading from Cannfield Farm to the main road from Shaftesbury to Melbury Abbas to a point opposite the northern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the premises attached to the lodge or cottage on the southern side of the last-mentioned track or footpath and continuing thence southeastwards to and along the last-mentioned wall or fence to its end and thence southwestwards along the wall or fence on the south eastern side of the lastmentioned lodge or cottage to a point opposite its south western end in the middle of the last-mentioned road, and continuing thence southeastwards along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of 41 chains or thereabouts to a point opposite the middle of another road leading to Foot's Hill and continuing thence first west-wards and then southwestwards to and along the middle of this last-mentioned road to a point opposite the northwestern end of the wall or fence forming the southwestern boundary of close num-bered 574 and continuing thence southeastwards to and along the last-mentioned wall or fence to the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Rumbold, Shaftesbury, from the parish of Melbury Abbas.

And whereas the provisions of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, relating to the preparation and sub-mission of this Scheme, have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Measure :

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 14th day of October, 1952, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pur-suance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949. 1936, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949. now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Carlisle (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Staveley and the benefice of Kentmere both situate in the diocese of Carlisle.

" SCHEME.

"1. Union of Benefices. The benefice of Staveley and the benefice of Kentmere shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Staveley with Kentmere', but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. Taking effect of union. Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Eric Edwin Oliver if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Staveley shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. Parsonage house. Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Staveley shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice, and the parsonage house at present belonging to the bene-fice of Kentmere and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith, if at the date when the union takes effect they have not already been sold under the provisions of the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, shall, as soon as conveniently may be, be sold and disposed of by the said Church Commissioners. and disposed of by the said Church Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient, and in either case the net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be applied by us as follows, that is to say:

(a) so much of the net proceeds as after con-sultation with the bishop of the diocese we shall deem sufficient shall be applied towards the cost of the modernisation and improvement of the par-sonage house of the united benefice in accordance with plans to be approved by us, and (b) the balance (if any) shall be appropriated and held by us for the augmentation of the united benefice of Staveley with Kentmere."

And whereas the provisions of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1936, the Union of Bene-fices Rules, 1926 and 1930, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, relating to the preparation and submission of this Scheme have been duly complied with:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to affirm the said Scheme and to order that it shall be and become effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette.
