

(b) an interview before the Final Interview Board, which will award a mark out of a maximum of 300 for the candidate's record, intelligence, and personal qualities.

(ii) The final order of merit will be determined by the total marks gained in the whole examination. In the event of a tie between two or more candidates the Commissioners will decide which to declare successful.

7. Candidates Trained as Teachers.

Candidates who have been trained as teachers and upon whose training public money has been spent cannot be appointed until the consent of the appropriate central education authority (e.g., the Ministry of Education, the Scottish Education Department, the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland) has been notified to the Commissioners.

8. Assignment.

The Commissioners will decide to which Government Department each successful candidate is to be assigned. A candidate who declines to accept the post offered will have no claim to be assigned to another, but will be regarded as having declined appointment. Assignments will be made in accordance with the needs of the public service, but the wishes of candidates will, where possible, be taken into account.

9. Canvassing.

Any attempt on the part of candidates to enlist support for their applications through Members of Parliament or other influential persons, except as referees to be named by them in their Application Forms, will disqualify them for appointment.

10. Fee.

The total fee payable by all candidates is £4. Of this £2 must be paid on application.

3. Candidates may take optional subjects up to a total of 300 marks. A candidate who wishes to offer subjects the aggregate value of which exceeds 300 marks must name a subject to be marked on a reduced maximum in order to bring the aggregate to 300. This option cannot be exercised by a candidate who can reduce his aggregate to 300 by omitting one or more of the subjects he proposes to offer.

4. The following restrictions apply to particular optional subjects:—

(a) Industry and Trade (30), Money, Banking, and Exchange (31), Public Finance (32), Social Economics (33), may be taken only by candidates who offer General Economics (29) or any two of the following:—History of Political Thought (24), Political Theory (25), Political Organisation (26), Modern British Government (27).

(b) International Relations (28) may not be taken by a candidate who offers European History, Period 3 (8) or International Law (15).

(c) Candidates may not offer more than two of the three periods of English Literature (59-61).
