Rome, November 3. N. S.

THE Venetian Ambassador had a long Audience of the Pope yesterday, upon the Occasion (as is said) of the Duke of Savoy's Declaring for the Allies. The Differences between that Duke and this Court, touching the Right of Presentation to the Ecclesiastical Preferments in Piedmont, are finally adjusted. The first Instant Prince Vaheni was released from his Confinement in the Castle of St. Angelo, upon condition, that he should immediately repair to Orvieto, and should not go out of that Town without the Pope's exprefs Permission. The Inquisition has proceeded against several of the Persons lately taken up for Heresie, and condemned some to the Gallies, others to Banishment, and some to perpetual Imprisonment.

Venice, November 10. An Agent of the Duke of Savoy arrived here the 29th past from Turin, who has since had Audience of the Senate, to whom he notified the Duke his Masters Declaration in favour of the Confederates, against France and Spain, and invited them to follow the same Measures, in order to the putting a speedier end to the War in Italy. A Felucca arrived here the last week from Durazzo, which came from thence in 16 days; She left the Venetian Admiral Cornaro, with the Squadron under his Command, cruizing on the Coast of Dalmatia, and just before her departure they had given chase to 3 Ships belonging to Tripoli, had forced one of them on shore near Durazzo, and had taken her: She carried 16 Guns and 150 Men. Letters from the Imperial head Quarters at Ostiglia say, that General Staremberg, having left a sufficient number of Troops to secure that Post, and those of Mirandole, Concordia, and Revere, had divided the rest of his Forces into two Bodies, whereof one was marching towards Mantua, and the other towards the Parmesan. Letters from Constantinople say, a considerable Party appeared there in favour of the Sultan, lately deposed; so that the Ottoman Empire is likely to be engaged in such Disorders, as will not permit its giving any Disturbance for some time to the neighbouring States.

Copenhagen, November 20. Three Dutch Men of War came into the Sound the 15th Instant, with 7 Merchant Ships, being part of their outward bound Eastland Fleet, which failed from the Texel, under Convoy of 9 Men of War; the other 6, with the rest of the Merchant Ships, are put into some Port in Norway.

Vienna, November 17. Part of the Danish Forces under the Command of the Count de Reventlau, which were quartered about Passau, are marched towards the Frontiers of the Dip-

per Austria, where they are to be cantoned till farther Order; and a Garison of nine Battalions is left in Passau. General Herbeville has begun to bombard Amberg, the only Town remaining in the possession of the Bavarians in the Upper Palatinate, which it is hoped he may soon reduce, and then the Forces under his Command will take Winter Quarters in that Country. Count Serini died lately in Prison at Gratz in Stiria: He was the Son of Count Nicholas de Serini, who was Beheaded in the Year 1671. for a Conspiracy against the Emperor, and he himself had been condemned to perpetual Imprisonment in the Year 1683. for Rebellion. Letters from Hungary say, that the Count de Schlick, soon after the taking of Leventz from the Rebels in that Country, had been joined by 800 Hussars, under the Command of Count Cobary; 6 or 700 Soldiers, raised for Recruits, were come as far as Comorra, in order to join him, and two Companies of Rebels were come over to him.

Frankfurt, Novemb. 25. The Garison of Landau has been conducted to Philipsbourg, consisting of 3200 Men, whereof 1200 were sick or wounded: The Enemy, contrary to the Capitulation, plundered 15 of the Wagons which were allowed the Garison to carry away their Bagage. The French themselves cannot deny that this Siege has cost them a great number of Men, and that the Count de Frise, who was Governor of the Place, made a very brave Defence, having held out as long as he had any hopes of Relief, and till he had almost spent all his Ammunition. The French King has given the Government of that Town to Monsieur Laubanie, and has made Monsieur St. Maurice Governor of New Brisac. The 200 Men who were detached from this Garison to join the Body of Forces designed for the Relief of Landau, returned hither after the Battel near Spire. Our Loss in that Action proves less than was at first reported, and the Prince of Saxe Meiningen, the young Count of Nassau-Weilbourg, and several other Officers, who were thought to have been killed or taken Prisoners, are got safe to Mamb. im. The Prince of Hesse, and several other General Officers, have been 3 days at Mentz, where they have held several Conferences, to consult what Measures to take to hinder the French from reaping such Advantage as they might hope for from their Success in this Operation; and it is said they have resolved to draw together all the Forces they can, to observe the Enemy, and cover the Palatinate. Most of the Palatine Forces, under the Command of the Count de Nassau-Weilbourg, have repassed the Rhine, in order to return to the Lines at Stolhoffen, where there had been left no more than 4 Bar-

4 Battalions of Foot, 500 Horse of regular Troops, and 3000 Men of the Militia of the Dutchy of Wirtemberg. The Landgrave of Hesse, who was come as far as Manheim, with intent to have taken upon him the Command of the Confederate Forces near Spire, is returned home.

Kinsale, November 14. The *Neptune* of London, of 50 Tuns, *William Terry* Master, came in here the 9th Instant; as did also the next day the *Duke of Gloucester* of London, of 200 Tuns, *Daniel Bright* Commander, and the *Speedwell* of London, *John Thomkins* Master: This day came in the *Eagle* Galley of *Bristol*, of 250 Tuns, *John Temple* Master, and the *Dorrell* of London, *Roger Sprunge* Master, of 300 Tuns; all which Ships are come from *Jamaica*. Laden with Sugar, Cotton, &c. and are bound to London: Another Merchant Ship has put in here, which is bound from that Island to *Bristol*; as have also the *Benjamin* Storeship, of 170 Tuns in Ballast, from *Jamaica*: the *Nathaniel* of *Bristol*, of 50 Tuns, *Francis Thorpe* Master, from *Nevis*, and the *Lucretia*, of *Bristol*, of 40 Tuns, *Juslinian Hinkon* Master, from the same Place, all three bound for London. Her Majesty's Ship the *Bridgewater*, Captain *Griffith* Commander, is come in here this day from Cruizing.

Harwich, November 24. The 22d Instant Her Majesty's Ship the *Turk* was unfortunately driven by Strefs of Weather upon the *Shipwash*, but all the Men were saved except three.

Yarmouth, November 27. Yesterday and last night we had a very violent Storm, the Wind changing often from the S.S.W. to the W. and W.N.W. and in the morning we found that of about 500 Ships which lay in our Roads many were missing, which we suppose were drove off to Sea; some were forced on the Sands, and others have lost all their Masts. Her Majesty's Ship the *Reserve* foundred about 11 this morning, and all her Men were lost; but the *Lyn* and *Margate* ride fast, and the Wind is much abated, tho' still so high, that no Boats can be sent off to them.

Porsmouth, November 27. Last night we had a very violent Storm of Wind, which held at the heighth from 12 till about 5 this morning. We have in sight 6 or 7 Wrecks, 4 or 5 by the Eastward of *South-Sea Castle*, and two upon *Gilkeker Point*. We hear that all our Transports from *Ireland* ride it out, and are well, except the Loss of some of their Masts, which will be easily repaired.

Deale, Nov. 27. Yesterday it blew hard all day, and about midnight the Wind came on at S.W. and continued between that and the W.S.W. with such Violence, that out of about 160 Sail of Ships, of all sorts, which were in the *Downes*, the greatest part are drove off to Sea; many of those which are remaining are without any Masts, having cut them by the board, as we suppose to ride it out the better; 5 Sail, two of which are pretty big ones, are lost upon the *Goodwin Sand*. No Boat can yet be sent off; so that we know not the Particulars.

The Dutch Mails of Tuesday and Friday last are not yet come in.
