On Friday the 10th Instant we had the most dreadful Scene that has been known in that Part of the Country, or Memory of Man; Several Vessels, Hulks, and small Boats, received great Damage, and the Ships in the Roads were broken up by the Violence of the Sea, which was driven upon them by a South Westerly Wind, and has cut down one third part of the Coast, and three Villages over the Roads are also laid waste. A Frenchman, who was arrived four days before with the Squadron from the Indies, set out the Scene, that with the loss of the Men of force of his Ship, which they were forced to leave by the board; But Admiral Colomby, with the Squadron of Men of War and Transport Ships designed for the Expedition to Portugal, which was expected from the Roads to join those in the Magd., was driven to the Northward; and we have yet no other Account of him, than by the Men of force Vessel's hardly come into the Roads, who report, that he was forced by the Storm upon the Coast of Norway, and is now on his return from thence. Some small Vessel's in the Roads were drove upon the Sands; and an English Merchant Vessel R. S. S. 300 was cast away on the Coast of Norway. Of the Ships in the Magd., the V. g., an English Man of War, was driven ashore upon the Fjord-head, and is lost, but the Men on board her were saved; one of the English Sixth Rates, and each of the Transport Ships, ran aground, but are got off again with little Damage, except two or three which are entirely lost, and on board one of them 35 Soldiers were drowned; which, with what was lost out of other Vessel's, makes the number of those who were cast away between 40 and 50. The Royal Man of War, which was driven from the Longfjord, ran aground between the Gr. and Silver-Side; all the Men and Guns on board her, and most of her Tackle, are brought on Shore. The Monitor Bonaparte was stranded at Cagliari, but the Men were saved, and the Mortar-piece and Guns on board her are also preserved. Sir George Rose wrote from hence the 10th to the 27th, to give Directions for repairing the Damage which the English Ships in the Magd. had sustained; and such Care has been taken, that both those and the Dutch will be in a condition in a fortnight for the Expedition to Portugal, notwithstanding this unfortunate Accident. Sir George is since returned hither. The Dutch home-ward bound Flgs. Fleet is arrived in the Roads: They were out at Sea on the 7th, and were not sensible of any Storm; yet we hear from Hamburg, Lubeck, and other Places to the Northward, that it has reached thither, too; it was the less violent the further it went to the North-East.

This day Mr. Secretary, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, presented a Memorial to the States, instituting upon the Conveniences of the stop of all Posts, and of all Letters, Bills, and all other Correspondence, Trade and Commerce, with Her Majesty's Enemies. The King of Spain has appointed the Count de Mafay to be his Envoy to the States General, and the Count de Zuniga to take Care of the Administration of Affairs in the Duchy of Languedoc (whereof he has taken Possession) as to Civil Matters; but the States General continue in Possession of the Military Government thereof. The Count de Mafay and the Count de Zuniga are expected here in a day or two from Paris, the former being sent Envoy Extraordinary from that Duke to Her Majesty of Great Britain, and the other being appointed to reside here.
