Black Sea, but are put into a Bay of the Bosphorus, and will not come into Port till the Money be ready for paying off the Seamen, which will be in few days. The Captain Bashaw remains with the Tarkish Galleys about the Streights of Crimes, where they have begun feveral Forts, with a Delign to make themselves Masters of that Raffige, and to hinder the Muscovices from coming down with their Fleet into the Black Sea; to which end they have also funk several Vessels, filled with Stones, in the Chanel: But it is thought by fome who have feen these Works that all this is done to very little purpose, the Passage being too wide to be commanded by their Cassles, and the Current so strong, that it carries away all that is sunk in it, and will not suffer the Sands to gather there. The Musewites gave them no Disturbance, but came and viewed their Works, and had a free Entercourse with them. This Government is providing Money to pay off the Soldiery, towards which 500 Purses of Money have been exacted from the Waywode of Wilachia, who, upon Payment thereof, has been confirmed by the Grand Signior. The English Merchant Ships bound to Smirna arrived there the 2d Instant, under Convoy of the Lenex and Dover Men of War.

Liebon, Dec. 5 N. S. The Spanish Envoy, who late-ly resided here, arrived at Elvas the 28th of the last Month, and is to continue there till the King of Portugal's Envoy comes to Badajos, which we suppose will be to day or to morrow, after which they are to be exchanged on the Frontier. When the Spanish Envoy left this Court, he dispatched an Express to the Duke of Anjon to acquaint him with it; and the King of Portugal lent mother to his Envoy at Madrid, with Orders to come away immediately, without taking Leave, otherwife than in writing: This last Express a riving at Madrid some hours before the other, and a Report being industriously spread abroad, that the Spanish Envoy had been killed, or was detained here, two Al-caides de Corte, with a numerous Train of Alguaziles, were sent to surround the Purrugueze Envoy's House, and to take care that no body should go in or out with-our being examined; which Commission they executed with great Rudenels and Difrespect, as well to his Person as his Character; But upon the Arrival of the other Express, that Court finding in how different a manner their Envoy here had been treated to whom all the Kindnels and Favour had been shewn which he could expect, they ordered the Alcuides and Alguaziles to leave the Envoy's House, and writ a Letter to him to excule it. The King of Portugal refeats this Proceeding very much. Every thing is in a readiness for the King of Spain's Reception, and the Forces on the Frontiers are in a Posture to oppose any Attempt the spaniards might make before his Arrival. The spamish Soldiers on the Frontiers desert daily in great numbers, and enter themselves into this King's Service. On the first of this Month two Brigadiers-General of Horse, two Aid de Camps, with a Captain of Horse, and several others, to the number of 22, got away from Badajas to Olivenca: They are fince come to Town, and lodge at the Almirante of Castille's; and in all probability they will soon be followed by many
