WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 16th day of April, 1953, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Thomas, Bishop of Carlisle (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Saint Lawrence, Appleby, the benefice of Saint Michael, Appleby, and the benefice of Murton cum Hilton all situate in the diocese of Carlisle.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Saint Lawrence, Appleby, the benefice of Saint Michael, Appleby, and the benefice of Murton cum Hilton, shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Appleby, Saint Lawrence, with Saint Michael and Murton cum Hilton,' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend William Robert Moffett Chaplin, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Saint Lawrence, Appleby, shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage house.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Saint Lawrence, Appleby, shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the benefices alternately, the patron of the benefices of Saint Michael, Appleby, and Murton cum Hilton having the first presentation to the united benefice to be made after the union.

"5. *Employment of a curate or clerical or lay assistance.* Upon the union taking effect (a) the incumbent shall, in order to assist him in performing the duties of the united benefice, employ a curate or such other clerical or lay assistance as the Bishop of Carlisle may from time to time direct, and (b) there shall be appropriated as a fund towards the cost of providing such assistance as aforesaid a part of the endowments of the united benefice, that is to say, a capital sum sufficient to produce an annual income of £300 and being part of larger sums at present held by us for the endowment of the said benefices and the said annual income shall be paid by us to the diocesan board of finance of the said diocese as trustees to apply the same accordingly."

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Ecclesiastical Commissioners (Powers) Measure, 1938, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme) for effecting the union of the benefice of Benacre with Easton Bavent and Covehithe, the benefice of Henstead and the benefice of Wrentham all situate in the diocese of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

"SCHEME.

"1. *Union of benefices.* The benefice of Benacre with Easton Bavent and Covehithe, the benefice of Henstead, and the benefice of Wrentham shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Wrentham with Benacre, Covehithe and Henstead,' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.*

"(a) If upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the benefice of Wrentham shall be vacant, the union shall forthwith take effect.

"(b) If upon that day the benefice of Wrentham shall be full the union shall take effect immediately upon the next vacation thereof.

"3. *Parsonage house.* Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Wrentham shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. *Patronage.* After the union has taken effect in every series of three successive turns of presentation or nomination to be made to the united benefice, the patron of the benefice of Wrentham shall have the first turn, the patron of the benefice of Benacre with Easton Bavent and Covehithe shall have the second turn, and the patron of the benefice of Henstead shall have the third turn.

"5. *Clerical and lay assistance.* After the union has taken effect the incumbent of the united benefice shall, in order to assist him in performing the duties of the united benefice, employ a curate or such other clerical or lay assistance as the Bishop of the diocese shall from time to time direct.

"6. *Diversion of endowments.* Upon the union taking effect a part of the endowments of the united benefice, namely a capital sum sufficient at that date to produce an annual income of £394 and being part of a larger capital sum held by us, the said Church Commissioners, for the benefit of the benefice of Benacre with Easton Bavent and Covehithe shall be severed and diverted from that benefice and from the united benefice and shall be transferred to and held by us, the said Church Commissioners, as part of and for the benefit of our General Fund and in consideration of the said transfer we shall make out of the said General Fund such periodical payments to the diocesan stipends fund of the said diocese as we from time to time determine to be equitable having regard to the value of the said endowments."
