**O**N the 27th of the last Month Her Majesty's Ship the *Blackwall*, Captain *Samuel Martin* Commander, brought in here a *French Privateer* of 12 Guns and 120 Men, which he took in this Latitude; as also an *Irish Ship* bound hither, which had been taken the day before by the said Privateer.

*Copenhagen, Jan. 15.* Messieurs *Rantzau* and *Harboe*, two Majors-General, who command the *Danish Forces* in the *Netherlands*, are lately arrived here from thence. Major-General *Gersdorf* is appointed to go to *Hungary*, to command the Forces of this Crown in the Emperor's Service; in the room of the young Count of *Rantzau*, who is recalled from that Employment. It is said, that the King intends to make a Journey to *Norway* in the Spring. We hear that the *Saxon Prisoners* lately brought to *Sweden* are to be sent to *Holstein*, at the Request of the Administrator of that Dutchy, to be formed into two Regiments of Foot.

*From the Imperial head Quarter at Ostiglia, January 4.* The 27th past a Party of the Enemy passed over the *Secchia* above *Bondanella*; but General *Trautsmansdorf*, to whom the Count *de Staremberg* has left the Command of the Imperial Forces in these Parts, being thereabouts with a Detachment of Horse, soon obliged the Enemy to retire. Soon after the same Party, having been joined by a strong Detachment both of Horse and Foot, passed over the River a second time below *Bondanella*, and fell upon a Battalion of the Regiment of *Bagni*, commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel *Hoffman*, who at first was obliged to give Ground, but upon a second Attack repulsed the Enemy with such Bravery, that they were forced to retire with precipitation, leaving 100 of their Men dead upon the place, and a Lieutenant and 7 Men more taken Prisoners: On our side a Major and 14 private Men were killed, and two were wounded. We hear the Enemy are intrenching themselves near

*Cenningberg, January 18.* Letters from *Warsaw* say, the Cardinal Primate was come thither; as were also a Commissioner from the King of *Sweden*, and the Chief of the Confederated Nobility of *Poland* and *Prussia*, in order to confer together upon the Measures to be taken in the present Juncture. General *Reinschild*, with a Body of *Swedish Forces*, is marching towards the Weywoodship of *Cracow*, and a Party of 300 of them is advanced to *Pulow*, where they exact great Contributions.

*Bast, January 19.* They write from *Turin*, That the Count *de Staremberg* joined the Duke of *Savoy* on the 14th Instant, with the best part of the Imperial Army under his Command, after having in his March had several successful Encounters with the

*French*, particularly at *Voghera*, where, tho' the latter give out that the *Germans* had 1000 Men killed, wounded and taken Prisoners, we are assured that their Loss was inconsiderable. Letters from *Savoy* say, the Marquis *de Sales*, with the Body of the Duke of *Savoy's* Forces under his Command, is marched towards the Valley of *Aousta*; and that the *French Forces* under the Marshal *de la Feuillade* are drawing towards *Montmeilan*.

*Nancy, January 24.* Letters from *Paris* give an Account, That the Marshals of *Villeroy*, *Boufflers*, *Vauban*, *Tallard*, *Villars* and *Harcourt*, were expected at Court, to be present at a great Council of War which was to be held there, for concerting the Measures for carrying on the War the next Campaign: That the Ministry there was employed in framing new Projects to raise Money for that Service, and (among others) had agreed to erect new Offices in each Diocese, to regulate the Proportions which the Clergy are to pay towards the Free Gift, usually granted by them every year, by the Sale of which Employments they hoped to raise about 700000 Crowns. The *Camisars* continue to make Excursions; and it is said the *French King* has resolved to augment the Forces employed to suppress them, and for that purpose has countermanded part of those which are designed to be sent as Auxiliaries to *Spain*. The Marshal *de Montrevel*, who commanded the King's Forces in the *Severnies*, is recalled, and the Grand Prior is to command there in his room.

*Frankfurt, January 27.* The Diet of the Circle of the *Upper Rhine* is assembled here, to agree upon the necessary Measures to be taken for bringing their Forces into the Field early the next Campaign. The Elector Palatine arrived the 14th Instant at *Erffurt*, and the next day continued his Journey to *Vienna*, intending to take his way by *Leipsick*, where he was to arrive the 28th Instant. We have now a very hard Frost; and the Landgrave of *Hesse* being apprehensive lest the *French* should take this opportunity of making an Attempt upon *Rhinfeld*, he has augmented that Garrison to 1500 Men, and cantoned 3 Regiments thereabouts, who, upon occasion, may be drawn together under the Cannon of that Place in less than two hours time. A *French Party-man*, with about 20 Soldiers and some Boors, endeavoured lately to pass over the *Rhine* between *Dienhausen* and *Hambach*, but by that time they were got half way over the Ice broke, and most of them perished. We hear the like has happened to another *French Party* between *Spire* and *Worms*. Letters from *Swabia* give an Account, That the Marshal *de Marlin* returned the 17th Instant from his Expedition on the other side the *Danube*, having possessed himself of *Wendingen*, *Pappenheim* and *Monheim*. It was said, he had a Design upon *Nardlingen*; but that was prevented by the Duke of *Wirtemberg*, who had got together a Body of 6 or 7000 Men to oppose him. The Marquis *de Blainville*, who was marched out of *Ulm* with another Detachment, is also returned.

returned thither. The Bavarians are carrying away to Munich all the Cannon, Stores and Ammunition, belonging to the Arsenal of Augsburg; to the great Grief of the Inhabitants of that Place. The Elector of Bavaria was shortly expected at Munich, having, as it was said, resolved to leave to his Generals the Care of attacking Linz, and getting in the Contributions which he has demanded of the neighbouring Country. Letters from Vienna of the 19th say, Prince Eugene returned thither the day before from Presbourg, having left the Command of the Imperial Forces to General Palfi, whom the Emperor had lately made Ban of Croatia, in the room of Count Batthiani, deceased; which Choice has given so great Satisfaction to all the Inhabitants of that Province, that it will be no small inducement to them to contribute cheerfully all they are able towards the suppressing of the Rebellion in Hungary, if the Negotiation, which is said to be on foot for bringing Matters to an amicable Composition, does not prove successful.

**Portsmouth, Jan. 27.** Yesterday about noon the King of Spain came on shore at this Place: His Majesty was met at the Water-side by the Mayor and Corporation in their Formalities, and the Cannon round the Town was discharged at his Landing.
