Term, January 25. The Imperial Forces under the Command of General Staremberg having all joined the Duke of Savoy's Army the 14th Instant at Gova, they marched the 17th to St. Antien; where a general Council of War was

held, at which the Count d'Aversberg, the Emperor's Minister, was present: It was there resolved, that the Army should go in 0 Quarters of Refreshment, till the Season should be more proper to take the Field, the Weather being now severe, and the Snow very deep; In the mean time the Imperialists will receive their heavy Bagage, which could not follow them in their hasty March, without disappointing their Design. The 21st they marched to *Condonato*, not far from *Feruz*, near which Place it had been resolved the Forces should be cantoned, as they were accordingly, the Horse on one side of the *Po*, and the Foot on the other. They took Post at *Piova* and *Maresingo*, two great Villages in that part of the *Montferrat*, which belong to the Duke of *Mantua*, and by this means a considerable Body of them was quartered within that Duke's Territories. The Forces being gone into Quarters, the Duke of *Savoy* returned hither yesterday, and Mr. *Hill*, Her Majesty of *Great Britain's* Envoy Extraordinary, and Monsieur *Van der Meer*, Envoy from the States *Gene* al, are to have Audience of his Royal Highness this afternoon. The Duke of *Vendosme*, who, with the *French* and *Spanish* Troops under his Command, has for some time kept within a small distance of the Confederate Army to observe their Motions, marched lately in Person at the head of all his *Granadiers*, to endeavour to drive our Forces out of some of their Quarters in the *Montferrat*; but this Design was disappointed, by the great Care which our Duke had taken to provide for the Security of our Posts, and to preserve a good Discipline among his Troops, not permitting any Officer to be absent from his Command under any pretence whatsoever. In the mean time the Militia of *Piedmont*, commanded by the *Marquis de Prula*, does very much incommode the *French* Army, and kill abundance of their Men; The Enemy, in Revenge, lately sent a strong Party into an open Village of *Piedmont*, where they put all the Inhabitants to the Sword. There being Advice, that the *French* Forces in *Savoy*, under the Command of the Duke *de la Feuillade*, are marching towards the Valley of *Susa*, a considerable Detachment is sent that way to oppose them. The Governor of *Nice*, with about 100 Men of his Garrison, has surpris'd the Castle of *St. Laurent* in *Provence*, killed or taken Prisoners about 50 Men who were in Garrison there, and plundered the Village. The Governor of *Vilvafranca* is committed to Prison for having neglected his Duty; and it is said he is farther accused of Corresponding with *France*. Among other Prisoners of War brought in here, a *Capucin* has been discovered, who was disguised in a Trooper's Habit, and has served the *French* as a Spy; He is under close Confinement. Several of the Duke of *Savoy's* Officers who were seized by the *French*, when his Troops in their Service were disarm'd, have found the Means to make their Escape: And some of them got to *Genoa*, where the *French* seized them, and carried them back to *Milan*: The Senate complain'd of this Violence to the Duke *de Vendosme*, and demanded the Restitution of them, but upon a Refusal, and some haughty Expressions; the Senate Arrested the *French* Vessels in this Port; whereupon the Duke has been contented to restore the Officers, and the Senate has released the Vessels. We are assur'd, that the *Venetian* Resident at *Milan* has had Guards set upon him, and is confined to his House, by way of Reprisal for the same thing done to the *Spanish* Minister at *Venice*. The *French* King's Ambassador to our Duke continues at *Comi*, in order to his being Exchanged for the Count *de Vermon*, his Royal Highness's Ambassador in *France*; and the *Spanish* and *Bavarian* Ministers here are both under Confinement.

*Copenhagen, February 21.* The King of Denmark has given Orders for an Augmentation of his Forces, to be made by adding 16 Men to each Company of Foot, and there is also a Discourse of raising several new Regiments of Horse and Foot, and of fitting out a Squadron of Men of War in the Spring: It is said that the King intends, after the Easter Holy-days, to make a Progress to Norway.

*Vienna, Jan. 30.* The Elector Palatine arrived here the 25th Instant, as Prince Charles of Newbourg his Brother did the next day, and they have since had several Conferences with the Emperor and the King of the Romans. We have received an Account, That the Elector of Bavaria, who was advanced with part of his Forces to *Beyerback*, having received Advice that General *Gransfeldt* was marching against him with 2

Body of 3000 Regular Troops, and 15000 Militia, he retired from thence to Scarding, having left a strong Garrison in Passau. The Country People on the Borders of Austria have taken Arms for their Defence, and have had several successful Encounters with the Bavarians. Berceni, one of the Chief of the Rebels in Hungary, has sent his Secretary hither, with Instructions, as is supposed, to treat of an Accommodation. General Haister is appointed to command the Forces which are employed against those Rebels; and the Regular Forces which are made use of in this Service being thought sufficient to put a stop to their further Progresses, the Militia have leave given them to return home for some time, the Season not being proper for Action; for which reason also Prince Ragotzi, the Chief in this Rebellion, has cantoned his Troops along the Theys, and has changed the Siege of Zarnar into a Blockade. The Count de Caroli, who came lately into the Lower Hungary with a Body of Rebels, not finding the Inhabitants there disposed to join him, is returned into the Upper Hungary.

Zurich, Jan. 30. The French Coin a great number of Pieces of 10 Sous and 5 Sous each, of a very coarse Alloy, to pay their Soldiers, and draw all the Species they can out of these Parts to convert them into that Money. They have set up a sort of Paper Credit at Strasbourg, where they pay their Officers in Bills, to be answered in Paris, who cannot be paid in ready Money without discounting. Our Advices from Italy say, the French meet with great Difficulties in Recruiting their Foot and Remounting their Cavalry, which is entirely ruined. The Republick of Genoa seems not inclined to permit the French Troops to pass through its Territories, till some Regulations are made for preventing any Disorders of the Soldiers in their March, and for limiting the number, and settling the manner of their Subsistence.

Dresden, February 2. The King of Poland left this Place the 29th inst, in order to return to Cracow, and intends to go by the way of Prague. The States of this Electorate are assembled, to consider of raising the Supplies demanded of them by His Majesty, which it is said they will do by laying a general Excise upon all sorts of Provisions.

Frankfort, February 7. The French have been endeavouring to open a Passage through the Black-Forest, in order to send Supplies to the Marshal de Marini, who commands the French Forces in Swabia, but they have been prevented by the Vigilance of General Thungen, whose Forces have routed one of their Parties, and killed 200 of them on the Spot. The Troops commanded by that General are in Motion, and seem to draw towards Noidlingen; and it is said, that the Duke of Wirtemberg intends to put himself at the head of them. They write from Heilbronn, that it was reported, that there had been an Action between them and the French under the Command of the Marshal de Marini, wherein the latter lost above 2000 Men; but we must expect a more certain and particular Account before we give Credit to it.

Hague, February 12. N. S. The Deputies of the States General were on the 7th Instant a third time in Conference with the Duke of Marlborough, and his Grace is preparing for his return to England with the first fair Wind. The Deputies of the several Admiralties, pursuant to the Summons sent them, are come hither, to confer with Sir David Mitchell, who came lately from England to settle divers Matters relating to the Sea Service. The Transport Ships, with the rest of the Forces appointed for the Expedition to Portugal, are all in a readiness to sail from Helvoet-Sluice, as soon as the Wind permits. The States of Holland are to meet to-morrow, and it is said, will take into Consideration the Objections made to their late Nomination of General Officers by the Provinces of Friseland and Groningen, which insist upon the Prince of East-Friseland's being made a General of Foot. Mr. Stepney, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary to the Emperor, being lately come back from England, went from hence this morning, in order to return to Vienna, and takes his way by Hanover, Berlin and Dresden. Our Letters from Germany do all agree, that the Elector of Brvaria is retired from the Frontiers of Austria towards Scharding. Some Advices from Vienna say, the Emperor has accepted the Mediation of some Foreign Powers, for accommodating the Differences between him and the Malecontents in Hungary.

Falmouth, February 5. This day Her Majesty's Ships the *Hector* and *Loce*, sailed hence to the Eastward, having under their Convoy 5 Tin Ships bound to London, 3 West-India Men, and 9 or 10 Coasters.

Portsmouth, February 8. The 6th Instant, in the afternoon, Sir George Rooke, with Her Majesty's Fleet under his Command, having on board the King of Spain, sailed from Spithead to St. Hellens, with the Wind at N. E. but the same night it came to the N. and by break of day the next morning to the N. W. and so continues: And the Fleet is still at St. Hellens, in a readiness to proceed as soon as the Wind permits.

St. James's, February 7. Yesterday was Her Majesty's Birth-day; but it being Sunday, the Celebration of it was deferred till this day, when Her Majesty received the usual Compliments from the Nobility, the Foreign Ministers, and

other Persons of Quality of both Sexes; and there was a very great and splendid Appearance at Court upon this Occasion.
