Rome, Jan. 26. N. S.

THE 14th Instant was observed here as a day of publick Thanksgiving, for our Deliverance from the Earthquake which happened that day was Twelve-month; and the Pope visited the Churches of *Santa Maria Maggiore*, and *San Giovanni di Laterano*, and performed some extraordinary Acts of Devotion. He has strictly forbid here the Diversions of the Carnival, in consideration of the present War between the Princes of *Christendom*. Cardinal *Pignatelli*, who lately came hither from *Poland*, where he has resided with the Character of the Pope's Nuncio, is on his departure for *Naples*, of which Place he is Archbishop. The Differences between this Court and the Duke of *Savoy* are not entirely adjusted; but we hear that Duke has given full Power to Cardinal *Barberini* to settle all Matters relating thereto, which are yet undetermined.

Turin, February 1. Mr. *Hill*, Envoy Extraordinary from Her Majesty of *Great Britain*, had Audience of the Duke and Dutcheffs of *Savoy*, on the 19th past; on which day Monsieur *Vandermeer*, Envoy from the States General, had Audience likewise of their Royal Highnesses. The *Bavarian* Minister is ordered to depart from hence; the like Orders having been given by that Elector to the Minister of *Savoy* residing at his Court. Our Forces continue in their Winter Quarters, which form a Line from *Alba* through the Territory of *Asto* and the *Upper Manserras to Moran*, within a short League of *Casal*, and thence to *Verai*, where there is a very strong Garison. The *German* Forces under the Command of General *Straem-berg* are mostly quartered in the Country of *Novara*. The Governor of *Nice* being marched from thence with a Detachment of his Garison, has taken a small Castle in *Provence*, near *Gattiere*; and a Lieutenant-Colonel, a Captain, 2 or 3 Subaltern Officers, and 80 private Men, who were there in Garison, remain Prisoners of War. He has also made several Excursions, and greatly alarmed that Country. The *Vandois* continue to make Excursions into *Dauphine*, with very good Success.

Venice, Feb. 2. Signior *Gradinigo* being lately made Procurator of *St. Mark*, took possession of that Dignity on the 28th past. Letters from *Ostiglia* give an Account, that the Count *de Trautsmansdorf*, who has the chief Command of the Emperor's Forces on that side, had taken from the *French* the Posts of *Bonpuorto* and *Bastiglia*, in which last Place were about 100 *French* Soldiers, and some Militia, who were all killed or taken Prisoners; and the *German* Forces took also three Pieces of Cannon, which the *French* had there. The *French* have since quitted *Finale di Modena* and *San Felice*, to reinforce their Garison at *Modena*; and the Imperialists have likewise possessed themselves of those Posts, and will endeavour to recover *Modena* also out of the hands of the Enemy.

Vienna, Febr. 9. The Elector Palatine continues here, and is frequently in Conference with the Emperor, the King of the *Romans*, and Prince *Eugene*, in or-

der to settle the Measures for carrying on the War in *Germany* more effectually the next Campaign. The Imperial and the *Bavarian* Forces on the Frontiers of *Austria* continue in their Winter Quarters; and the Elector of *Bavaria* is at *Munich*, enjoying the Diversions of the Carnival. The Country People in *Tirol* have made an Incursion into *Bavaria*, wherein they forced the *Bavarian* Lines, killed 400 Men of that Elector's Forces, and took 16 Pieces of Cannon, and got a very considerable Sum in Contributions, the Monastery of *Stooster Beyeren* alone having been forced to pay them 16000 Guilders. They keep the Town of *Kuffstein*, which is still in the hands of the *Bavarians*, closely blocked up, and the Garison there is reduced to great Streights. The Bishop of *Colozza* has sent hither the Demands of the Malecontents in *Hungary*, with a Proposal in what manner how they may be satisfied, without any Diminution of the Emperor's Dignity; so that we hope these Troubles will soon be at an end.

Hague, Febr. 22. N. S. The States of *Holland* and *Westfriseland* are assembled, and have under Consideration a Proposal made by the Elector of *Mentz*, the Elector Palatine, and Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, who desire to borrow of them 250000 Crowns, upon certain Securities, to be employed in the carrying on of the War in *Germany*. The Nomination of General Officers to command the Forces of this State the next Campaign is not yet agreed upon: The Deputies of the Provinces of *Friseland* and *Groningen*, in the Assembly of the States General, have declared, that those Provinces will insist upon the young Prince of *Eastfriseland's* being made a General of Foot. The Duke of *Marlborough* is gone hence this evening to *Rotterdam*, in order to embark for *England*.

Dublin, Febr. 8. On Sunday the 6th Instant, being Her Majesty's Birth-day, the Nobility and Gentry then in Town waited on his Grace the Duke of *Ormond*, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom, at the Castle of *Dublin*, and from thence attended his Grace in great State to *Christ Church*, where a Sermon was preached by the Rt. Rev. the Lord Bishop of *Down* and *Connor*; His Grace afterwards returned in like manner to the Castle, and gave the Company a very splendid Entertainment; the great Guns round the Castle being thrice fired, and three Volleys by the Regiments of Foot, at Her Majesty's Health. Yesterday, being Monday, her Grace the Dutcheff of *Ormond* invited all the Ladies to a Play in the evening, of whom there was a very great Appearance; and from thence his Grace carried them to *St. Stephen's Green*, to see the Fire-works made on this Occasion; which being ended, the Company returned to the Castle; and after a very noble Supper, where none but the Duke and Dutcheffs and the Ladies sat, the remainder of the night was concluded with a Ball, and in the City with Bonfires, Illuminations, Firing of Beils, and other Demonstrations of publick Joy and Satisfaction suitable to the day.

Falmouth, Febr. 12. The Alliance Packet-Boat failed hence the 8th Instant for *Lisbon*. The same day came in two Dutch Privateers, who brought with them the *Elizabeth* of *Plymouth* homeward bound from *Barbadoes*, which had been 5 days in the possession of a *French* Caper.

Portsmouth, Febr. 15. Her Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Sir *George Rooke*, having on board the King of *Spain*, sailed again from *Spirithead* to *St. Hellers* the 12th Instant; and the next morning put to Sea for *Portugal*, with a fine Gale at *E.N.E.* and by one in the afternoon were all out of sight of this Place; and the Wind has continued fair ever since. Her Majesty's Ships the *Worcester*, *Nottingham* and *Tyger*, are just now arrived with the *French* Ships from *Holland*.

Holland, having on board the rest of the English Forces designed for Portugal, and several Merchant Ships, under their Convoy.

From on board the Royal Catherine off of Plymouth, Febr. 14. 5 in the morning. We are got thus far on our Voyage with a fair Wind, which I praye God, is like to continue. We are about 200 Sail of Ships.

Three Merchant Men of War came into the Humber the 12th Instant, with several Merchant Ships, to call for divers laden Merchant Ships, which waited for the Opportunity of this Convoy, to sail for Rotterdam.

Yarmouth, Febr. 14. Her Majesty's Ship the Winchester sailed hence this evening for Holland, with about 20 Sail of Ships, laden with Corn, under her Convoy.

Covent, Febr. 14. The Seven Provinces of Middlebourg, a Privateer of 26 Guns brought in here last night two French Prizes, one of 80 Tuns, laden with Sugar, &c. from the West-Indies; the other a Ship of 100 Tuns.

St. James's, Febr. 14. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough arrived here this morning from Holland.

Whitehall, Febr. 16. By a Vessel lately come in from Lisbon, which left that Place the first Instant, N. S. there is Advice, That Her Majesty's Ship the Panther, having on board the Prince of Hesse Darmstadt, and several other Passengers, came the night before into Calcais Road, having parted from the Fleet under the Command of Sir George Rooke, in the Latitude of 46: They had a Report at Lisbon, that a Squadron of French Men of War, and several Transport Ships with Soldiers on board, being sailed from Toulon towards Nice, did two days after their departure meet with a violent Storm at Sea, which did them considerable damage. This News is said to have come by two Frigates that are arrived at Cadix; but we must expect a more certain and particular Account by our next Maits from Portugal.
