" SCHEME.

"1. With the consents (testified by their signing this Scheme) of the Reverend Herbert Leslie Hobson this Scheme) of the Reverend Herbert Leslie Hobson as the incumbent of the said benefice of Awsworth and the Reverend Michael Faraday Giles as the incumbent of the benefice of Wollaton with Cossall, upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the chapelry of Cossall, being all that detached part of the benefice and parish of Wollaton with Cossall which comprises the civil parish of Cossall shall be severed from the remaining part of that benefice and parish and united to
