REGULATIONS FOR RECRUITMENT OF BOYS AND GIRLS TO GRADE 6 POSTS IN BRANCH B OF THE FOREIGN SERVICE.

Age.
 Cand'da'es must be at least 16 and under 18 years of age on 1st March, 1954.

But candidates who have served in any established post to which they were admitted with the certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, or who have served on established conditions except for sick leave and pension in a post to which such a certificate would normally apply, may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding two years which they may have spent in such service before 1st March, 1954.

 Candidates may be of either sex; but

3. Nationality.

(c) If not outlified under under (a) or (b) of this paragraph, they must satisfy the Commissioners that they are so closely connected with Her Majesty's dominions either by ancestry, upbringing or residence, or by reason of national service, that an exception may properly be made in their favour.
