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St. James's, March 8.

THE following Addresses from the Two Houses of Parliament in Ireland, have been transmitted hither by his Grace the Duke of Ormonde, Lord Lieutenant of that Kingdom.

To the Queen's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, by a grateful Sense of the many Blessings we enjoy by your Wise and Just Administration at home, and the Prosperous Success of your Armies abroad, humbly beg Leave to declare our Detestation of the Pernicious Designs which have lately been carried on in Scotland by Emissaries from France, to disturb the Happiness of your Glorious Reign.

And we assure Your Majesty, That we will at all times use our utmost Care to prevent, and our most hearty Endeavours to defeat all traitorous Conspiracies against Your Majesty, and to defend your Royal Person and Government, and maintain the Succession in the Protestant Line as limited by Law, against all Opposers.

And since Your Majesty has been pleased to express a just Concern for the Preservation of the Monarchy, and a Zealous REGARD to the Welfare of the Established Church; we further declare our unanimous Resolution of assisting Your Majesty, in transmitting them (evidently fitted to all Possibility, being fully perswaded, that as the one is the most happy Form of Government, so the other is the best Constituted Church in the World.

To the Queen's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses of Ireland, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Commons in Parliament assembled, most humbly beseech to Congratulate Your Majesty upon the happy Discovery of the late Pernicious Practices carried on in Scotland by the Emissaries of France against Your Majesty's Government, and the Peace of your Kingdoms.

We lie under so high Obligations to Your Majesty, and are so much interested in the Preservation of your Royal Person and Government, that we should be wanting in our Duty if on this and all other Occasions, we should not express our most Abhorrence of all Plots and Conspiracies against a Queen so Gracious, and so justly Intitled to the Love of Her Subjects. And we humbly beseech Your Majesty to accept our most sincere Assurance, That we will, to the utmost of our Power, Office and Support, Your Majesty, and your Government, against all your open and secret Enemies, maintain the succession of the Crown as settled in the Protestant Line, and the Church of Ireland as by Law established.

Constantinople, Jan. 8. N.S. On the 30th of October last the Janizar Aga Chebick Achmet Bishaw, to whom, among other Marks of Favour, the Grand Signior had done the extraordinary Honour of accepting an Entertainment at his House some days before, was, together with the late Bassangy Bey, and the Kihay Bey of the Janizaries, his Friends and Adherents, sent away upon a Galley into Exile. This Disgrace was very sudden and unexpected, and is imputed to his too eager pursuit of the Office of Grand Vizier, his Insolent Behaviour, and his Presumptuous assuming of too great an Authority, relying upon his Credit and Interest among the Soldiery, and the Support of those who were concerned in the late Revolution. But the Court had the Dexterity to turn his own Arms against himself, taking the Advantage of some Wrongs he was found to have done the Janizaries. The Government has since fined him in a considerable Sum of Money, and Mabanev Chebick Aga has succeeded him in the Command of Janizar Aga. The 2d of November, the first Publick Divan was held in the Seraglio, at which time an Acabasla-

dor from the Tusick Tatars was admitted to an Audience of the Grand Signior; and upon the same occasion the Janizaries, Topidis and Gogoris, had their Pay distributed to them, which passed without any Disturbance or Signs of Discontent. Thereupon 3 days after the Grand Vizier Achmet Bishaw, whose Parts and Capacity were very unequal to so great an Office, was deposed, and banished to Nicomedia, now called Izmire, having been forced to refund 300 Purses of the Money he had gotten since his Advancement, and Hassan Bishaw, the Rebah Caimacan, who has married the Grand Signior's Sister, was made Grand Vizier in his room, who made an end of paying the Soldiery, distributing to the Spahis what was due to them: His Promotion, which is undoubtedly owing to the Sultana Carrig, his Wife, and to the Valida Sultan, the Grand Signior's Mother, was a Surprise to every one; an Opinion having generally prevailed, that his Sultanah was unwilling to expose him to the Danger of that high Station, which otherwise the might have sooner procured for him. Many other Changes have since happened in the Ministry, and the most powerful of those that were the Authors or Promoters of the late Revolution are removed from their Employments, which being attributed to the Valida's Management, gives occasion to many to believe, that when Matters are settled according to the Grand Signior's Desire, she will prevail with him to return with the Court to Adrianople. In November a Discovery was made of Practices carried on by the Instigation of the late Janizar Aga's Friends, in order to excite a second Revolt, but the Court had the good Fortune to prevent it in time, by banishing the Spahilar Aga, the late Janizar Aga's Kibaya, and most of the Commanders of those Forces which the Malecontents had got together in order to bring about the late Revolution. Others of the Accomplices are fled, and strict Enquiry is making after them. There are arrived in this Port 7 Turkish Men of War from the Mediterranean, and the Archipelago; some of them from Alexandria, whence they have brought the Hafiz, or Treasure of Egypt, amounting to about 500000 Dollars in Money, besides Rice, Coffee, and other Goods for the use of the Seraglio. Three others Men of War are to remain in the Seraglio, till such time as they are relieved by 5, which are fitting out in the Arsenal of this Place, for the Winter Service. The late deposed Sultan Mustapha is dead of a Dropsey. About a fortnight ago an Envoy from the Grand Signior to the Emperor, parted hence, with above 30 Persons in his Retinue, for Vienna.

Cabinet, Febr. 23. N.S. The Panther Man of War arrived at Caucasus the 3d instant, with the Prince of Hesse-Darmstadt and his Family on board, who came on shore the next day. On the 12th instant arrived here a small Transport Ship with 12 Company of Colonel Braxell's Regiment; and on the 15th came in another with a Company of my Lord Massoy's, the Officers and Soldiers of these two Companies are now all on shore, and are quartered at Belen, in the Governor's House. The 16th died the Infanta Dona Theresa, eldest Daughter to the King of Portugal, who was about 8 years old; her Loss is so much lamented, that all publick Marks of Sorrow are ordered to be given in the same manner as if she had been of Age; and the Court will go into close Mourning upon this Occasion. The Infanta Dona Francisca, who is now the King's only Daughter, has also the Small-pox, but (as is believed) without any Danger. Our last Letters from Spain say, That a Dividend was making at Seville of the Money that had been sent thither from Segovia, which came by the last Flota; but the whole Sum to be divided amounts to little more than 3 Millions of Pieces of Eight, to the great

Entertainment of the Merchants who are concerned in it. At the first time that the Orders for dividing this Money came down from Madrid; there was also published very short Excommunications against every Person that should conceal any Effects belonging to the King or Duke, or any others that were taken out of France or Spain. Yet notwithstanding all the Arrangements that Court has made, employing as well the Spiritual as the Civil Authority to enforce those Effects, we do not hear of one Man that has betrayed his Trust, or discovered the Value of a Partition belonging to any Stranger. One of the three Ships which have been so long expected from Brazil is at last arrived at Cadiz; but the Commanders can give no Account of the other two, which it is supposed have been obliged to put into some Port of Brazil. The Money and Goods which came in this Ship are brought ashore, and put into a Warehouse. In the same manner is it used with those which come in the Flota or Galleons, the Merchants having only one Key of the Warehouse, which is looked upon as a great Oppression, seeing that their Ships are fitted out by private Persons; by a License from the Court, which they provide with a good Sum of Money; and therefore the Merchants bring home cargo to be at the sole disposal of the Merchants, who have reason to suppose, that the Duke of Alva's Design is to take the Money for his own Use, to supply his present occasions. It is said, he still keeps his Resolution of coming down to the Province, and the Duke of Ferv's Palace is preparing for him at Zafra, which is commonly called Cadiz, at Seville for the Biscuits. Spanish Reports, that last French Troops are arrived at Valencia, and are to be followed by a Body of Wagons; but no Credit is given to it. There are also Armies, but as much with the former, that French Men of War are come with Soldiers to Cadiz.

Plasencia, March 5. The 2d Infante came in his Gigantic Ship, loaded with Corn for Lisbon. Yesterday came in Her Majesty's Ship the *Mercadona*, *Brigadier*, and admiral *Cesarea*, and Transport Ships from Jamaica, our last sum Infante, laden with Hides, 12,000 and Iron, and a Dutch Merchant Ship called the *Pearl of Zeeland*, bound from Peru; the Master whereof gets an Account. That he left Lima the 24th of the last Month, and that Sir George Rose, with the Commander his Lieutenant, having on board the King of Spain, came in these the same day. Yesterday, came in also the *Marie*, *Ship of London*, homeward bound from Mexico City, two Dutch Dragoons, and a Buoy from Dablos; And this day came in the Englishman *Pacquet-Boat* in 21 days from Lisbon, and a Sloop from Peru.

Chatham, March 5. These Engages of Colours *Cavengers* & Regiment of Horse, 2nd Dragoon, and Guards General Staffs, Dragoon Guards, arrived here the 4th instant from Ireland.

Torremolinos, March 6. About 50 Sail of light Cutters came into our Roads the 3d instant in the evening; as did at the same time Her Majesty's Ship the *Alvarez-Prieto*, with about 40 Sail of Cutters under her Convoy, who sailed hence the next day, Sun Day; as did likewise the light Cutters for Newcastle; and yesterday came into our Roads several light Cutters bound to Newcastle. Her Majesty's Ships the *Grenadier* and *Nightingale* came into our Roads this day, with about 150 Sail of laden Cutters under their Convoy from Newcastle, amongst them bound for the River of Thames.

Cards, March 6. The 3d Infante Captain Stephens, Commander of a *George Princeps* Frigate, in his two French Prizes laden with Wine and Brandy, which he took out of a Fleet of about 50 Sail, under Convoy of two French Dragoons and a Dragoon. Last night came in the General Convoy of Newcastle, in Nine Days from Peru; the Master reporting that the day before he came away, one of Her Majesty's Ships arrived there, with several Merchant Ships under her Convoy, who came in Company with Her Majesty's Fleet under the Command of Sir George Rose. Captain Stephens, in the *Sovereign Privyse*, has been in a Recouery of Health, which he recouered from the French, and is now fit to go which came from Newcastle.

Hornwick, March 6. One of our *Pacquet-Boats* of 14 Guns, commanded by Captain Burleigh, is come in here from Cadiz, who had on board the Letters of Friday last, and in his Passage met with a French Privateer of 16 GUNS, taking him 4 hours, and being in the imminent Danger of being taken, threw the Mail overboard, so present as falling into the hands of the Enemy: However he happily got off, tho' with very great Damage in his Mails and Rigging.
