HE Forces on both fides continue in their Winter Quarters; Those of our Duke and his Allies have lately made some Excursions with very good Success, and have put a considerable Tract of Land in the Novarese and the Montserrate under Contribution. The Germans finding themselves somewhat streightened in their Quarters, 1500 of their Horse have been sent to Winter in the Principality of Masser nent to Winter in the Finisharity of Masser, a Fief belonging to the Pope. His Royal Highness has considerably augmented the Garison of Niu, and has posted some Troops in the Passes to that Town, to keep it's Communication open with Piedmont. Prince Charles of Vaudemont is to go hence in 3 or 4 days to command the Imperial Army on the Section, the Count de Staremberg being to command in these Parts. The Duke de la Feuillade is to serve on this fide in the Prench Army under the Duke de Vendosme, whose Brother the Grand Prior is to command the French Forces at San Benedetto. The Marshal de Tisse is sent for to the French Court. The French Troops in Savy and Dauphine are most of them marched towards the Rhosne, in order to their being either emplants of the Prior of ployed against the Sevennois, or sent into Spain.

Commbagen, March 15. A Durch Fleet of about 80 Sail of Merchant Ships came into the Sound the 9th Inflant, having been convoyed as far as the Skaw by Men of War of that Nation, which left them, and failed for Bergen, being to convoy home the 3 Datch Essimilia Ships which have Wintered there. Letters from thence fay, one of these three homeward-bound East-ladia Ships has been seized as belonging to the Chimber of Zealand, by way of Reprifal for the Da-nifb Ships taken of late by the Zealand Capers. The rith the King went to Fredericksbourg, where he received on the 13th the News of the Death of his Second Son, Prince George, whereupon he returned hither the same evening. This day the See of Fulmen, vacant by the Death of Dr. Kingo, was filled up by Dr. Muller, who was Confectated by the Archbishop of Copmbagen in St. Mary's Church, the King and Queen being present being present.

Presbourg, March 6. This day Monsieur Hamel Bruiminx van Nieuenrede, Envoy from the States General to the Emperor, went from hence with a Pass from Berzeni, to confer with him and the rest of the Heads of

the Malecontents in order to an Accommodation.

Vicina, March 8 A Danifo Regiment of Horse passed by here 2 days ago in their March to Hungary, to join the Forces under the Command of General Heiser. The Forces under the Command of General Heister. Malecontents continue their Excursions; and being informed, that the Inhabitants of the Country about the Castle of Blasenstein had laid up their best Effects there, a firing Body of them attacked it with great fury; the Malecontents were forced to retire with considerable Loss. from England, being come by the way of Hanover.

Zwith, March 3. The Duke of Savoy's Levies go on with good Success. The Swift Cantons have re-Anted very highly some offensive Expressions in the French Ambassador's last Memorial, for which he has been obliged to make fome Excuses. The Envoy of and 30 Men.

Savey, who loles no opportunity of making the Cantons fentible what Treatment they would receive from France, should they suffer themselves to be surrounded by the Arms of that Crown, and confequently liable at any time to be oppressed by it, has lately writthem a long Letter to that purpose, representing to them what they must expect if that should come to be the Case, when they meet with this ulage at a time that their Friendship would be of so great advantage to the French; which Letter meets with a general Approba-

tion, and it is hoped will have a very good effect.

Francfort, March 16. The Enemy, have not yet attacked Manderkingen, as it was expected they would, having (as is thought) laid afide that Delign upon from Preparations the Allies were making to oppose it. It is faid, that the Elector of Bavaria has not above 10000 regular Forces of his own, and that his French Auxiliaries are diminished from 25 or 20000 to 15000, and those are in want of many Necessaries. A French Major-General endeavouring to pass by the way of Bregents to Schaffbeuse in a Friar's Habit, Major-General Thungen, who commands the Imperial Forces on that side, having notice of it, caused him to be seezed, and there were taken about him several I effected. and there were taken about him feveral Letters from the French Army in Smabia, whereby it appears that they despair of receiving the Reinforcement deligned them from Alface, the Biack Forest being rendred unpassable by the Snow; and a Line is making between that Forest and Smitzerland, to deprive the French in Smalia of all manner of Communication with that

Country, or with Afferia.

Hamburgh, March 18. Letters from Warfam, of the 6th Instant say, the Heads, of the Confederated Nobi-lity of Poland, who are assembled there, had received 3 days before the News of their King's having caused the Princes James and Constantine Society to be leized near Breslam, and carried away Prisoners to Saxony which was a great Surprise and Mortification to them; and some Proposals had thereupon been made of drawing some Forces together for the Security of the Car-dinal Primate, and the rest of the Members of that Affembly; but no Resolution has yet been taken thereupon. They had also received an Account, That 40 Troops of the Forces of the Crown had declared for their King; and that the Han of Tarrary had promifed to affift him with 30000 Men whenever there should be occasion.

Hagie, March 21 N. S. The Confederate Troops are marching towards the Maefe, that they may be in a readiness to oppose any Designs the French may have on that side. The Russel Man of War put to Sea lately from Helwert-Sluies, and having joined the Winchester and an English Yacht off the Goree, they failed sogether yesferday for England. There are some Letters from Victina which fay, That the Accommodation with the Malecontents in Hungary was concluded; whereof we must expect the Confirmation, it being improbable that all Difficulties could be for foon adjusted.
