The Lord High Constable of England, the Earl Marshal and the Lord Great Chamberlain	Went to their stations at the east side of the Theatre.
The Bishops bearing the Bible, the Chalice, and the Paten	Delivered the same to the Archbishop of Canterbury at the Altar, and proceeded to their seats on the north side of the Sacarium.

THE QUEEN, with the Bishops her Supporters, and her Trainbearers, having passed on the south side of the Throne to the Area, and Her Majesty having here made her humble adoration, went to her Chair of Estate, and, after her private devotions (kneeling at her faldstool), sat down in her Chair: the Bishops her Supporters standing on either side of Her Majesty.

The Mistress of the Robes	Stood behind Her Majesty's Chair.
Her Majesty's Trainbearers	Stood to the west of Her Majesty's Chair.
The Groom of the Robes	Stood behind Her Majesty's Chair.
The Gentlemen-at-Arms (who guarded Her Majesty)	Halted at the steps to the Theatre and went to their positions.
The Ladies of the Bedchamber	Passed to their seats in the North Transept.
The Women of the Bedchamber	Passed to their seats in the West Aisle of the North Transept.
The Master of the Horse	Passed to his seat as a Peer in the South Transept.
The Gold-Stick-in-Waiting, and the Vice-Admiral of the United Kingdom	Passed to their seats in the West Aisle of the North Transept.
The Captain General of the Queen's Bodyguard for Scotland	Passed to his seat as a Peer in the South Transept.
The Rear-Admiral of the United Kingdom	Passed to his seat in the West Aisle of the North Transept.
The Lord in Waiting and the Captain of the Yeomen of the Guard	Passed to their seats as Peers in the South Transept.
The Private Secretary to the Queen	Passed to his seat in the West Aisle of the North Transept.
The Keeper of Her Majesty's Privy Purse	Passed to his seat as a Peer in the South Transept.
The Comptroller Lord Chamberlain's Office and the Crown Equerry	Passed to their seats in the West Aisle of the North Transept.
The Lord Plunket	Passed to his seat as a Peer in the South Transept.
The other Equerries to the Queen, the Silver-Stick-in-Waiting, and the Field-Officer-in-Brigade Waiting	Passed to their seats in the West Aisle of the North Transept.
The Officers of the Yeomen of the Guard	Stood beneath the Organ Loft at the entrance to the Choir.
The Yeomen of the Guard	Stood on either side of the Nave near the entrance to the Choir.

NOTE

Pages attending Peers who bore Her Majesty's Regalia or who had other services to perform, went to their appointed places and remained there until before the crowning of the Queen, when they appropriately delivered the coronets which they carried, returning at once to their places, where they remained until the Procession was reformed upon the conclusion of the Service.

The pages of those Peers who were seated during the ceremony delivered the coronets which they carried to their respective Peers as they went to their places, where they remained until the conclusion of the Service when they formed up in the Procession.

The page of the Mistress of the Robes stood beside the Mistress of the Robes.
