At the Court at *Buckingham Palace*, the 19th day of *November*, 1953.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 13th day of November, 1953, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and the Acts mentioned therein, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the interest hereinafter mentioned of George Nigel Capel-Cure of Staple Hall Stone House Court Bishopsgate in the City of London in the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the church and cure (hereinafter called 'the said benefice') of Badger in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said George Nigel Capel-Cure is the person entitled to nominate to the said benefice:

"And whereas Your Majesty is entitled to present to the said benefice on the nomination of the said George Nigel Capel-Cure:

"And whereas the said George Nigel Capel-Cure desires to transfer his interest in the advowson of the said benefice to Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof he has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable Gavin Turnbull, Baron Simonds, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting on behalf of Your Majesty, and with the consent of the Right Reverend Stretton, Bishop of Lichfield as bishop of the diocese in which the said benefice is situate (in testimony whereof they have executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the said interest of the said George Nigel Capel-Cure in the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of the said benefice shall be transferred to Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 13th day of November, 1953, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and the Diocesan Stipends Funds Measure, 1953, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Arthur, Bishop of Bristol (in witness whereof he has signed the Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Marshfield and the benefice of Cold Ashton both situate in the diocese of Bristol.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of Benefices.* The benefice of Marshfield and the benefice of Cold Ashton shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The United Benefice of Marshfield with Cold Ashton,' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend William Henry Osmund Moss if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Marshfield shall with his consent (testified by his signature hereto), be the first incumbent of the united benefice

"3. *Parsonage House.*

"(a) Upon the union taking effect the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Marshfield shall be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice and as soon as conveniently may be the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Cold Ashton and the site and appurtenances thereof and the grounds heretofore usually occupied and enjoyed therewith shall be sold and disposed of by us, the said Church Commissioners, at such time or times and in such manner in all respects as to us shall seem expedient.

"(b) The net proceeds of such sale or sales shall be applied by us as follows, that is to say:—

"(i) so much of the net proceeds as after consultation with the bishop of the diocese we
